ACC-OC City Member Hardship Policy

Background

The ACC-OC charges population-based dues to City Members in order to participate in events, policy committees, and other activities. In times of financial hardship, such as a recession, City Members have expressed difficulty with both allocating and justifying allocation of funds to pay for membership in organizations such as ACC-OC. Simultaneously, City Members routinely express the desire to remain involved in ACC-OC's activities and committees and believe participation in ACC-OC is immensely valuable.

The City of La Palma ("La Palma"), in particular, has demonstrated this bind. Although La Palma is currently unable to marshal its finances to remain a dues paying member, it has expressed sincere interest in remaining involved with ACC-OC. La Palma's situation is the first that ACC-OC has encountered since it was founded and thus raises a problem, two solutions for which are not optimal.

The first solution would entail barring La Palma's participation in ACC-OC until it is once again able to pay dues. Doing so would result in loss of a City Member, along with all the attending staff and in-kind contributions that ACC-OC has enjoyed in the past. The second solution is exactly the opposite: allow La Palma to remain in ACC-OC without paying dues. Although the second option allows ACC-OC to continue engaging with a greater number of Orange County cities, it presents questions as to the duration of a member not paying its dues and fairness to other cities who are in similarly dire financial straits.

At the January 2016 ACC-OC Board of Directors ("Board") Meeting, the Board tasked then-CEO Lacy Schoen with engaging La Palma to determine if it would be able to provide in-kind contributions in place of financial payment. At the February 2016 Meeting, outgoing CEO Lacy Schoen briefed the Board that La Palma would be unable to do so until July 2016, as city staff time would be largely devoted to developing a ballot initiative that is expected to be completed by then. Current CEO Heather Stratman was tasked by the Board to consider a financial hardship policy that would address both La Palma's situation and provide ACC-OC with a set of guidelines for future instances of hardship from other cities. The CEO's recommendations are outlined below.

Hardship Policy

In the interests of membership retention and engagement, the CEO believes that the following policy should be considered for future adoption.

1. A City Member experiencing a period of financial hardship may retain membership in ACC-OC without paying dues for a maximum of two (2) years. Membership dues, in effect, are temporarily suspended until such time as a City is able to resume payment. A City that is unable to resume paying dues after this period will no longer retain membership in ACC-OC until it is able to resume paying dues.
2. A City that requests a hardship exemption from paying dues must have been a member in good standing with ACC-OC for three (3) years prior to its request. Good standing is defined as having paid membership dues for the past three (3) years.
3. A City that is given a hardship exemption shall not possess voting rights. Such cities still retain the right to make first and second motions, however.
4. A City that previously experienced financial hardship but is later able to pay dues shall be responsible for paying the suspended dues at a schedule to be agreed upon by ACC-OC and the City.
5. The ACC-OC shall not publicize or make known that any of its City Members are currently experiencing financial hardship.
6. The CEO shall convene with a subcommittee of three (3) city managers to make recommendations to the CEO to take to the Board regarding City Members and proclaim financial hardship.
7. Should a Board member whose City is deemed to be experiencing financial hardship retains his or her seat on the Board, he or she shall no longer possess voting rights.

Executive Summary:

At the direction of President Murray, I have begun to assess the organizational structure of ACC-OC, including the labor budget, personnel resources, and communication structures between ACC-OC staff and the Board of Directors, and between committees and the Board, as it relates to policy implementation effectiveness. In doing so, I have identified several issue areas where that I believe the Board should provide input. With Board feedback, I can begin to formalize and adopt organizational restructuring plans that will promote the sustainability and health of the organization.

Initially, there are three issue areas I would like to discuss with the Board. They are, Personnel Resources, Committee Structure and a Bylaws Amendment.

- 1. Personnel Resources** - The Association is heavily reliant on contract personnel for primary association work. While in the first few years of an association contract personnel can offer periodic, specific expertise at an affordable rate, the benefits of utilizing internal employees now is to not so heavily depend on consultants for time sensitive work or being subject to pressures that other consultant clients may have. I believe the organization should look at converting a portion of the work currently contracted out to in-house employees. Part of my reasoning for transferring to in-house staffing is to have a better handle on labor expenses, as well as continuing to promote future succession planning. Currently if the Association maintains its current labor related costs the Association will be faced with a significant shortfall.

