The City's own Garden Grove TV3 (GGTV3) cable division was awarded the highest honor by the National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors (NATOA) Government Programming Awards, held in Austin, TX, on September 22, 2016. 

FAITHWITH new woon

Diocese of Orange unveils what the transformed Christ Cathedral will look like when the work's done.


range County's iconic glass cathedral is all set for its transformation into a flagship structure for the Roman Catholic Church while retaining its architectural majesty, which continues to draw tourists to what used to be the Rev. Robert H. Schuller's Crystal Cathedral megachurch campus in Garden Grove.

On a recent afternoon, officials with the Diocese of Orange gathered inside the sanctuary of Christ Cathedral, now barely a glass shell, to unveil the design of the new cathedral and set a timeline for the construction project - days before the diocese's 40th anniversary celebration earlier this month.

The project will break ground in April and likely will be completed in October

2018, said Mark Dubeau, the diocese's chief financial officer. He said it could take several additional months to install the Hazel Wright organ, which was refurbished in Italy and now rests in an Irvine storage facility. That means the cathedral may not be ready until 2019.

"This is a mostly funded plan," Dubeau said, referring to the \$60 million raised by the Orange Catholic Foundation through an unprecedented fundraising campaign during the past four years.

The cathedral is expected to cost about \$72 million – down from an estimated \$108 million – when work is completed. That is a feat accomplished through significant scaling down, said the Rev. Christopher Smith, rector and episcopal vicar of Christ Cathedral who is overseeing the project.

"You begin with your dreams," he said. "But now we have a project that is financially sound. Our goal was to fashion a cathedral that is beautiful, maintains the architectural integrity of the original Philip Johnson building and can serve

the community's needs."


During the unveiling event, attendees got to experience what the renovated cathedral might look like by wearing virtual reality goggles for a three-dimensional video.

The video took viewers through sweeping views of the cathedral's sanctuary bathed in white, the predominant color – from the lighted altar in the center of the church and the bishop's chair to the baptismal font and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel bearing the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which will be wrapped in glass and stainless steel.

Those who attended the 40th anniversary celebration Sept. 18 at the Christ Cathedral campus got such a glimpse of the new cathedral design, diocesan officials said.

The seats in the new sanctuary will "radiate like the spokes of a wheel," ensuring that all in the sanctuary get a clear view of the altar, said lead architect Scott Johnson. Interestingly, Johnson, 35 years ago, was a young apprentice in the New York City office of Philip Johnson, the architect who designed the original Crystal Cathedral.

"I was there listening to him go over the speech he would give at the inaugura-

tion of Dr. Schuller's cathedral," Scott Johnson said. "And here I am today."

The floors and walls will be made with limestone with walnut panels, and the gold-leaf altar will be adorned with travertine and Italian marble, he said.

Santa Ana resident Matt Shannon said he was impressed with what he saw of the design through his virtual reality goggles.

"This is one of Orange County's most architecturally significant buildings," he said. "It's great that the diocese is doing a respectful redesign by maintaining the integrity of what was the Crystal Cathedral."

The building is appealing because it places more emphasis on people, said Sister Kit Gray, who oversees community building efforts at the Christ Cathedral campus.

"To me, it seems like a design that puts people first," she said. "It draws us around the altar, which represents Christ and the faith. That's what the church is about – building community."

Nguyen coauthors bill to help seniors

AB1891 will make it easier for elderly to file their taxes

Next year, senior citizens will find that filing their taxes will become easier thanks to the passage of AB 1891, authored by Assemblyman Matt Dababneh and coauthored by Sen. Janet Nguyen, who represents Garden Grove and Westminster.

This new law maintains that once an individual has turned 65 years old, and a school district has previously exempted them from a parcel tax, the district must continue to grant that exemption for as long as the senior is eligible.

"It is important that we remove barriers that could prevent our seniors from receiving the parcel tax exemptions they are eligible for," said Nguyen. "In this endeavor, I was pleased to join Assemblymember Dababneh and the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association to pass this important bill, which will make it so that our seniors do not have to go through the hassle of filing paper work with a school district year after year."

