SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GAS COMPANY NOTIFICATION OF REQUEST TO RECOVER COSTS RECORDED IN THE TRANSMISSION INTEGRITY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM BALANCING ACCOUNT A.25-04-020

Why am I receiving this notice?

On April 30, 2025, Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas) filed an application (A.25-04-020) with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to recover costs recorded in the Transmission Integrity Management Program Balancing Account (Application). The Application seeks to recover a total revenue under-collection of \$173.8 million.

Why is SoCalGas requesting this rate increase?

This Application will cover the implementation of the Transmission Integrity Management Program (TIMP), and recovery of related costs recorded in the TIMP Balancing Account (TIMPBA) from 2019-2023. TIMP is a comprehensive program that performs prescriptive assessments on natural gas transmission pipelines as required by federal regulations, including the new federal regulations that were enacted over the 2019-2023 timeframe.

The CPUC approved the TIMP with approximately \$538.9 million of authorized expenditures for the years 2019-2023. SoCalGas is requesting recovery of \$173.8 million in under-collected revenue, for additional expenditures totaling \$310 million that were incurred above authorized levels for the period of October 1, 2022, through December 31, 2023.

How could this affect my monthly gas bill?

If SoCalGas's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 36 therms per month would increase by approximately \$0.86 or 1.2% per month over a 12-month period, or until the costs are recovered. The proposed average transportation rates shown below are for 2026.

How does the rest of this process work?

This Application will be assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt SoCalGas's application, modify it, or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.

Why am I receiving this notice?

On April 30, 2025, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), proposing to finance up to \$1.627 billion in recovery bonds for approved claims costs related to the 2017 Thomas Fire and 2018 Montecito Debris Flow (Application 25-04-021). SCE intends to recover this amount in electric rates over a 35-year period, beginning in late 2025. This will increase your monthly bill.

Why is SCE requesting this rate increase?

Senate Bill (SB) 901, which was signed into law on September 21, 2018, provides the CPUC with authorization to permit recovery, including through issuance of recovery bonds, of 2017 catastrophic wildfire costs and expenses, including for costs related to the 2017 Thomas Fire and 2018 Montecito Debris Flow.

The CPUC has already found that SCE is allowed to recover some of the claims costs that it incurred related to the 2017 Thomas Fire and 2018 Montecito Debris Flow. With this application, SCE is seeking to finance those approved claims costs through the issuance of recovery bonds over 35 years. If the CPUC approves this application and allows SCE to finance these approved claims costs with recovery bonds, it will result in a lower rate increase to customers, when compared to traditional utility financing.

How could this affect my monthly electric rates?

If SCE's proposed rate increase is approved, an average residential electric customer using 500 kWh per month would see a bill increase of \$1.10 per month (0.6%), from \$36.72 to \$36.94. CARE customers will not see an increase in rates.¹

The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt, modify, or deny SCE's application. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.



A grant worth \$18 million has been awarded to the Garden Grove Unified School District to expand its "Community Schools" program.

Bill Talk: Sacramento in suspense

May 14, 2025

A weekly update from Cal Cities, sorting through the state bill buzz

Lawmakers have until May 16 to get their bills through their first set of policy committee hearings. But all eyes were on today, when Gov. Gavin Newsom dropped his revised budget. Early reporting suggested it was not going to be a pretty one. Per *Politico* on Monday, the state is looking at a \$10 to \$20 billion budget haircut due to federal tariff policies, a Medi-Cal shortfall, and delayed tax filings.

That's not counting any federal spending cuts that will arrive long after the Legislature approves the final budget. "We're going to be trying to pass a shell of a budget," one anonymous lawmaker told the outlet. "They're just fake numbers, because we just don't know." Those predictions proved to be true, as Cal Cities lobbyists noted in their analysis of the May Revision. (The budget accounts for a \$12 billion shortfall.)

All signs point to next week being equally bloody. That's when the powerful appropriations committees will meet to determine the fate of hundreds of bills on the suspense file. Those deemed too fiscally hefty will fail to advance. In fact, many of the measures in this week's Bill Talk are likely candidates for the suspense file. Strong city advocacy will be critical to getting many of these measures off the suspense file and onto their next legislative milestone. Legislators need to cull a lot of bills this year. The only question is, will they do it themselves — or will they let the second house do it later this year?

