FY 2021-2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

#### **OBJECTIVE**

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a summary of the activities that the Office of Economic Development implemented through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of Fiscal Year 2021-2022 (FY 21-22).

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Office of Economic Development is tasked with identifying housing and community developments needs that can be addressed through federal funding sources, including Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG). This is done through the implementation of various programs and services designed to improve Garden Grove neighborhoods and quality of life.

#### **DISCUSSION**

In FY 21-22, the Office of Economic Development funded various programs and activities previously identified as priority goals and objectives in the 5-Year Consolidated Plan. Provided is a brief summary of activities conducted.

Through the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter of FY 2021-22, the City utilized Federal funding to expand or preserve affordable housing opportunities, improve low-income neighborhoods through public infrastructure improvements, and assist special needs groups such as senior citizens, homeless, and those who are 'at-risk' of becoming homeless. Please see below for the City's FY 2021-22 accomplishments through the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter:

#### **CDBG, ESG, & HOME Accomplishments**

- Provided 195 home delivered and/or congregate meals to Garden Grove seniors;
- Provided rental assistance via the Valley View Senior Villas Program and the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rental Transition Program to 51 homeless or 'at-risk' of becoming homeless households;
- Provided homeless services to 97 individuals;
- Assisted **14** low-income residents with Home Improvement Grants:

- Assisted 1,453 low-income residents with various public and community services through our Community Senior Center, Special Resources Team (SRT), and partnership with the Fair Housing Foundation;
- Provided community outreach and education to nearly 7,044 individuals.

The FY 2019-20 AAP was amended to include Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding that was awarded to the City by HUD in April 2020. Through the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter of FY 2021-22, the City expended an additional **\$3,145,086** in CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funding in FY 2021-22 to develop and expand programs in response to the Coronavirus. Please see below for the City's CDBG-CV and ESG-CV accomplishments for FY 2021-22:

#### **CDBG-CV Accomplishments**

- Created and/or retained 62 jobs through the JOBS 1st Program during FY 2021-22; and
- Provided **32** individuals with workforce development services through the Workforce Activation and Readiness Program (WARP).
- Assisted **122 individuals** with workforce development services and mentorship through the Innovation Collective Studio.
- The Be-Well Mobile Response Team responded to **708 calls** for mental health and emergency services, which resulted in **400 hours** spent on calls. The team was able to transport **116 clients** to services and support.

#### **ESG-CV** Accomplishments

- Provided 235 homeless individuals with street outreach, homeless prevention, and emergency shelter services; and
- Provided **107** households with rapid rehousing services.

PROGRAM UPDATE

#### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide information regarding the Meals on Wheels Orange County Grab & Go drive-up senior meal distribution program transition to a walk-up only option beginning Tuesday, June 7, 2022.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The H. Louis Lake Senior Center in partnership with Meals on Wheels Orange County (MOWOC), has been providing a frozen meal Grab & Go drive up program every Tuesday for the last two years, serving an average of 250 seniors each week. The program was implemented in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to temporarily replace the in-person congregate lunch program due to stay at home orders and community facilities shutting down. The Grab & Go drive-up program has provided senior participants the ability to pick up meals from the Senior Center with the option to drive up or walk up.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The City was recently notified that MOWOC will be reducing their capacity to provide meals for this program due to a reduction in program funding. Meals will be reduced from six (6) frozen meals per senior to four (4) meals per senior each week effective June 7, 2022. With this change in meals as well as the reopening of all City programs and facilities, staff will be phasing out the drive up option that will also become effective on June 7, 2022. In order to better manage this program, this change will reduce the impact on staff time and resources, while still ensuring senior participants have access to food.

Along with the transition to a walk-up option, staff are also working with MOWOC to bring back the in-person congregate meal program this summer, which will initially be offered two days a week, with the goal to eventually provide this program four to five days a week. These program changes will provide senior participants with a balanced diet and nutrition, as well as offer the vital social component that is needed to provide a safe and nurturing environment for our senior community.

#### **SUMMARY**



# **CITY OF GARDEN GROVE HIGHLIGHTS**

Garden Grove's receipts from October through December were 24.3% above the fourth sales period in 2020. Excluding reporting aberrations, actual sales were up 18.8%.