Currently, our organization employees' four full-time employees and one part-time employee, with additional support from three consulting firms for services that range from event management, external communications and production of the City Square. Each of these services are of primary importance to the Association's mission and ongoing day-to-day operations. As these contracts come up for renewal, I am recommending that the Board of Directors and the CEO work together

to determine the best use of the personnel budget and other resources to efficiently staff the services and operations of the Association. Specifically, I recommend the following:

- Beginning July 1, 2016, bring event management in-house and hire a full-time dedicated individual responsible for event management and sponsorships. Currently, we are expending approximately \$64,000 a year (contract) for event management services. By bringing the service in-house I am confident we can maintain consistent service to our members and in some cases increase opportunities for success.
- Beginning July 1, 2016, internally staff the Infrastructure and Technology, Human Resources and Pension Reform Committees, and the Homelessness Task Force that were previously staffed through a contractual relationship. Currently, to contract out for these services the Association is expending more than \$36,000 a year.
- Effective April 1, 2016, discontinue the contract for additional management services. Currently, the Association is expending approximately \$120,000 a year on additional management services through a contractual relationship. While in the future the CEO's office may have projects that require additional high level management services, I have not had the opportunity to fully assess the need for such assistance now. I will return to the Board of Directors with a further recommendation during our strategic planning session in late May.

2. Committee Structure – To date ACC-OC hosts 10 committees. These include:

- City Manager's Committee (meets monthly)
- Legislative and Advocacy Committee (meets monthly)
- Homelessness Task Force (meets monthly)
- Local Government Innovation Committee (meets quarterly)
- Water Committee (meets monthly)
- Infrastructure & Technology Committee (meets monthly)
- Economic Development Committee (meets quarterly)
- Pension Reform Committee (meets monthly)
- Energy & Environment Committee (meets monthly)
- Emeritus Committee (meets quarterly)

The Committees are somewhat disconnected from the Board of Directors, and lack specific and often times clear direction as they seek to tackle challenging policy issues. There is a need to reconnect the work and policy direction that is offered by the Board of Directors to the individual Committees. Further, many of the committees are poorly attended but require significant staff resources to create agendas, follow up on work products and promote attendance.

I recommend to the Board that we study a consolidation and refocus of the committees so they are more appropriately linked to the policies of the Board of Directors, thereby reducing the expenditure of staff resources. This way, Committee work can delve deeper into the challenging issues that the Association is well positioned to facilitate. Specifically, I recommend:

- CEO and Board President will meet with each Committee Chair and discuss a work plan, frequency and need of meetings, and goals of the committee.
- CEO will bring back a plan for consolidation of the individual Committees to the strategic planning meeting in May 2016.
- Summary reports will be prepared on the status of each Committee and provided to the Board of Directors in April. Information will be collected on the tenure of the committee, average attendance, work product and results as well as an analysis of staff resources needed for each Committee.

3. **Bylaws Amendment** – Currently the ACC-OC bylaws provide that the CEO has discretion over issuing contracts for service. Currently, there is no limitation on the amount of that authority. that must be brought forth to the Board of Directors for ratification. There is a provision that any check issued by the Association in excess of \$5000.00 must have a second signature other than the CEO's. I propose that the Association consider a bylaws change that limits the authority of the CEO to issue contracts up to a maximum of \$25,000 without Board authority. I propose that during our upcoming business meeting for elections for the Board of Directors, we put forward a bylaws amendment that requires contracts that exceed \$25,000.00, be approved by the Board of Directors. This is a very common practice by municipalities, special districts and regional agencies throughout the County, and would provide needed transparency and oversight.

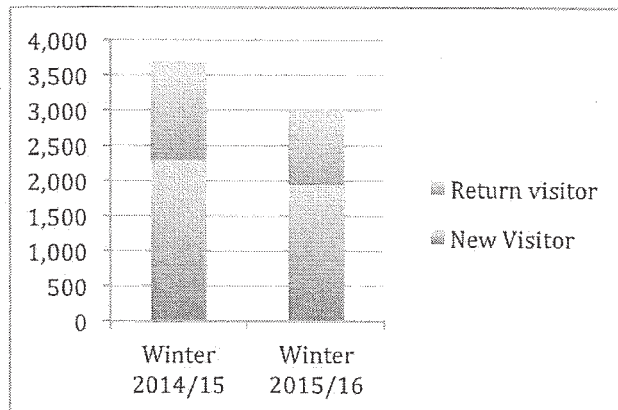

eHUB Research Title: Sober Living Homes 2/26/16

Background: ACC-OC recognizes the challenge presented by Sober Living Homes (SLH) in many communities and that they have increasingly become an important and developing issue for many Orange County Cities. The purpose of this survey is to understand the strategic policies that organizations may or may not have taken to address SLHs.