Encampment measure, sponsored recovery housing legislation set for hearings

Cal Cities is urging the Senate Appropriations Committee to revise a measure that would create additional reporting mandates for all but 14 cities. SB 16 (Blakespear) would require cities that do not receive HHAP funding to provide new data on homelessness in their housing elements. Cal Cities opposes the measure unless amended and is requesting changes that would include smaller cities in an existing regional planning process. This would accomplish the same goal — allowing transparency on the same system metrics that SB 16 includes — but through the same regional process already used by California's largest cities.

The committee placed SB 16 on the suspense file, along with SB 35 (Umberg). The bill would implement recommendations from a recent state audit urging more timely and thorough investigations of unlicensed facilities accused of violating state licensure law. If the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) fails to meet these deadlines, counties could conduct site visits and enforce licensure laws.

The Senate Appropriations Committee also approved AB 424 (Davies) today. The bill would require DHCS to notify individuals when their complaint has been received, when the investigation concludes, and the outcome of the investigation. Currently, complainants do not receive updates and must file a public records request to learn the outcome of their complaint. By improving communication, AB 424 would help cities stay informed and support a more transparent oversight process.

Sponsored housing element reform faces its final policy committee in the Assembly

The Assembly Appropriations Committee will likely place AB 650 (Papan) on the suspense file next week. The measure would allow cities to begin their housing elements six months earlier than existing law and require the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) to provide detailed feedback when responding to housing element drafts. This would give local agencies a clear understanding of how they can get their housing elements certified and approved by HCD on time and in compliance with state law.

Both the Assembly housing and local government committees approved AB 650 with unanimous, bipartisan support. City officials should reach out directly to Assembly Appropriations Committee members and urge them to approve the measure, which is currently on suspense.

Calderon's wildfire bills make strides towards the Senate

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reviewed two wildfire bills by Asm. Lisa Calderon on May 14 — including the Cal Cities-sponsored AB 888 (Calderon). The bill, now on the suspense file, would create a grant program to fund wildfire prevention efforts, such as roof replacements or defensible space, by establishing an account within the state Insurance Fund. The Legislature would make the funds available upon appropriation, and the Department of Insurance would need to provide biennial performance reports to lawmakers starting in 2027. AB 75 (Calderon) would require insurers to notify residential property policyholders that aerial images will be taken of their property. The measure prohibits insurers from cancelling policies based on images of the property that are older than 45 days before sending notice to the policyholder. The policyholder must also receive these images and have an opportunity to remedy any issues.

Sea level planning bill up for consideration

A bill sponsored by Cal Cities that would make it easier for cities to develop mandated sea level rise plans was reviewed in the Assembly Appropriations Committee on Wednesday. AB 996 (Pellerin) would create a fund in the state treasury to support the development of sea level rise plans. Additionally, AB 966 would allow cities to engage the California Coastal Commission early about new or amended local coastal plans to ensure a complete and timely formal review. The bill also clarifies that existing sea level rise information or plans may meet one or all the components of the mandated sea level rise plans.

Coastal and bay cities are encouraged to weigh in with support. Sample letters are available on Cal Cities' bill webpage. The bill is currently on the Assembly Appropriation Committee's suspense file.

Towing ban back again, metal theft bill set for hearing

The Assembly Appropriations heard several key bills on May 14, including AB 476 (González, Mark). The Cal Cities-sponsored measure would deter stealing metal used in public utility infrastructure by increasing the criminal fines that may be imposed for the unlawful sale or possession of stolen public agency materials. The bill is currently on the Assembly Appropriation Committee's suspense file.

Legislators also reviewed AB 1022 (Kalra). Previous iterations have been stopped by Cal Cities in appropriations before. This bill would prohibit the towing or immobilizing of vehicles that have accrued five or more unpaid parking citations. Specifically, AB 1022 would:

• Eliminate the option for parking enforcement to immobilize or tow an out-of-state vehicle.

- Remove the ability for agencies to rightfully obtain a warrant to perform a tow.
- Reward bad behavior for those who purposely ignore tickets without any repercussions, regardless of income levels.

By severely limiting cities' ability to enforce parking regulations, this legislation would cause a cascade of fiscal damage: lost revenue, increased administrative costs, clogged courtrooms, decreased compliance, harm to local businesses, public safety risks, and overall reduced effectiveness of municipal government operations.