Most business types within the restaurants and hotels industry have now fully recovered. As a result, strong returns were realized from casual, hotels-liquor, and quick-service restaurants. The fuel and service stations sector continues to experience upward pressure on sales tax.

The City experienced a rebound in its largest sector, general consumer goods, and most business types were higher including family apparel and specialty stores. Receipts from new motor vehicle dealers, plumbing/electrical, light and heavy industrial/printers, and grocery stores were also up.

Returns from the state and county pools decreased, which partially offset the overall gain.

The City's Transaction and Use Tax Measure O generated 99.1% of the Bradley Burns, led by solid performance from business and industry. Net of aberrations, taxable sales for all of Orange County grew 15.3% over the comparable time period; the Southern California region was up 17.4%.

# STATEWIDE RESULTS

California's local one cent sales and use tax receipts for sales during the months of October through December were 15% higher than the same quarter one year ago after adjusting for accounting anomalies. A holiday shopping quarter, the most consequential sales period of the year, and the strong result was a boon to local agencies across the State. Consumers spent freely as the economy continued its rebound from the pandemic and as robust labor demand reduced unemployment and drove up wages.


Brick and mortar retailers did exceptionally well as many shoppers returned to physical stores rather than shopping online as the COVID crisis waned. This was especially true for traditional department stores that have long been among the weakest categories in retail. Discount department stores, particularly those selling gas, family and women's apparel and jewelry merchants also experienced strong sales. Many retailers are now generating revenue that is nearly as much, or even higher, than pre-pandemic levels.

Sales by new and used car dealers were also much higher than a year ago. The inventory shortage has resulted in higher prices that have more than offset the decline in unit volume in terms of revenue generation for most dealerships. Restaurants and hotels were only moderately lower than last quarter, with both periods being the highest in the State's history. Increased menu prices coupled with robust demand to dine out are largely responsible for these gains. These are impressive results for a sector that does not yet include the positive impact that will occur later this year as international travel steadily increases at major airports. Conference business, an important revenue component for many hotels, is also still in the early stages of recovery.

Building material suppliers and contractors were steady as growing residential and commercial property values boosted demand, particularly in the Southern California, Sacramento and San Joaquin Valley regions. Although anticipated interest rate increases by the Federal Reserve could dampen the short-term outlook for this sector, industry experts believe limited selling activity will inspire increased upgrades and improvements by existing owners. With demand remaining tight and calls for more affordable housing throughout the state, the long-term outlook remains positive.

The fourth quarter, the final sales period of calendar year 2021, exhibited a 20% rebound

in tax receipts compared to calendar year 2020. General consumer goods, restaurants. fuel and auto-transportation industries were the largest contributors to this improvement. However, the future growth rate for statewide sales tax revenue is expected to slow markedly. Retail activity has now moved past the easy year-over-year comparison quarters in 2021 versus the depths of the pandemic bottom the year before. Additional headwinds going into 2022 include surging inflation, a dramatic jump in the global price of crude oil due to Russia's war in Ukraine and corresponding monetary tightening by the Federal Reserve. This is expected to result in weakening consumer sentiment and continued, but decelerating, sales tax growth into 2023.

# NOTICE OF APPLICATION SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON'S REQUEST TO INCREASE ELECTRIC RATES APPLICATION A.21-07-009

# Why am I receiving this notice?

On May 3, 2022, Southern California Edison served its direct testimony for the second phase (Track 2) of its July 22, 2021 application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) for authorization to recover costs related to the Customer Service Re-Platform (CSRP) project. The CSRP project delivers a new billing and customer service system that performs functions such as customer billing and payment processing, credit and collections, and customer account management.

The first phase (Track 1) of this application concerned CSRP costs through April 2021. The second phase (Track 2) of this application will concern CSRP costs after April 2021. In this second phase (Track 2), SCE is requesting approximately \$65.0 million in customer rates.

