
#### What is RHNA?


- The Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) is a State <u>mandated process</u> used to determine housing needs throughout California.
- Coincides directly with the <u>8-year planning cycle</u> of the Housing Element. Currently in 5<sup>th</sup> RHNA Cycle and heading into 6<sup>th</sup> Cycle.
- Assigns each jurisdiction with a number of housing units that must be <u>planned</u> for during the 8-year cycle.
- Jurisdictions that fail to obtain a **certified Housing Element** are:
  - Ineligible to receive **State funding**;
  - May be subject to a <u>4-year RHNA Cycle</u>;
  - May result in the State <u>disallowing the issuance of building</u> <u>permits</u>; and
  - May be open to <u>litigation</u>.


# Who determines our RHNA allocation?

- The Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) assigns a <u>Regional Determination</u> of housing units to the various Councils of Governments (COG's) throughout the State.
- Our COG, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), develops a <u>methodology</u> to distribute the Regional Determination in an <u>equitable</u> manner.
- SCAG's proposed methodology is sent to HCD for review and, upon approval, final RHNA <u>allocations</u> are assigned.
- Jurisdictions are obligated to <u>plan</u> for the production of their RHNA allocation via the Housing Element, zoning changes, increased density, etc.

#### Current 5<sup>th</sup> Cycle RHNA Methodology (2014-21)








HQTA POPULATION 5,563 units

among OC cities





among OC cities







Disadvantaged Community units redistributed

Garden Grove is considered 48% disadvantaged

- The proposed methodology grants an Existing Need exemption to jurisdictions with <u>more than 50%</u> of their population located in low or very-low resource areas.
- Qualifying jurisdictions are known as <u>Disadvantaged</u> <u>Communities (DAC's)</u>.
- DAC's RHNA allocations are <u>capped</u> at their 2045 Household Growth projections.
- Units over a DAC's cap are known as <u>Residual Units</u> and are redistributed to non-DAC jurisdictions using the previously described Existing Need methodology (HQTA Population & Job Accessibility).
- There are five (5) DAC's in Orange County that account for <u>44,442 Residual Units</u>.
- Garden Grove receives the <u>second highest</u> number of Residual Units among the 197 SCAG jurisdictions.