Parcel taxes are imposed on parcels of real property, typically sections of land, and unlike property taxes, are not based on the value of the property; they are a

flat tax. Parcel taxes can be imposed by cities, counties, school districts and special districts and are used as a source of additional revenue. These taxes are collected by the county treasurer at the same time as property tax.

Under current law, some school districts grant parcel tax

exemptions to seniors based on their age. These school districts require seniors to file the same paper work every year, even though seniors continue to be eligible for the exemption. Those who qualify for this exemption are seniors over the age of 65, persons receiving Supplemental Security Income for a disability, regardless of age, or those receiving Social Security Disability Insurance, regardless of age.

AB 1891, which will be implemented January 1, 2017, was sponsored by the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association and supported by the California Taxpayers Association and the California Association of Realtors.

Seniors interested in applying for this tax exemption should consult their tax preparer or local school district to determine if the program is available in your district.

City implements water conservation plan

Residents are encouraged to water every other day

In response to the state Water Board's elimination of the water reduction mandate, and an adequate water supply, the City of Garden Grove has declared a Stage 1 Voluntary Conservation, allowing residents to voluntarily water every other day.

Voluntary guidelines currently in effect are:

- Watering is limited to once every other day, before 10:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m., for a maximum of 15 minutes per station
- Watering by use of a hand-water shut-off nozzle is permitted any day

Permanent regulations in effect at all times are:

 Watering with auto sprinklers are allowed only 15 minutes per day per station, unless low-flow drip systems or weather-based controllers are used.

In response to the state Water • No watering during or within 48 hours of rainfall

- Must use shutoff hose nozzle when washing vehicles
- No water runoff
- No washing down sidewalks or driveways
- Water leaks must be fixed immediately
- Water fountains or decorative water features must recirculate water

In April of 2015, the city underwent a Stage 2 Water Alert in response to Governor Brown's executive order that mandated new regulations to achieve a 25 percent statewide reduction in water use. The city was mandated to reduce water usage by 20 percent based on prior conservation efforts. In May of 2016, the State Water Board eliminated the water reduction mandate and gave cities the oppor-

tunity to perform a "stress test" to determine their own conservation target.

Working with the Municipal Water District of Orange County and Orange County Water District to perform an analysis on the city's water supplies, the City determined an adequate water supply for the next three years and certified a 0 percent conservation target.

The Garden Grove City Council approved the Stage 1 Voluntary Conservation at the Sept. 13 regular meeting of the Garden Grove City Council.

The city continues to encourage residents to use water efficiently and conserve whenever possible.

Slayings reveal 'furry' links

Suspects, victim in Fullerton case part of group that admires animals in human form.

FULLERTON • Four people associated with Saturday's triple homicide in Fullerton were involved in the Southern California furry community, a group of fans who congregate online, at meetups and at conventions to admire and dress up like animals, a member said.

"A lot of people in our community were devastated," said Christopher Parque-Johnson, 23, of Garden Grove, an artist, performer and videographer for the SoCal Furs, which has



Obispo to San Diego. "I've been hearing from a lot of people. It bothered everybody.

"It makes no sense."

Parque-Johnson led a group of furries, as they call themselves, to the site of homicides Sunday night. They laid roses, left cards and lit candles to honor victim Jennifer Yost, Parque-Johnson said, because she was a mother figure to the SoCal Furs. The two identified accused killers are also furries, as is Yost's daughter Katlynn Goodwin Yost, Parque-Johnson said.

"All of them were always

nice to everybody," said Parque-Johnson, known in the furry community as Bandit, a raccoon inspired by the film "Over the Hedge."

The Orange County District Attorney's Office, as early as today, will determine whether to file murder charges against two men and a 17-year-old female accused in the triple homicide.

Christopher Yost, 34; his wife, Jennifer Yost, 39; and their friend Arthur Boucher, 28, were found dead in the Yost home in Fullerton on Saturday morning. Two of the couple's daughters, ages 6 and 9, were home when police arrived. The younger girl alerted police by calling 91, saying their parents had died.

On Sunday morning, police arrested Frank Felix, 25, of Sun Valley; Joshua Acos-

ta, a 21-year-old U.S. Army mechanic based at Fort Irwin; and a 17-year-old female on suspicion of murder.

The trio were arrested after police had asked for the public's help in finding Jennifer Yost's missing daughter, Katlynn, who is

Katlynn Yost was located, but police said state law prevents them from saying whether she was the arrested teenager.