# Why is SCE requesting this rate increase?

- In 2017, SCE formally launched its CSRP project to replace SCE's legacy Customer Service System with a new billing and customer service system.
- In April 2021, SCE successfully implemented the new billing and customer service system.
- The new billing and customer service system delivered by the CSRP project is more reliable than the legacy system, enables quicker and more efficient customer rate changes, and allows SCE to respond to new regulatory requirements more quickly and effectively.
- The first phase (Track 1) of SCE's application focused on SCE's requests to recover costs incurred through April 2021 to design, build, and deploy the new billing and customer service system.
- The second phase (Track 2) of SCE's application now focuses on SCE's requests to recover costs incurred after April 2021 to stabilize the new billing and customer service system and to provide on-going system support and maintenance.

# How could this affect my monthly electric rates?

In 2023, if SCE's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 500 kWh per month would increase by approximately \$0.48 or 0.3% per month for Non-CARE customers and by approximately \$0.32 or 0.3% for CARE customers.

In 2024, if SCE's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 500 kWh per month would increase by approximately \$0.14 or 0.1% per month for Non-CARE customers and by approximately \$0.10 or 0.1% for CARE customers.

#### How does the rest of this process work?

This application was previously assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt the Track 2 requests associated with SCE's application, modify them, or deny them. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.

Parties to the proceeding are currently reviewing the Track 2 testimony associated with SCE's application, including the Public Advocates Office. The Public Advocates Office is an independent consumer advocate within the CPUC that represents customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. 



# Elections 2022: Meet the candidates in the open 70th Assembly District race

The new district would be a key voice for Vietnamese in Orange County.

Five Republicans and one Democrat are vying for the highly competitive 70th Assembly District seat in the June 7 primary, seeking to represent Little Saigon and a chunk of central Orange County.

Assemblywoman Janet Nguyen, a Republican, is now running for a state Senate seat after representing AD-72, the district closest to the newly created 70th. That has opened the door for three city council members, one mayor, a city commissioner and a consultant for non-profits to vie for the open spot.

### Here are the candidates

- Ted Bui, 51, a businessman and Fountain Valley councilman since 2020;
- Jason Gray, 37, a Westminster city commissioner who has worked in the mortgage business and unsuccessfully ran for City Council in 2018;
- Emily Hibard, 41, a businesswoman in Los Alamitos who has authored three books to help people start their own non-profits;
- Kimberly Ho, 58, a Westminster councilwoman since 2016 and owner of a skin care products company;
- Diedre Nguyen, 46, a Garden Grove councilwoman since 2016 and a cancer research scientist; and

- Tri Ta, 49, who was first elected to the Westminster city council in 2006 and has served as its mayor since 2012, when he became the first Vietnamese American elected mayor in the nation.

All are Republicans except for Diedre Nguyen, a Democrat, in a district where voter registration data shows Democrats with a 4 point advantage over Republicans.

The two candidates who receive the most votes in the primary will move on to the November election.

The district includes Westminster, Garden Grove, Fountain Valley, Los Alamitos, Stanton and Rossmoor, plus parts of Santa Ana and Huntington Beach. It was redrawn late last year, based on 2020 U.S. Census data with a specific goal of ensuring much of the county's Vietnamese community could be clustered together and retain political clout.

Nearly 40% of voters in the district are Asian, with Vietnamese-Americans comprising the largest segment of that population, according to Political Data Inc. About half of the voters, 52%, were born in the United States.

The more prominent candidates are all Vietnamese Americans. The candidates collectively have raised more than \$1 million for what's considered a highly competitive race.

Ho was leading in contributions with \$400,615 as of late last month, with \$207,678 in hand after expenses, according to recent campaign finance filings with the California Secretary of State. Bui raised more than \$227,000 and had about \$109,000. Nguyen netted \$167,164 in contributions and had \$159,524 after expenses. Ta raised over \$205,000 and had a balance of \$121,517, and Hibard raised over \$25,000 and had \$19,643 on hand.

There were no finance reports for Gray, who also doesn't appear to have a campaign website.

The Republican Party of Orange County has not endorsed any of its five GOP members running in the 70th Assembly race.

The Democratic Party of Orange County has thrown its support behind Nguyen, 46, who has served on the Garden Grove city council since 2016 and is a cancer research scientist. Before the redistricting, Diedre Nguyen ran in 2020 in the 72nd Assembly District race and lost to Janet Nguyen by 8.4 percentage points.

