• CP1205000 Magnolia Reservoir and Booster Pump Station Rehabilitation Project (GG Project #7402) — The reservoir repairs consist of crack and joint repair, construction of seismic curb, roof waterproofing, rust spot repair, and the addition of a fall protection system. The repair work for the pump station consists of replacement of the existing engine and booster pump, replacement of the existing exhaust system, replacement of the existing catalytic converter, replacement of two 10-inch butterfly valves, replacement of the 10-inch check valve, refurbishment of the existing flow control valve, and replacement of the roof and existing removable dormer.

There have been many occasions that people went inside the trench and on top of the reservoir while construction activities were going on.

Garden Grove basketball tops Sunny Hills, adds first trip to finals to historic season

The Argonauts will host Fullerton in the Division 4AA championship game Friday night

FULLERTON – After reaching the CIF-SS Division 4AA semifinals for the first time in the school's 101 years of existence, the Garden Grove boys basketball team wanted to make more history.

Miguel Ortega scored 21 points and grabbed 14 rebounds to lead the Argonauts to a 45-39 victory over host Sunny Hills on Tuesday night.

Garden Grove (21-8) heads to its first ever CIF final and will host Fullerton on Friday, Feb. 25, at 7 p.m.

"I'm going to keep telling you guys, he is one of, if not the best player in North Orange County," Garden Grove coach Brian Girard said of Ortega. "I can always count on him to be stable. When we need something, we give him the ball. Whether it is on the outside giving someone the assist or making the buckets."

The Argonauts avenged their 67-45 loss to Sunny Hills (24-8) on Dec. 4.

Garden Grove was in trouble early in the first quarter after Ortega drew two quick fouls.

The Argonauts only trailed by two at the end of the quarter, and was down by five at halftime. Sunny Hills' Justin Shim (11 points) made a lay-up at the buzzer.

Garden Grove regrouped and took the lead, 31-28, at the end of the third quarter thanks to Landon Mendoza's seven points.

"We have to keep it a close game and finish at the end," Ortega said. "Just like the last game (against University in the quarterfinals), we kept it close and took over. We worked as a team and pounded down low."

Sunny Hills retook the lead, but Lawson fouled out of the game with 14 points and 10 rebounds. That gave Ortega the advantage in the post, which helped the Argonauts take the lead for good.

"We knew that was going to be a key factor in this game," Sunny Hills coach Joe Ok said. "Who is going to keep their big man in the game? Obviously, it is very critical with one play here and one play there where calls get made. Their guy was out for the early part of the game and our guy fouled out early. That makes a big difference.

"Credit to Garden Grove. They played great defense today. They definitely made adjustments from the last time we played them. They played real hard tonight."

Johann Kwon had 10 points for Sunny Hills, which will look to regroup and get ready for the CIF SoCal Regional next week.

Garden Grove will look to battle another Freeway League team on Friday, and it hopes make more history.

"We have to play our defense," Mendoza said. "We have to get our rebounds. We have to do what we do inside the paint and get this win."

Has OC's homeless population grown or shrunk? This week's count will tell

When several hundred homeless service workers and volunteers <u>fan out across</u> <u>Orange County next week to count</u> people living on the streets, they'll collect a wealth of data about the characteristics of the county's unhoused residents, where they are and what might help get them back on their feet.

But the bottom-line question is how many people are currently homeless in Orange County, and how that number compares to the <u>last county-wide street census in 2019</u>. Those who work with the homeless say it's a hard number to predict, especially given the mix of advances and setbacks the county has seen over the past three years.

"I don't think anybody really knows what the count is going to look like," said Father Dennis Kriz, a homeless advocate at Fullerton's St. Philip Benizi Church who allowed people to camp on church property from 2017 to 2019. "It will be sort of a reset of everything."

The "point in time" count – required every two years by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development for some grants and funding – was postponed in

<u>2021 because of the COVID-19 pandemic</u>, and a surge in omicron infections pushed it from last month to this week.