Costly public employees' retirement benefits legislation heads to its first fiscal committee

The Assembly Appropriations Committee heard AB 1383 (McKinnor) on May 14, where legislators moved it to the committee's suspense file. The bill would make several changes to public employee retirement benefits that would undo pension reform and lead to cost increases for cities. Specifically, it would:

- Increase the pensionable compensation cap for certain employees.
- Reduce the retirement age for public safety from 57 to 55 prospectively.
- Add a fourth safety tier that is 3% at 55 years old, prospective and subject to bargaining.
- Allow local agencies to adjust their local formula in a prospective manner.
- Permit unions to bargain with the employer over the employee share of payment for the normal cost.

While the intent of the bill is laudable — to strengthen first responder recruitment — pension costs already threaten basic public services, compromise general fund budgets, and pose a long-term fiscal challenge to the state itself. Lawmakers passed the Public Employees' Pension Reform Act to address a wide range of issues involving public employee pensions. This was a major step in helping local agencies better manage future pension costs and prevent CalPERS from sliding into insolvency.

These proposed changes to the act would send public agencies and their pension funds in the wrong direction. Cal Cities is urging lawmakers to vote no on the measure.

Governor releases encampment ordinance and

Prop. 1 funds ahead of May Revise

Gov. Gavin Newsom on Monday released a <u>model ordinance</u> for local governments to address encampments and awarded the first round of Proposition 1 funding. The announcement came just days before his <u>revised May budget</u>, which included no new funding to help cities prevent and reduce homelessness.

It also comes after the administration placed an inflated price tag on a Cal Cities co-sponsored bill that would increase coordination between state agencies and cities when addressing encampments.

"When it comes to addressing homelessness, the question is not how many cities have encampment ordinances," said Cal Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman in a statement. "It is whether cities have the ongoing funding from the state to match the scale of the crisis."

What's in the ordinance?

The model ordinance mirrors a <u>2024 executive order</u> that directed state agencies to address encampments on state property and encouraged local governments to adopt similar policies. The ordinance has three main components:

- 1. It would make it unlawful to sleep three consecutive days on public property.
- 2. It would require city officials to provide notice 48 hours before enforcement action.
- 3. It would require agencies to store personal belongings for 60 days.

The state also awarded over \$3 billion in Prop. 1 funding. Cal Cities <u>supported</u> the \$6 billion behavioral health bond on the ballot back in March 2024. While this funding will create over 5,000 behavioral treatment beds across California, it cannot be used to implement the Governor's encampment order.

A recent Cal Cities <u>survey</u> reveals that cities are hard at work addressing encampments in their communities. Eight in 10 cities already have policies or ordinances in place to address encampments. Nearly 40% recently updated their ordinances to align with last year's executive order.

Perhaps more telling: Four in 10 cities cite coordinating with state agencies as a top barrier to addressing encampments in their communities.

Encampment coordination bill gets high price tag ahead of key committee

Despite the Governor's interest in expediting local efforts to address encampments, his own office has placed an inflated price tag on <u>SB 569 (Blakespear)</u>. Co-sponsored by Cal Cities, the bill would increase communication and coordination between state agencies and cities when addressing encampments on state property.

Extensive reporting by *CalMatters* found that it sometimes takes Caltrans, the state agency tasked with encampment resolutions on state-owned property, months to respond to requests to address encampments. The agency doesn't consistently notify cities about planned removals, and in at least one case, it's not clear if Caltrans is offering services to people.

SB 569's large price tag will make it challenging for lawmakers to move it off the Senate Appropriations' suspense file next week. Cities should call Senate Appropriations

Committee members and urge them to support this important measure.



Revised state budget nixes key funding and neglects

voter-approved priorities

There are a few tried-and-true ways to bury bad news. You can drop it on a Friday. You can blame someone else. You can paper over it with good news. Or you can spike it down the road. In his <u>revised budget proposal</u> today, Gov. Gavin Newsom chose all but the former. To be fair, policymakers are working in what he called a "climate of deep uncertainty" amid capricious federal policy changes. The ongoing trade détente will have an outsized impact on California's economy. And as longtime budget watchers know, the state's revenues go up and down with the fortunes of its wealthiest contributors. A budget deficit was all but certain. The only question was how big it would become.

The \$321.9 billion budget proposal put forth by Newsom accounts for a \$12 billion shortfall — not including possible federal spending cuts later this year. Equally notable is what's not in the budget: funding for homelessness or Proposition 36 implementation. He also suggested using some climate bond funding to balance the budget.