In response to a questionnaire sent by the Register, candidates offered their views on topics that ranged from abortion and gay rights to the state's housing needs and climate policies. Ta, Westminster's mayor, did not reply despite repeated requests.

As the U.S. Supreme Court is poised to overturn Roe v. Wade on abortion rights, abortion has quickly risen as a key concern for voters in California and across the country.

California Gov. Gavin Newsom and legislative leaders want to make the state a sanctuary for women denied abortions in other states. They plan to ask voters to consider a state constitutional amendment to protect abortion rights.

Nguyen was the only candidate to describe herself as "pro-choice," saying she supports "a woman's constitutional right to govern her own body."

Bui said he was "pro-life" except in the case of rape and incest. Ho and Hibard also described themselves as "pro-life." Gray wrote: "We cannot play God and take away life. This is a precious thing."

The pending Supreme Court abortion ruling, leaked last week but not yet final, has raised concerns whether watering down gay marriage protections is next. Democrats at both the state and federal levels are considering plans to codify LGBT marriage equality into law.

In the questionnaire, which was completed before the Supreme Court leak, the 70th Assembly District candidates who replied are split on whether they support the legality of gay marriage. Hibard opposes it while Gray and Nguyen support it. Bui and Ho did not answer the question.

They also varied on their support for COVID-19 mandates regarding vaccines and other government policies. Bui, Gray and Nguyen support limited mandates. Ho and Hibard don't want to see any mandates.

Housing is a key issue in California, where state leaders are pushing every city to increase residential construction and nearly every city is behind and faces potential penalties.

Bui, Gray and Nguyen said that when it comes to building new homes, California should make it easier to build. Ho said the state should make it harder. Hibard did not answer the question.

Regarding how California is addressing climate change, Gray and Nguyen said that the state should be slightly more aggressive while Ho and Hibard said it should be less aggressive. Bui said he's good with California polices remaining as they are now.

In other matters, none of the candidates support single payer health care in California. And Nguyen is the only candidate to support California's sanctuary laws for undocumented immigrants and a ban on offshore oil drilling.

The candidates, asked to rank their political ideology on a scale of one to 10, with 1 being far left, 5 being centrist and 10 being far right, said this: Nguyen described herself as a four, Bui and Ho rated themselves as eight and Hibard wrote she's a 10 on the scale. Gray did not answer.

Two of the candidates – Ta and Ho – were once allies on the Westminster City Council but have more recently become adversaries.

## Garden Grove attempted murder suspect found in Menifee, leads police on chase to Bloomington

PUBLISHED: May 7, 2022 at 7:19 p.m. | UPDATED: May 7, 2022 at 9:27 p.m. A man led police on a chase after a shooting Saturday at a Garden Grove residence left another man in critical condition, officials said.

Garden Grove police officers found a man with a gunshot wound to the head in a bedroom at the 5300 block of Santa Barbara Avenue just before 3 a.m.

The man, whose name was not released by authorities, was hospitalized in critical condition Saturday evening.

After investigators spoke with witnesses at the residence, Ali Samoodi, 51, Anaheim, was identified as a suspect. Detectives believe Samoodi and the victim were in a relationship. Samoodi was staying with the victim at the residence, but not living there, Lt. Mario Martinez with the Garden Grove Police Department said.

Samoodi rented a U-Haul and fled the scene after the shooting, a news release from the Garden Grove Police Department said.

The vehicle was tracked to Menifee where police attempted to make a traffic stop, but a pursuit ensued. The high-speed pursuit lasted about 33 miles and stopped in the area of the 10 Freeway and Cedar Avenue in the Bloomington area after Samoodi's U-Haul was involved in multiple collisions and no longer worked.

Riverside County Sheriff's Department SWAT officers took Samoodi into custody after he barricaded himself and refused to come out, police said. He was taken to the Garden Grove Police Department, which booked him into the Orange County Jail on suspicion of attempted murder.

The investigation was ongoing.