ACC-OC Summary: Survey response was adequate with 15 Orange County cities reporting.

- 5 Cities reported having Licensed SLHs in their city, and 10 reported none
 - 6 cities specified the names of these homes but deferred to the department of Health Care Services (DHCS) for more accurate listing of homes and licenses
- 12 cities reported having Unlicensed SLHs in their city, and 3 reported none
 - The number of SLHs reported varied greatly from city to city ranging from 10 to 200
- 10 cities reported having challenges regulating SLHs, 5 did not. Common challenges were:
 - State Law preemption
 - Noise and public disturbances
- 7 cities reported no direct actions to regulate SLHs, 2 Cities reported regulating smoking, 1 reported regulating parking, 1 city reported addressing SLH similar to Short-Term Rentals, and 8 cities explained various attempts to address SLHs.
- Common Resident Concerns included:
 - Crime rates
 - Smoking
 - Noise
 - Parking
 - Property values
- Common Council Concerns included:
 - Resident Concerns
 - Litigation
- Common Law Enforcement Concerns include:
 - Nuisance calls
 - No concerns
- 11 cities commented on changes to State Law that would help ease community concerns. Comments varied by city but most commonly included:
 - Zoning regulation to allow separation of facilities from residential areas by amending Health and Safety code section 11834.20 – 11834.25 to provide reasonable separation beneficial to all parties.

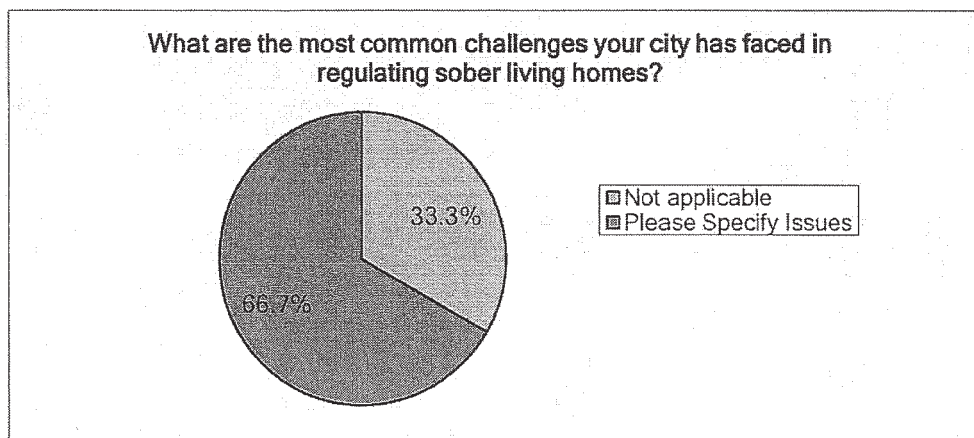


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What are the most common challenges your city has faced in regulating sober living homes?

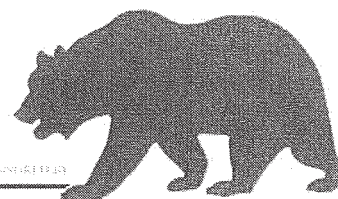

- State Law
- The most common challenge the City has faced are the lawsuits filed against our ordinances. The City has adopted two ordinances that address the negative impacts of the Alcohol and Drug recovery industry in the City's residential zones. The primary impact is the density issue that has occurred with an over concentration of these uses. Although, the purpose of the ordinance(s) is to help reduce the density, create a better quality of life and provide better access to individuals who are seeking these types of accommodations, some operators have challenged the ordinances through lawsuits claiming discrimination.
- The licensed ones cannot be regulated so informing the residents of the State preemption on regulating them is challenging. The unlicensed ones are difficult to learn about. We only find out when there are complaints. We have to be careful not to break laws that require that we treat them like any other single family residence. Dealing with the smoking, parking, deliveries and staff is also challenging.