The county and its nonprofit partner City Net are overseeing the count, which begins Monday, Feb. 21, with a tally of everyone in OC's emergency shelters. From Tuesday to Thursday, employees and trained volunteers will visit "hot spots" where people are known to sleep or set up camp and also check surrounding areas.

Besides taking a head count, they'll ask people to respond to more than two dozen survey questions about whether they're employed, what ties they have to Orange County and other information. The data will take months to process and any takeaways – such as where to target programs and dollars – likely won't be available before spring.

Progress made

Orange County's 2019 count found 6,860 people considered homeless, of which more than 3,900 were on the streets (the remainder were in emergency or transitional housing).

Much has changed since then.

New <u>emergency shelters</u> have <u>opened</u>, adding nearly 1,500 beds in six cities (all in <u>north</u> or central Orange County). Four of those <u>sites</u>, known as <u>"navigation</u> <u>centers,"</u> make a point of offering counseling, case management, job placement and other services to help people find permanent homes and support themselves. More than 400 units of permanent supportive housing for the formerly homeless <u>have opened</u>, including about 125 units just for <u>military veterans</u>. And a handful of cities have launched or stepped up their street outreach services, shifting from police to <u>social workers as homeless liaisons</u> who help get people under a roof, into rehab or wherever else fits their needs.

"We've seen a lot of progress. Some of that is that COVID has created opportunities that didn't exist before, because it has released federal and state dollars for homeless interventions that didn't exist," said Matt Bates, vice president of City Net, which provides homeless services in more than a dozen OC cities and also works in Los Angeles, Riverside and Santa Barbara counties.

Admittedly, some of that progress came after <u>lawsuits advocates filed on behalf of homeless people</u>, some of whom argued they had nowhere to go when officials wanted to <u>clear them out of a camp along the Santa Ana River trail</u> near Angel Stadium.

Regardless of what may have spurred it along, some local officials are proud of what they've created to help people without a place to stay.

In Anaheim, "we've not had any major complaints from those who are around our shelters," city spokeswoman Lauren Gold said, and the "community care response

team" that addresses homeless issues has handled more than 15,000 calls in the year since it launched.

A renovated motel that was turned into permanent housing was full almost <u>as soon as it opened</u>, and the city has plans to convert another motel. Since fiscal 2018-19, the city has spent more than \$47 million on homelessness (including state and federal grants), and it will certainly spend more in coming years to create low-income and supportive housing.

"I think everybody knows that's really the key moving forward," Gold said.

Multiple setbacks

But local officials and homeless providers acknowledge there's plenty more work to do.

Kristina Silwal, who lives in a gated complex in Stanton near Beach and Garden Grove boulevards, endured weeks of frustration when a tent encampment sprouted alongside the nearby 5 freeway offramp. Silawal said residents noted an increase in petty thefts, car break-ins and people loitering behind a couple of old motels.

The spot is where the borders of several cities meet, and Silwal said when she complained, it felt like the issue was being putted between neighbors.

About a week ago, several agencies joined together to clear the camp out, but Silwal and her neighbors are "just really tired of it," she said.

Also, while the pandemic helped create new funding streams to help the homeless, it put more families in financial peril and it forced emergency shelters to <u>reduce</u> <u>capacity</u> to avoid spreading the virus to vulnerable clients – so some new shelter beds that could have been filled went empty.

And a fundamental cause of homelessness, the lack of available or affordable housing, hasn't improved. Vacancies are <u>at lows not seen in two decades</u>, and rents – after stalling or dropping for some of the pandemic – are back on the rise. Kriz said at some emergency shelters, after 90 days (or whatever the maximum stay is) people end up back on the street because there's nowhere else for them to go. And while OC Director of Care Coordination Doug Becht touted another 1,000 housing vouchers recently awarded to OC's four housing agencies, Bates said he's seen clients who already have vouchers unable find anyone to rent to them.