As usual, Newsom found time to lob a few barbs at local governments for the ongoing homelessness crisis. "It is not the state of California that remains the biggest impediment," he said. "The obstacle remains at the local level."

It's worth noting that his administration has placed an inflated high price on a Cal Cities cosponsored bill that would increase coordination between state agencies and cities when removing encampments. The budget also contains no new funding for affordable housing.

"California cities are not the obstacle to reducing and preventing homelessness," Cal Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman <u>said in a statement</u>. "This crisis has deep roots and won't be resolved without a partnership between state and local governments." "

Revenue and Taxation

When Gov. Gavin Newsom unveiled a \$322.3 billion budget proposal this January, analysts urged caution. The proposal was a noticeable increase from last year's \$297 billion budget — which had to close a \$47 billion deficit. But California's tax structure relies on the top 1% of earners. Dramatic swings in the stock market leave California's revenues vulnerable, and once balanced budgets can face looming deficits.

Since January, uncertainty and numerous macroeconomic changes have impacted California's budgetary outlook. It's unclear whether there will be federal cuts to large state-funded programs such as Medi-Cal. The state already has difficulty funding Medi-Cal at existing levels, let alone backfilling federal cuts.

Reimbursement for wildfire recovery is another billion-dollar question mark. Earlier this year, Governor Newsom requested \$40 billion from Congress for recovery efforts, which they have yet to grant. Finally, the whipsaw in the stock market due to changes in federal trade policy left many wondering what California's revenues will look like later this year once those impacts are fully felt.

That caution was warranted. Today, the Governor unveiled a \$321.9 billion updated budget proposal that included a \$12 billion budget shortfall — despite state revenues coming in above estimates through April. He placed much of the blame at the feet of the Trump Administration, noting that instability and tariffs have negatively impacted California's future revenues.

However, Newsom also noted that the state's expenditures have grown, partially due to the state's Medi-Cal expansion to all income-eligible Californians, regardless of immigration status. The May Revision does not consider any impacts from federal cuts that are under consideration by Congress.

The Governor proposed bridging this deficit through \$5 billion in reductions (primarily to the Medi-Cal program), \$5.3 billion in revenue/borrowing, and \$1.7 billion in fund shifts. The May Revision maintains the previous levels of withdrawals from the state's reserves, and total reserve balances of approximately \$15.7 billion.

Environmental Quality

The Governor's May Revision includes a mix of funding and policy news for cities regarding climate priorities. Building on the January budget, it includes clawbacks in funding for offshore wind and lead acid battery clean-up, water supply reliability policy changes, and a proposal to extend the Cap-and-Trade program.

- Climate bond clawbacks. In his January budget proposal, Newsom floated using \$273 million of Prop. 4 funding to balance the budget. Today, the Governor doubled down and suggested moving an additional \$42.8 million for offshore wind from General Fund to Prop. 4. Cal Cities and the long list of Prop. 4 champions oppose the Governor's use of climate bond funding, which was intended to be supplemental, to backfill the General Fund. The challenge that remains? Hundreds of millions of dollars less for climate resilience programs.
- Further shifts to offset the deficit. The Governor suggested shifting \$35 million from the General Fund to the Lead-Acid Battery Cleanup Fund to decontaminate residential properties near the former Exide lead-acid battery recycling facility.
- Water supply reliability streamlining. The Governor also used the May Revision to
 unveil his commitment to streamline and modernize improvements to critical water supply
 infrastructure, including the Delta Conveyance Project. The proposed streamlined
 administrative processes could save billions of dollars.

Governor affirms commitment to Cap-and-Trade Program

Leading up to the May Revision in April, the Governor, Senate Pro Tem, and Assembly Speaker <u>announced their intent</u> to extend <u>the Cap-and-Trade program</u> beyond 2030. In his remarks, the Governor committed to extending the program through 2045 — 20 more years — to align with the state's carbon neutrality goals and provide market certainty. He also recommended renaming the program to the Cap-and-Invest program to better characterize the need for deeper investments in carbon reduction and clean technologies.

Tied to the program's reauthorization is the continuation of the California Climate Credit, which could result in approximately \$60 billion for utility bill credits to Californians.

The Cap-and-Trade Program has funded nearly \$33 billion in investments through the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF). That is roughly equal to taking 1.3 million gas-powered cars off the road. \$7.4 billion has been dedicated to the High-Speed Rail Authority in the last ten years. The Governor identified his priority, to allocate at least \$1 billion for the project annually moving forward, to establish a stable and predictable funding stream to deliver on the capital investment.