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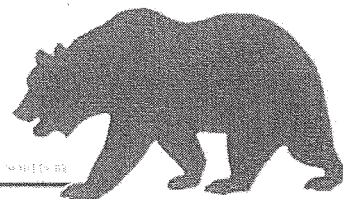

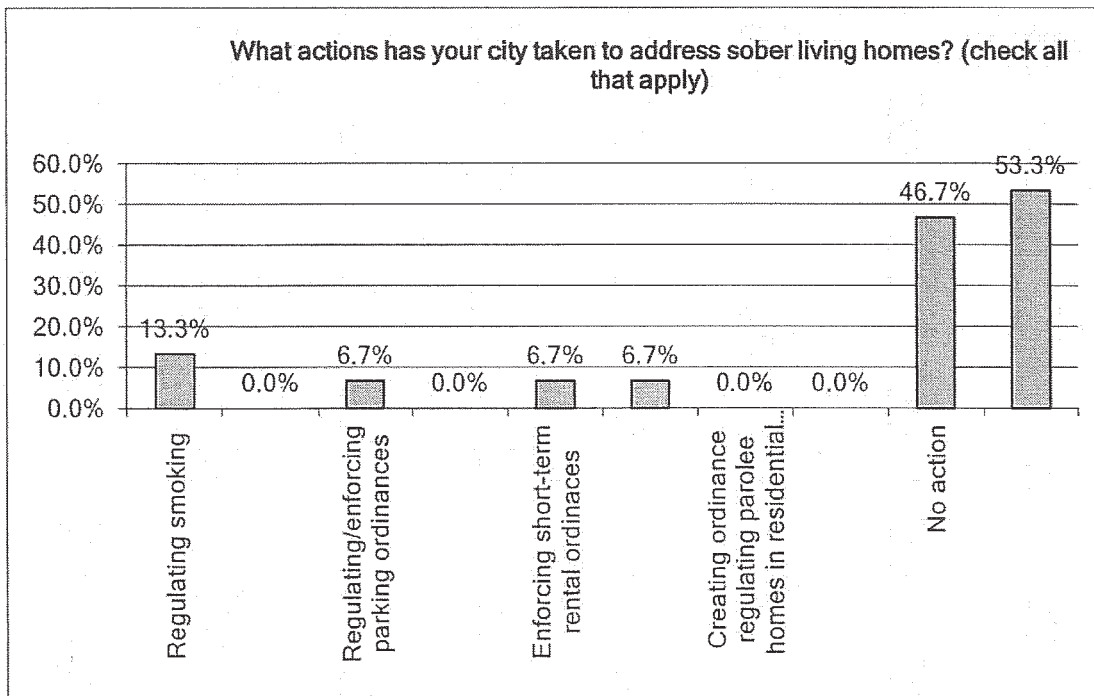

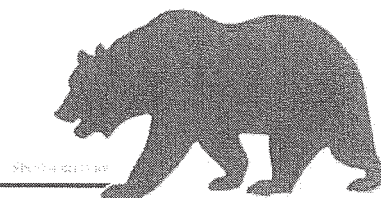

- All these facilities operate pursuant to state law (i.e., six or less occupants, etc.) and therefore, are exempt from local ordinances.
- The City of Costa Mesa has adopted two ordinances for both the single and multifamily zones. The main focus of these ordinances is to reduce the density of these uses to help elevate the negative impacts on the quality of life in the residential zones while improving access to those seeking these types of environments.
- Appealing to Senator John Moorloch and Assemblyman Mathew Harper to sponsor and promote bills to accomplish statutory changes.
 - Also, used the definitions that Newport Beach uses that define a "single housekeeping unit" so that if unlicensed sober living homes are not living as a "family" as defined in the single housekeeping unit definition, we can require a CUP for a use not specifically listed in the zone (residential zones). "
- The City of Costa Mesa has adopted two ordinances for both the single and multifamily zones. The main focus of these ordinances is to reduce the density of these uses to help elevate the negative impacts on the quality of life in the residential zones while improving access to those seeking these types of environments.
- Public nuisance actions
- Many years ago, City staff (Police, Code Enforcement and Planning) worked with the County Sheriff's department to try and find a way to regulate these facilities. We were trying to create a voluntary program to incentive operators to comply with certain conditions in exchange for certain benefits. Unfortunately, those efforts were unsuccessful and we were unable to getting any type of regulatory control.
- City is conducting a total re-write to the zoning ordinance. Staff will consider this use, however, it is undetermined at this time what course of action will be taking regarding this topic.
- While our establishment and subsequent enforcement of our short term rental ordinance wasn't done in response to sober living homes, we are using it as a tool to regulate these homes.