"There's new people surfacing all the time that are falling into homelessness" because of broader economic forces, Bates said.

"We're bailing water out of the boat on one side, but there's a leak somewhere else," he said, "you've gotta bail water and you've gotta plug the hole."

More work to do

Whatever next week's count shows – Bates is guessing it may be around 10% higher or lower than in 2019; Becht said the number in shelters is certainly greater, and the number of people on the streets might be too – homeless providers hope to build on the successes of the past three years.

Now there are plenty of emergency beds, but there's a lack of permanent homes for people getting out of shelters, Bates said. However, "just the reality that we've moved that bottleneck from the streets to the shelters is good in and of itself – it's more humane."

Becht said for the past three years, the county and its partners have focused on "building our infrastructure here and having an even approach to homelessness" that includes temporary and permanent shelter and an array of services.

The county made several applications to the state for motel conversion projects, and it will likely get millions more in a third round of grants to assist people in finding a home or staying in the one they've got.

Kriz, who advocates for a <u>"safe parking" program</u> for people who sleep in their cars, said he'd like to see more interest around the region beyond the pilot program Fullerton tried.

A secured parking place for overnight stays is relatively cheap to implement and, by keeping people from getting tickets for illegal parking and potentially losing their car, it could help prevent more street homelessness, he said.

Kriz keeps a monthly tally of deaths among the homeless, and he doesn't want to see another year like 2021, when <u>a record 382 Orange County residents died with no permanent home</u>. He also hopes more of the community will get behind long-term solutions.

"I just continue to say, whatever you're afraid of with the homeless, is it better that they're on the streets?"

With 3 OC supervisor seats up in June, candidates now can enter races

A majority of Orange County voters will get to choose their county supervisors in June, and they're soon going to find out who will be on the ballot.

The filing period opened this week for candidates seeking seats in the newly drawn Districts 2, 4 and 5, and whoever wants to be on the June 7 primary ballot has until March 11 to turn in paperwork to the Orange County Registrar of Voters.

A combination of recent redistricting (which changed district boundaries), and term limits for supervisors, has created a rare situation – two supervisor seats that are essentially wide open.

Supervisor Katrina Foley won a special election last year in the old District 2. But the new version of that seat doesn't include Costa Mesa, where she lives. So, to stay on the board, she's hoping to win in the newly drawn District 5, where Supervisor Lisa Bartlett is ineligible for reelection due to term limits.

While the District 5 race is expected to be highly contested, Foley's move leaves the new District 2 – OC's first-ever Latino majority voting district – up for grabs. At the same time, the new District 4, where current Supervisor Doug Chaffee is running again with a self-funded war chest of about \$300,000, is expected to draw several opponents.

"I can't remember the last time we had two open supervisor seats at the same time," said Democratic political consultant George Urch.

While county supervisor seats technically are nonpartisan, the Republican and Democratic parties in Orange County back candidates and grapple for control of the five-member board. For decades, the battle was something of a David vs. Goliath fight. Until 2019, voter registration numbers showed the GOP with an advantage over Democrats in Orange County – and the GOP held a virtual lock on county supervisor seats. Some critics said the redistricting of 2011 was shaped to help the GOP hold that advantage.

This time around, the landscape is different. Orange County voter registration data now shows Democrats with a small but growing advantage over Republicans. And this year's board, with two of the five supervisors (Foley and Chaffee) Democrats, crafted new districts that show Republicans holding slim registration advantages in Districts 1, 3 and 5, and Democrats with bigger advantages in Districts 2 and 4, according to Political Data Inc., a company that tracks voter registration throughout California.

"I think the redistricting maps came out fair," said Republican consultant Lou Penrose. "They're fair fights."

While the Democrat advantage in District 2 appears the biggest in the county – with the party preferred by 48.1% of registered voters vs. 22.5% who are registered with the GOP – Penrose suggests party affiliation won't necessarily be the determining factor.

"I would encourage a Republican candidate to run hard in any of them," Penrose said of the supervisor seats.