# City leaders call on state to allocate \$1.6 billion dollars in 2022-23 budget for new housing program, organic waste recycling, and unfunded mandates

**Sacramento -** City officials from around the state gathered outside the Capitol Wednesday morning to urge lawmakers to draw on the state's estimated \$68 billion budget surplus to allocate \$1.6 billion for programs that achieve shared local and state government goals, as well as reimburse cities for unfunded mandates

The League of California Cities organized the news conference with close to a hundred city leaders to outline what local governments need from the state to make real progress in the areas of housing supply and greenhouse gas reduction, as well as call attention to the state's unpaid obligations owed to local governments for state-mandated programs.

"The state's historic surplus of close to \$70 billion dollars provides lawmakers with an incredible opportunity to be a true partner to cities in advancing our

shared goals towards housing and climate resiliency," said **Cal Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman**. "And the surplus leaves the Governor and Legislature no excuse to delay paying the nearly \$1 billion dollars it owes local governments for costs related to state mandates."

Housing supply and affordability are two of the most critical issues facing Californians today, yet there is no longer a dedicated state funding source to help stimulate housing production and address important infrastructure needs that come with new developments. Existing tools, while helpful, lack sufficient financial capacity to match the scale of the need.

This is why cities are urging the Governor and lawmakers to allocate \$500 million to create the "Housing and Economic Development Program," (/docs/default-source/advocacy/budget-letter/hedp-budget-request-and-program-overview\_legislature.pdf?sfvrsn=ea1fd43b\_3&id=ad485199-37cd-42cd-8217-d19b4d257119&session=21&s=Ab+14&t=bill) a state-local partnership to help finance housing production, incentivize development, and achieve real progress toward housing production goals.

The program would encourage partnerships between the state and local agencies by providing matching funds to cities that adopt local tax increment financing tools to support affordable housing, upgrade essential infrastructure, and spur economic development.

"A strong state-local partnership would propel significant investments in housing production and public infrastructure," said **Cal Cities President and Walnut Creek Mayor Pro Tem Cindy Silva.** "Those investments would in turn drive economic development, job creation, and go a long way in helping to prevent low-income earners from falling into homelessness."

Cities are also requesting that some of the surplus go toward reimbursing cities for costs related to state mandates (/docs/default-source/advocacy/budget-

<u>letter/state-mandate-reimbursement-budget-request.pdf?sfvrsn=ee6eed9\_3)</u> that have gone unpaid over the past two decades.

### According to data from the California State Controller's office

(https://www.sco.ca.gov/ard\_mancost\_deficiency.html), as of Oct. 1, 2021, the state owes more than \$933.5 million to cities, counties, and special districts for costs related to state mandates incurred after 2004. The money owed to cities stems from years of unpaid reimbursement claims filed by local governments for the cost of implementing dozens of mandated programs approved by state lawmakers. Of that amount, \$466.6 million is owed to cities.

"A strong city budget creates strong, resilient communities," **said Long Beach Council Member Roberto Uranga**. "We hope the Governor and Legislature will use some of this extraordinary surplus to reimburse cities the money they are due so we can continue to pay for and provide our communities with the services they count on."

Cities are also calling on the state to <u>include funding for organic waste</u> <u>recycling</u> (/docs/default-source/advocacy/budget-letter/2022-coalition-organic-waste-development-and-implementation-budget-request-3.15.22.pdf?sfvrsn=7a65f0c6\_3) in the 2022-23 State Budget.

Cities are a key partner with the state to achieving our shared solid waste management and recycling goals, which would contribute to the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. To that end, cities urge the inclusion of \$180 million in the 2022-23 State Budget to help cities develop and implement organic waste recycling programs as mandated in SB 1383 (Lara, 2016).

The funding would help support the costs associated with waste collection, education, outreach, edible food recovery, procurement activities, and capacity planning.

"This critical funding will not only help local governments comply with the state law as it pertains to organic waste recycling," **said El Cerrito Mayor Gabriel Quinto**, "but it will also minimize the financial burden that the cost of implementing these regulations could have on residents."

In a Cal Cities-conducted survey (/docs/default-source/advocacy/cal-cities-waste-rate-survey-infographic-feb-2021-(final).pdf?sfvrsn=e9867676\_1) in December 2020, 92% of cities indicated that rates will go up in the next three years in order to implement SB 1383 regulations and successfully get their recycling programs up and running.

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