Fullerton police on Monday released the official booking charges for the three: murder and conspiracy. The Fullerton Police Department declined to comment further on the case Monday.

The District Attorney's Office will decide whether to directly charge the 17-year-old as an adult or take her case to juvenile court, where a judge would decide if the teenager is appropriate for adult court.

Parque-Johnson said he knew the accused men and Katlynn Yost, who identifies herself as a furry on her Facebook and Twitter accounts, but did not associate them with one another.

"We've never seen them huddled together," Parque-Johnson said. "We didn't know them as friends of each other."

Parque-Johnson said he was closest with Jennifer Yost.

"People looked up to her," he said. "A lot of people cared about her."

Joshua Acosta and Frank Felix were helpful in setting up and breaking down weekend events, Parque-Johnson said.

"They were trying to be outstanding citizens," Parque-Johnson said.

Furries have been around since the 1980s. They admire anthropomorphic animals – characters that walk on two feet and speak like humans. Most of them are "non-suiters," meaning they don't spend \$1,000 to \$5,000 or more on full-body animal costumes. Instead, they create cha-

racters and wear badges with their characters displayed.

Parque-Johnson said furries have been unfairly characterized in the media as a group of sexual deviants. Sexual activity involving some people in furry costumes has happened in the three-decade history of the furries, according to media accounts.

"If we see it, we don't allow those people back," Parque-Johnson said. "We feel that behavior would be very inappropriate in our group. We think that is very weird."

The furry community comprises mostly adults under 30, although there are some older furries who were fans of Disney movies involving animals with human characteristics such as in "Robin Hood."

Furries watch movies, play video games, draw pictures and trade cards, Parque-Johnson said.

"People come to us to get away from the negative stuff in life," he said.

Các thành phố được giao nhiệm vụ để giảm thiểu sử dụng nước bằng 20% dựa trên những nỗ lực bảo tồn trước. Vào tháng Năm 2016, State Water Board loại bỏ các nhiệm vụ giảm nước và cho các thành phố có cơ hội để thực hiện một "stress test" để xác định mục tiêu bảo tồn của họ.





SB 272 Compliance Deadline Passed with Many Agencies Out of Compliance Free Resources Available to Make Compliance Easy

The Legislature expanded the California Public Records Act in 2015 by requiring local agencies to create and make available online a catalog of enterprise systems. This catalog must be made public upon request and be posted in a prominent location on the local agency's website. <u>SB 272</u> went into effect on July 1 and going forward cities will need to annually update the public data. Over 140 agencies missed the July 1, 2016 compliance date. The good news is that compliance can be simple using free and publicly available tools. *For more, see Page 2*.

Community Based Transitional Housing Grants Application Now Available

The Department of Finance (DOF) this week released the application for the community housing grants. Applications will be accepted on a first come basis over a two-year period that begins Oct. 1, 2016. DOF will stop accepting applications when the \$25 million appropriation is fully awarded even if that occurs prior to Oct. 1, 2018. The <u>application</u> is available on DOF's website. Enterprise System Definition

Enterprise system refers to software application or a computer system that collects, stores, exchanges, and analyzes information that the agency uses that is both of the following:

- A multi-departmental system or a system that contains information collected about the public; and
- A system of record.

For example, an enterprise system could be a constituent management system, the city's council meeting management system, or a general financial management system used for budgeting and analytics by the finance department.

The city of Lancaster and Town of Apple Valley provide examples of how to be in compliance.

Resources on Enterprise System Catalogs

There are a variety of resources available to help local agencies comply including:

- A step-by-step guide on how to create an enterprise system catalog;
- A free tool provided by Streamline, a division of Digital Deployment, Inc.;
- Information on how to hyperlink the system catalog to your agency's website;
- · SB 272 compliance FAQ; and
- Municipal Information Systems Association of California (MISAC) Tool and Instructions.
 - (For MISAC members only: please contact MISAC for your personalized log-in credentials).

Information on What to Upload and Link

A list or catalog (PDF document) describing each systems' purpose, product name and vendor, primary users (custodians) and frequency of collection and updates must be posted in a prominent location on a local agency's website, if the agency has a website. This list needs be updated annually.