Santa Ana Mayor Vicente Sarmiento and Garden Grove Councilwoman Kim Bernice Nguyen (both Democrats) have announced they're running in District 2, which includes all of Santa Ana and portions of Anaheim, Garden Grove, Orange and Tustin.

In District 4 – which covers northern Orange County, including west Anaheim, Fullerton and Placentia – Chaffee will have to contend with at least one other Democrat, Buena Park Councilwoman Sunny Park, and there's plenty of time for other candidates to jump in. Democrats in the district hold a roughly 12 point registration advantage over the GOP – 41.9% to 29.3% – according to Political Data Inc.

In District 5, where the GOP advantage over Democrats is slight, 37.4% to 33.4%, the race could get crowded.

Foley is expected to face several Republican opponents, including Diane Harkey, who has held local and state offices, and state Senator Pat Bates, who is also a former county supervisor. Several people who planned to run before the district lines changed still have open campaign accounts, and Urch said he wouldn't be surprised if a couple more candidates actually file to get on the ballot.

Penrose considers the reconfigured District 5 a powerful seat because it brings together the county's key revenue-generating assets, John Wayne Airport and Dana Point Harbor, and it also includes the (state-owned) OC Fair & Events Center and (city-owned) Newport Harbor

While Penrose thinks voters' concerns about crime and quality of life issues could drive them to support GOP candidates (he's backing Harkey in District 5), Urch sees a chance for Democrats to pick up a third seat and take the board majority for the first time in decades.

One challenge for everybody running for supervisor may be getting the public to notice them.

Most of the state-level races on the June 7 ballot are incumbents seeking reelection, and there will be no statewide initiatives — something Urch suggested voters could find boring.

"Everybody's going to be scrambling for limited campaign dollars and attention for their campaigns," he said.

Potential candidates for OC supervisors seats in District 2, 4 and 5 have until March 11 to file paperwork to get on the June ballot. If any race has more than two candidates and no one receives at least 50% plus one vote, the top two vote getters will face off again in a two-person runoff in November.

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As California's drought worsens, state grants for drought projects are a relief

Feb 23, 2022

Despite recent snowfall, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation confirmed that California's drought is worsening and that weeks of dry weather wiped out many of the gains recorded during the rainy and snowy December. In the first two weeks of February, major reservoirs such as Shasta, Folsom, and Oroville lost an estimated 1.2 million acre-feet of inflow.

This is a timely reminder for cities that preparing for drought conditions is necessary, and for cities looking for funding for drought-related projects, the task just got easier. Information about the state's drought relief and water conservation measures, including drought assistance programs
(https://drought.ca.gov/drought-assistance/), can be found at California Drought
Action (https://drought.ca.gov/). Several funding opportunities, many of them funded by last year's budget, are still available.

- The Urban and Multibenefit Drought Relief Funding supports drought relief projects that impact health and human safety, impact fish and wildlife, or restore water to those threatened with water loss or contamination. The California Department of Water Resources is currently accepting applications for projects that affect underrepresented communities.
- The Small Community Drought Relief Program helps communities that are not served by an urban water supplier — one that supplies at least 3,000 connections or 3,000 acre-feet of water per year. Applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis until all funds are awarded, or until Dec. 29, 2023, whichever comes first.

 The Cleanup and Abatement Account Funding Program supports various projects throughout the year, such as water infrastructure repair or water delivery, that benefit disadvantaged communities.

The website also contains information about regulatory changes, assistance programs for families and farmers, current water conditions, and links to other resources. The website will be updated as more information becomes available.

Additionally, the California Department of Water Resources launched a statewide water condition dashboard (https://cww.water.ca.gov/). The new website tracks local water conditions, such as reservoirs, snowpack, and vegetation stress, in real-time. The dashboard also allows users to compare data by year and region. The tracker can be used when planning for water conservation, hazard mitigation, and other drought-related projects.

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