So, what happens next to reauthorize the program? The Governor said his administration will work with the Legislature to design an expenditure plan associated with the program extension. Cal Cities will continue to advocate for aligning the GGRF with state-mandated climate programs that cities are implementing.

For the second year in a row, the Governor's revised budget does not include any new funding to address homelessness. This isn't surprising, as the Governor has previously withheld funding from the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) grant program, while demanding more action and results from local governments. The future of the program is now up to the Legislature.

This comes as the Governor earlier this week announced a new model ordinance for local governments to address encampments on public property, and as homelessness in California continues to grow, with over 187,000 people sleeping on the street or in shelters.

Instead of announcing new funding, the Governor pointed to the recent release of \$3 billion in Proposition 1 funds. While this funding will support 5,000 new behavioral health beds, only four cities received direct awards. Grantees cannot use the funds to implement the new encampment ordinance.

Below is a breakdown of major allocations, reductions, and policies announced:

Homelessness

- The May Revision does not include any new funding for round seven of the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) grant program. Cal Cities, along with local government partners and homeless services providers, have called for \$1 billion in ongoing funding for the program.
- The May Revision maintains \$100 million for Encampment Resolution Fund grants committed to in last year's budget.
 - The Governor also announced an expansion to the state's housing and homelessness accountability <u>website</u> that now includes the number of individuals served by the Encampment Resolution Fund.

California Housing and Homelessness Agency

- The May Revision includes \$4.2 million in 2025-26, \$6.4 million in 2026-27, and \$6.2 million in 2027-28 to support the reorganization of the Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency. Part of this funding would go toward creating the new California Housing and Homelessness Agency (CHHA) and the Housing Development and Finance Committee (HDFC).
 - The CHHA will integrate housing programs, streamline policies, and simplify the administration of state affordable housing programs. CHHA will include the Department of Housing and Community Development, California Interagency Council on Homelessness, California Housing Finance Agency, Civil Rights Department, and Housing Development and Finance Committee.

 The HDFC will administer multifamily affordable housing programs to streamline the administration and oversight of housing funding and reduce the administrative burden for housing developers.

Children and childcare

- The May Revision maintains previous funding commitments to implement Universal Transitional Kindergarten and Universal School Meals.
- The May Revision includes a reduction of \$60.7 million General Fund in 2025-26 and ongoing suspension of the childcare cost-of-living adjustment in 2025-26.

Housing, Community, and Economic Development

Last year, the Governor announced \$1.7 billion in cuts to key housing programs that cities rely on to increase affordable housing in their communities. Despite the continued focus on California's housing crisis, the Governor further reduced the amount of affordable housing programs available to cities by cutting \$31.7 million from the Infill Infrastructure Grant Program in his budget proposal.

Instead of providing new funding for affordable housing in the May Revision, the Governor determined that a better use of California's limited financial resources should be spent on establishing a new agency. (Please see the Community Services report above for more information on this reorganization effort.)

Although most of the May Revision housing proposals focus on cuts to affordable housing programs and the administration's housing priorities for the rest of the year, there are efforts to provide some funding for disaster recovery and rental aid programs. Below is a breakdown of notable priorities, allocations, and cuts.

Local government accountability

The May Revision says that the Governor will focus on holding local permitting agencies accountable to the existing statutory process, shortening permitting timelines, and targeting existing streamlining tools and financing strategies that reduce vehicle miles traveled through affordable, transit-oriented housing.

Housing finance and disaster recovery

- The May Revision states that the Governor will work with the Legislature on statewide bond measures to fund investments in housing and infrastructure.
- \$416.6 million in new one-time funding through the Community Development Block Grant to support long-term recovery efforts related to 2023 and 2024 natural disasters.
- \$200 million in Prop. 35 funds over two years for a Flexible Housing Pool rental assistance program to support individuals with significant behavioral health conditions who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness to enter stable, long-term housing.

Transportation, Communications, and Public Works

The Governor proposed a total of \$19.8 billion in expenditures for the state transportation agency, a 2.9% spending reduction that will result in eliminating over 500 positions at the department. Newsom hopes to extend the Cap-and-Trade program to fund major climate projects like high-speed rail and provide a utility credit for ratepayers to offset higher rates through 2045.