Please note that the term "prominent location" is not defined in state law, so this is up to the individual city's judgment. That being said, it would be wise to err on the side of caution and place it somewhere very prominent on the agency homepage.

Items Excluded

Enterprise systems do not include cybersecurity systems, infrastructure and mechanical control systems, or information that would reveal vulnerabilities to, or otherwise increase the potential for an attack on, a public agency's IT system. Additionally, SB 272 does not automatically require disclosure of the specific records that the IT systems collect, store, exchange or analyze, however, the Public Records Act's other provisions pertaining to disclosure of such records still apply. If the public interest served by not disclosing the information described clearly outweighs the public interest served by disclosure, the local agency may instead provide a system name, brief title or identifier of the system.

Assistance

Digital Deployment is happy to answer questions on this process or provide other assistance.

Cities and counties will be eligible for grants under the new Community-Based Transitional-Housing Program. Established by <u>SB 837</u>, a budget trailer bill approved in June, the program provides \$25 million in grants for cities or counties that agree to site transitional housing connected with support services for recently released offenders. Individual grants can be up to \$2 million, depending on the size of the facility, and priorities will be provided for applications with local matching contributions.

Key features include:

- The applying city or county must agree to issue a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a
 facility providing transitional housing and supportive services for ex-offenders released
 from county jail or state prison. While the measure is primarily directed at ex-offenders
 there is some additional flexibility on the types of individuals housed. The CUP must be
 for at least 10 years.
- An experienced facility operator must be identified.
- As part of application process, the local agency must include a list of "all permitted facilities ... that in a residential setting provide transitional housing services, psychological counseling, or cognitive behavioral therapy." This list must include the number of residents residing in each facility in their jurisdiction, including those on probation or parole. Presumably, state agencies must provide a local agency the information necessary to assemble this information.
- Sixty percent of the grant may be retained by the approving jurisdiction, and can be used
 for public safety enhancements, community outreach efforts, or any other communitybased activities that the local agency believes will improve community relations or
 concerns with the facility.
- Forty percent of the funding must be shared by the local agency with nonprofit facility operators to support start-up costs, service provision, security improvements, rehabilitative services and community outreach.
- Participating local agencies and facility operators must submit annual reports, as specified.

Preview of Local Revenue Measures on the Ballot in California this November

The Nov. 8, 2016 California gubernatorial election includes some 650 local measures including 427 seeking approval for taxes or bonds. CaliforniaCityFinance.com has prepared a <u>preview</u> report on these measures for the upcoming election.

School bonds and parcel tax measures make nearly half of the number. K-12 schools districts and community colleges are requesting a total of \$25.314 billion in 184 separate authorizations for bonds to construct facilities, acquire equipment and make repairs and upgrades. Six of these school bonds exceed the limits to qualify for a 55 percent vote and require two-thirds approval. There are 22 measures to increase or extend (renew) school parcel taxes.

Among the 221 non-school local revenue measures are four measures asking for a total of \$7.266 billion in bonds including the \$3.5 billion Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) Measure RR covering three San Francisco bay area counties, the \$1.2 billion Los Angeles homeless housing and services Measure HHH, and Santa Clara County's \$950 million affordable housing Measure A

There are 88 measures to increase or extend Transactions and Use Tax (sales tax) rates. Thirty of these are special (earmarked) taxes requiring two-thirds voter approval. These include 13 countywide measures for transportation improvements. There are 58 city and county majority vote general purpose tax proposals ranging from one-quarter percent to 1 percent.

There are 39 city, county and special district parcel taxes requiring two-thirds voter approval, including five street/road improvement measures, eight for parks/recreation/open space, 14 for fire/emergency medical response, four for hospitals, and four for police.

Coinciding with the statewide Proposition 64, which would legalize recreational marijuana in California, there are 37 measures to tax cannabis and three to tax sugary beverages (in Albany, Oakland and San Francisco).

Voters in 19 cities and two counties will consider increasing hotel occupancy taxes.

California City Solutions: Menifee's Mayor's Roundtable Fosters Open Communication

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2015 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. Menifee's Mayors Business Roundtable Series was submitted in 2015 for the League Partners Award for Excellence in City-Business Relations award category.