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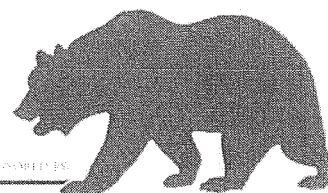

- Some of the concerns expressed by Law Enforcement are that the homeless population in the City has increased to do this industry. Although there are no hard statistics, the general consensus is that 30 to 50 percent of the homeless population is related to sober living. It is the City's belief that this increase is due to program drop out, exhaustion of medical insurance and the lack of effort from the sober living operators in returning their clients to their point of origin. This group appears to re-enter into drug culture which often leads to an increase in criminal activities to support their addiction.

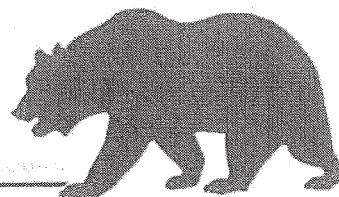

Please Specify:

- Having separation requirements between each SLH, and registration/certification process with the city to ensure each one is legal and operating properly. The process could include background checks, operating procedures, and a "good neighbor" policy.
- At the state level, amend Health & Safety Code sections 11834.20 through 11834.25 relating to alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities for 6 or fewer persons. These amendments should include allowing cities and counties the ability to impose reasonable distance requirements between facilities to avoid over concentration. Further, public entities should be allowed to impose reasonable restrictions on the number of vehicle trips (i.e., passenger vans) for purposes of picking up and dropping off residents of these facilities in residential zones.
- 4 Changes:
 - State law should be amended to allow local governments to impose reasonable distancing requirements between licensed facilities. This authority would secure the character of residential neighborhoods to the benefit of both the community and the state policy. These regulations benefit the protected class of disabled persons and therefore are permitted under the Fair Housing Act Amendments of 1988.
 - Residential neighborhoods should not be open for business. State law requires foster care facilities to be non-profit. (Health and Safety Code section 1502(a)(4).) Similarly, any alcohol or drug abuse treatment facility located in a residential zone and taking advantage of state law allowing it to operate should be restricted to non-profit enterprises. In this way, for-profit programs can operate in commercial zones, where businesses are regularly accommodated.
 - Cities should be afforded the same notice for applications for an alcohol or drug abuse treatment facility as they receive for applications for residential care facilities and a residential alcohol and drug abuse treatment facility licensure application should be subject to denial due to over-concentration in the same manner as are residential care facilities.
 - Reduce the maximum occupant size of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and residential care facilities that are deemed to be equivalent to residential uses from six persons to four persons. (See Health and Safety Code section 11834.23.)
- A separation requirement would reduce/prevent concentration of facilities, helping mitigate traffic and noise impacts.



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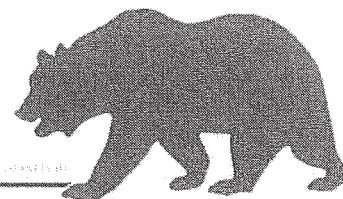


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- It would be nice if the State would regulate them like residential care facilities and require a separation requirement like those facilities so that any one neighborhood does not get overburdened with multiple facilities. Or allow us to treat them like large family daycare facilities and allow the city to pass a local ordinance regulating them.

- The City has no way to regulate sober living homes with less than six occupants any different than another residential use and operators are aware of this. Operators purposely set up homes with less than six occupants leaving the City and adjacent property owners unable to address challenges and concerns that arise. While not likely, requiring a conditional use permit to operate a sober living home regardless of the occupancy count would be beneficial in handling challenges this use presents.
- Not sure at this time.
- Allowing cities to have land use control over these uses.
- Sober living facilities are considered a form of supportive housing. Under the requirements for supportive housing, cities must allow them within all residential zones, and they must be treated no different than any other residential use. This has limited the City's ability to provide any form of regulation to minimize any identified nuisances.

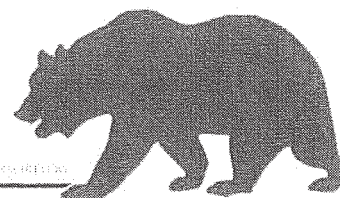

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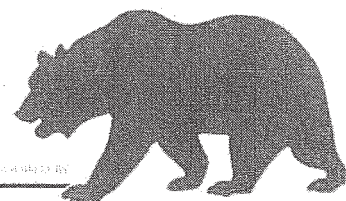

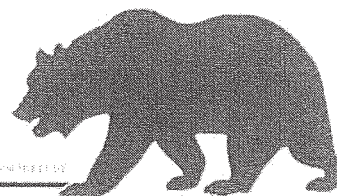

There is an overwhelming sense from the residents that such a high concentration of these homes has left them feeling unsafe.