Additionally, the Governor is seeking to focus efforts on building electric charging infrastructure by allowing grantees to use the California Energy Commission's Clean Transportation Program grant funding on charging infrastructure.

Below is a breakdown of other allocations, reductions, and policies announced:

- **Transit.** Proposes a total of \$1.1 billion for transit.
- **High-Speed Rail.** Proposes \$882 million for the High-Speed Rail project.
- **Battery energy storage systems.** \$6.6 million allocated through 2028 to support compliance and enforcement of safety standards for large-scale, electric grid-connected battery energy storage systems.
- Clean energy. \$1.9 million through 2028-29 to fund the California Energy Commission's "Opt-in" clean energy permitting program. The May Revision also includes statutory changes to the program's project application fee structure to align it with current program needs.
- Los Angeles Olympics. The May Revision includes \$17.6 million one-time from the State Highway Account to support transportation project planning associated with the 2028 Olympic Games.

Public Safety

The May Revision proposes significant new funding for fire prevention and fire control to Cal FIRE to address the recent wildfires and the need for more resources, but no new funding to implement Proposition 36.

Wildfires

- Fire prevention and fire control. A shift of \$1.54 billion from the General Fund to the
 Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund to support CAL FIRE's fire prevention, fire control, and
 resource management activities on an ongoing basis. The proposal also includes a
 General Fund backstop to protect CAL FIRE's operations if the <u>Cap-and-Trade</u>
 auction proceeds fall below projected revenues.
- CAL FIRE training center. A reversion of \$31.5 million General Fund appropriated for the
 acquisition of a new CAL FIRE training center. CAL FIRE is exploring other ways to meet
 its training needs.

Crime and cannabis

The Governor's May Revision provides some funding to reduce crime, but no new funding for the implementation of Prop. 36. His proposal does note the modest impact Prop. 36 will have on prison populations, as well as a proposal to use Prop. 47 savings to fund Prop. 36 implementation. The major changes and adjustments to public safety are as follows:

- California Highway Patrol Highway Violence Task Force. One-time funding of \$4.9 million for an additional year of funding for the CHP's Highway Violence Task Force to address violent crime statewide.
- **Prop. 47 funding.** Additional \$3.2 million General Fund in savings for Prop. 47, for a total General Fund savings of \$91.5 million in 2025-26.
- **Prison population.** Spring projections indicate the average daily adult incarcerated population for 2024-25 will drop to 91,471, an estimated decrease of 0.2 %, and 91,205 in the following fiscal year, a decrease of 2.2 %. The projected decrease recognizes a slower ramp-up of Prop. 36.
- **Prison closures.** The May Revision proposes closing another prison by October 2026. This will save the state an estimated \$150 million General Fund annually.
- Cannabis tax fund. The May Revision estimates \$454.3 million will be available for cannabis-related programs from the passage of Prop. 64. This includes \$90.9 million for public safety activities. The Governor also proposed changes to the grant program that would prioritize local governments that prohibit cannabis cultivation if they authorize retail cannabis sales and prioritize grants for local illicit cannabis enforcement efforts.

The May Revision continues investments aimed at expanding workforce development opportunities. It also includes significant budget adjustments to address the budget shortfall while continuing to pay down the state's retirement obligations.

The May Revision proposes the following increases in spending:

- Unemployment insurance trust fund loan interest. An increase of \$8.5 million to pay the annual interest payment, bringing the total estimated interest payment for 2025-26 to \$642.8 million.
- Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act-May Revision update. An increase of \$20.4 million one-time in 2024-25 and an increase of \$119.6 million one-time in 2025-26 to support various workforce development programs.
- Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) apprenticeship training grant expansion. An increase of \$18.2 million to support apprenticeship training in construction and related trades.
- **DIR Public Works information technology system enhancements**. An increase of \$19.1 million to continue modernizing DIR's Public Works information technology system.

To address the projected budget shortfall, the May Revision includes General Fund solutions.

- Labor and workforce development fund loan. A loan of \$400 million from the Fund to the General Fund.
- Regional coordination for career education. A reduction of \$3 million one-time General Fund for the Labor and Workforce Development Agency in 2025-26.
- Collective bargaining negotiations. A savings of \$766.7 million for salaries and wages.
- Ongoing vacancy and efficiency reductions. \$34 million in vacancy and efficiency reductions across the Motor Vehicle Account's major users, including the California Highway Patrol, Department of Motor Vehicles, and California Air Resources Board.