The Menifee Mayor's Roundtable started in 2014 as a networking forum for business owners with common interests and the city government. The program was created after business leaders expressed concern that the city was not hearing their issues with communication largely limited to city council meetings.

The mayor and city staff worked to design a more informal communication process so the business community and the city had a way to exchange ideas critical to the city's growth and the service delivery systems. In addition, the city was looking for strategies to boost residential and commercial development to increase sales and property tax revenues and a way to address systemic failures that could be potentially hampering progress. One challenge was the divide between residents who had supported incorporation (urban community) and those against it (rural community).

The Mayor's Roundtable has been highly successful with 15-20 people attending each event. These meetings lead to Menifee's Business Incentive Program that has brought new businesses to the city. Menifee's revised sign ordinance is another example of the program's impact. The new ordinance provides greater signage options for businesses and made the signage permitting process more efficient. These roundtables also helped create the city's Rural Business License Registration Program, which was coined Land-Use and Business Registration Program.

Through the Mayor's Roundtable meetings, city staff started working on a program to assist these businesses and bring them into compliance to the city's regulations based on the health and safety codes requirements. This has proven to be a productive effort and has helped the city bridge the rural and urban communities, which has been difficult thing to do since incorporation until the roundtable program was created.

The Mayor's Roundtable has had a positive effect on the city and its relationship with its business community. The events are an important forum for this newly incorporated city to unify the city, local businesses and residents.

This information, which is primarily directed at city managers and city attorneys, but will be informative for everyone in local government, takes the form of a Frequently Asked Questions document and a more <u>detailed memo</u>. The memo explains key differences between the AUMA and the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act, signed into law last year, and details aspects of the AUMA that will effect local regulation, including deliveries, permissive zoning, and taxes.

The memo has been updated twice in response to feedback from local governments, first to clarify that the AUMA provides that local governments can reasonably <u>regulate</u>, but cannot ban, indoor cultivation for personal use of up to six plants per adult, and second to clarify that local ordinances enacted to ban indoor cultivation for personal use prior the November election will have no legal effect if the AUMA is approved by voters. The AUMA will supersede such local prohibitions.

In sum, cities should take note of four key points:

- 1) The AUMA, if it passes, will NOT pre-empt local control, except with respect to <u>indoor</u> cultivation of up to six plants for personal use.
- 2) If voters approve the AUMA, local bans on <u>indoor cultivation for personal use</u> will automatically be invalid on their face. Local governments have no incentive to enact bans on indoor cultivation before the November election, unless the cultivation being targeted is commercial in nature. Reasonable local regulations on indoor cultivation for personal use will remain valid, and can be enacted even after the November election (examples are residential cultivation permits, inspection requirements, etc.).
- If voters approve the AUMA, local bans or other regulations on <u>outdoor</u> cultivation will remain valid.
- 4) If voters approve the AUMA, local regulations, including bans, of non-medical marijuana businesses/commercial operations will remain valid.

The <u>LA Business Portal</u> is an online resource that streamlines the process of starting a business in Los Angeles and assists businesses that are hoping to grow their operations.

With the portal, everything an entrepreneur and business owner needs to start, grow, and manage their business is available at one online location. The tools provided include a Resource Library, a Startup Guide, as well as Starter Kit how-to guides that map out best practices for starting and managing businesses. In contrast to several different locations and websites, the portal is a one-stop shop for new and current business owners. The website is simple and user-friendly and is available in ten major languages, representing and facilitating the city's diversity.

Los Angeles learned from San Francisco, which in 2011 launched the inaugural <u>San Francisco</u> <u>Business Portal</u>. San Francisco worked with local business owners, city agencies, and promising entrepreneurs to craft a comprehensive one-stop shop setting the stage for cities like Los Angeles, Boston, Salt Lake City, and many others to develop similar solutions.

Sharing the Codes

Setting California apart, Los Angeles took it one-step further by making the website codes <u>free</u> <u>and available for download</u> — a practice known as Open Sourcing. By providing open source information, the portal is accessible for state and local governments to replicate and customize the design and purpose of the tool, making this powerful online tool a potential reality for cities of all sizes and resources.

<u>Seven additional California cities</u> have already made the pledge to create Startup in a Day online tools and develop streamlined, business-friendly, online permitting systems.