The May Revision makes contributions to the state's retirement obligations.

- The California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). The state's contributions to CalPERS have decreased by a net total of \$103.9 million in 2025-26 because of the integration of CalPERS valuation results as of June 30, 2024.
- **Proposition 2 debt repayment.** The May Revision estimates \$573 million in one-time Proposition 2 debt repayment funding in 2025-26 to further reduce the unfunded liabilities of the CalPERS state plans.

Next steps

Typically, budget negotiations wrap up a few days before June 15, when lawmakers must pass a budget bill. But this year, Congressional Republicans have proposed major cuts to social safety net programs that could impact the state's budget. Legislators could return to Sacramento late this year or even early next year to revise the budget one more time.

"Ninety percent of the ball game is in Washington," Asm. Jesse Gabriel told *CalMatters*. "It's frustrating to me that this is beyond our control."

Sacramento — Following the release of Gov. Gavin Newsom's revised 2025-26 budget proposal, League of California Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman issued the following statement:

"Both state and local governments alike are facing a tough budget climate and fiscal uncertainty. That's why Cal Cities is laser-focused on three state budget priorities: investing in ongoing funding for homelessness, improving public safety, and protecting investments in climate change. The Governor's May Revision fails to invest in any of these.

California cities are not the obstacle to reducing and preventing homelessness. This crisis has deep roots and won't be resolved without a partnership between state and local governments. The homelessness crisis plays out in our cities because that is where the majority of Californians live.

Here are two of the barriers for cities: a lack of ongoing funding and coordination with state agencies. Nearly 40% of our cities cite coordinating with the state as a barrier to addressing encampments. The Governor's proposal includes zero funding for the Housing, Homeless Assistance and Prevention grant program to support cities' efforts to prevent and reduce homelessness in our communities.

When the voters decisively approved Prop. 4, they authorized \$10 billion to make our communities more resilient to the impacts of a changing climate by investing in programs for water recycling and flood risk reduction, vegetation management, home hardening for wildfire mitigation, protection against extreme heat, and clean energy programs. The Governor's proposal goes against the will of the voters by diverting these essential funds to other programs. Finally, when voters in all 58 counties overwhelmingly passed Prop. 36, they did so with an expectation that state and local governments would implement the measure to improve the safety of their communities. The Governor's proposal fails to deliver on that promise. As the budget process continues, Cal Cities looks forward to working with the Governor and Legislature to ensure city priorities are included in the final budget."

Cal Cities says cities need funding, not model

encampment ordinances, to address homelessness

Sacramento — Following the Governor's announcement regarding the release of a homeless encampment model ordinance, League of California Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman issued the statement below:

"When it comes to addressing homelessness, the question is not how many cities have encampment ordinances. It is whether cities have the ongoing funding from the state to match the scale of the crisis. Cal Cities stands strongly behind its position that now is the time for the state to invest in ongoing funding for all cities, big and small, to address homelessness.

Cal Cities was pleased to hear this morning's announcement about the release of \$3 billion in much-needed state funding to support behavioral health housing in communities throughout our state. But this funding, which was authorized by Proposition 1 and supported by cities, cannot be used to implement encampment ordinances.

Clearing encampments may be the most visible part of this crisis, but without addressing the underlying root causes of homelessness, the cycle will only repeat itself. We have the blueprint to drive real solutions. Federal and state reports tell us, time and time again, that targeted and sustained funding leads to decreases in homelessness. That's why it is deeply concerning that the Governor's current budget proposal eliminates funding from the Housing, Homeless Assistance and Prevention grant program, which has been a funding lifeline for the cities that receive these grant dollars.

We appreciate the state offering a model encampment ordinance and agree that it's only a 'starting point' for jurisdictions, since it builds upon what many cities are already doing. <u>Cal Cities data shows</u> that eight in 10 cities already have policies in place to address encampments, and nearly 40% of cities recently updated their local ordinances to align with the Governor's executive order on encampment ordinances issued last July.

Cities are stepping up and trying to coordinate with state agencies to address encampments more efficiently and effectively. But nearly four in 10 cities cite a lack of state coordination as a top barrier to success. That's why Cal Cities is <u>co-sponsoring legislation</u> to increase communication and coordination between state agencies and cities when addressing encampments on state property.

Cities are focused on solutions, and every level of government has a role to play in the outcome."
