OBJECTIVE

To inform the City Council about the Garden Grove Panthers inaugural season.

BACKGROUND

After a youth football program hiatus of nearly two years, a new Garden Grove youth pop warner football and cheer program was formed. The organization Garden Grove Panthers, will be based out of Garden Grove Park and resume the location of previous pop warner programs. President Joshua Taylor has extensive experience as a former player and coach. Vice President Daniel Ordway's nearly 20-year career in technology, entertainment, and marketing will lend his resources administratively to the program. They've built bridges with local high schools and are committed to developing youth in football and cheer, encourage academic components to balanced student-athlete lives, and giving back to the community.

DISCUSSION

This spring, Garden Grove Panthers held registration for youth football and cheer participants and fielded a 12U team. This Saturday, August 17, 2024, will be their first preseason game which begins with a ceremony at 10AM; the game will start at 1PM at Garden Grove Park, 9301 Westminster Avenue. Their inaugural season will officially kick off on Saturday, August 31, 2024.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY TO DECREASE ELECTRIC RATES APPLICATION A.24-05-025

Why am I receiving this notice?

On May 30, 2024, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting an expedited review and approval of its 2024 Energy Resource Recovery Account (ERRA) Revenue Requirement Trigger Mechanism Application (Application). The ERRA functions to recover the fuel and power procurement costs that SCE incurs to provide electric service to its customers.

Why is SCE requesting this rate decrease?

As of April 30, 2024, SCE is forecasting to spend \$742.426 million less in procurement costs than has been recovered in customer rates. This is known as the "overcollection amount." This was due to a variety of factors including lower wholesale power prices. SCE requested the CPUC allow the overcollection amount in rates beginning October 1, 2024. If SCE's application is approved, your rates may decrease as reflected in the table below.

How could this affect my monthly electric rates?

The average non-CARE residential monthly bill using 500 kWh per month would decrease by approximately 4.4% (or \$7.98) per month. This is an estimate based on current rates, which may change by October 1, 2024.

This application was assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who considered proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge issued a proposed decision on July 22 adopting SCE's request. The proposed decision was discussed and approved by the

CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting on August 1, 2024.

Parties to the proceeding reviewed SCE's application, including the Public Advocates Office. The Public Advocates Office is an independent consumer advocate within the CPUC that represents customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. NOTICE OF APPLICATION SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY'S REQUEST TO INCREASE ELECTRIC RATES APPLICATION [A.24-08-003]

Why am I receiving this notice?

On August 2, 2024, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) filed an application (A.24-08-003) with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting approval to sell SCE's General Office #5 (GO5) property in Rosemead, California (GO5 Application). The application seeks approval of a revenue increase of approximately \$40.9 million, which, after taxes, will equate to a recovery of approximately \$29.4 million.

If the CPUC approves this application, SCE will recover forecasted costs in electric rates over a one-year period beginning the year of the closing of the transaction. This will impact your monthly bill.

Why is SCE requesting this rate increase?

- SCE is seeking to sell its ground lease interest in the property because (a) SCE has consolidated its workforce into other SCE buildings and (b) the building requires significant seismic retrofitting, which SCE does not think would be a prudent expenditure.
- Although the sale will result in a one-time after-tax loss of approximately \$29.4 million, the sale
 will save certain on-going operating, maintenance, lease and other costs for a property no
 longer required for SCE operations.
- SCE's revenue billed to customers will subsequently be reduced by eliminating the return on SCE's investment in the property not yet collected to date and maintenance costs upon the closing of the sale.

How could this affect my monthly electric rates?

If SCE's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill using 500 kWh per month would increase by approximately \$0.36 or 0.2% per month in the year following the close of the sale.

The projected rate increase described in this notice is a forecast and is likely to slightly change depending on the month and year in which the sale of the GO5 property closes.

How does the rest of the process work?

This GO5 Application will be assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt SCE's application, modify it, or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.





Main St. billiard parlor gets approval for 8 pool tables

On Tuesday night the Garden Grove City Council voted 6-0 – with Councilmember John O'Neill absent – in favor of a resolution clearing the way for a permit to allow a Main Street restaurant to operate a billiard parlor with up to eight pool tables as an "incidental" use.

The Wharf, which offers seafood and other meals, is located at 12941 Main on the west side of the street. The billiard parlor could host league competition and gambling would be strictly forbidden, the council was told.

Also on Tuesday night, the council pulled from the agenda a written request from the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations to host a Tet Festival in 2025.

Additionally the council voted 6-0 in favor of a proposal from Councilmember George Brietigam to ask the city attorney to draw up and bring back – within 90 days – an ordinance to ban camping in pubic places.

Lawmakers send retail theft bills to the

Governor

Lawmakers on Aug. 12 passed a 10-bill package broadly supported by Cal Cities that seeks to reduce retail theft. Gov. Gavin Newsom is expected to sign the measures into law.

Cal Cities and a <u>broad coalition of partners</u> played a key role in getting these bills to the Governor's desk, with advocacy starting <u>late last year</u>.

First introduced as a 14-bill bipartisan package, the proposal descended into chaos after an ill-fated attempt to <u>scuttle Proposition 36</u>. The district attorney-sponsored ballot measure would create a deterrent for repeat retail theft offenders and redirect some toward treatment rather than incarceration. Cal Cities supports Prop. 36 and the legislative package, as none of the bills in the retail theft package would impact the November ballot measure.

The legislative scofflaw led to several <u>high-profile defections</u>. One legislator pulled his bill in protest, and another removed her name from a measure. Some supporters, including Cal Cities, temporarily removed their support.

What passed?

The biggest bill, <u>AB 2943 (Zbur and Rivas, Robert)</u>, would create a new felony charge for serial retail theft and let prosecutors combine retail theft crimes under one offense. It would also allow police to arrest suspects without witnessing the crime, prohibit nuisance actions against retailers for reporting crime, set up diversion programs, and increase probation time.

Other measures would target <u>fencing operations</u>, <u>cargo theft</u>, <u>organized retail theft</u>, and <u>repeated retail theft</u>, as well as related tactics, such as <u>forcibly entering a vehicle</u> or <u>starting a fire</u> to commit theft. The proposed changes are all critical to comprehensively addressing retail theft.

Speaker Robert Rivas elected to hold one of his bills, <u>AB 1960</u>, noting that it would duplicate other policies and conflict with Prop. 36.

Cal Cities supports <u>all the retail theft bills</u>, except for AB 2943. Cal Cities supports many of the measure's provisions but urged lawmakers to bring the bill in line with case law, allow police to use unsworn statements if they demonstrate probable cause, and clarify what successful probation looks like before sending it to the Governor.

Lawmakers still have dozens of <u>other public safety measures</u> to settle, including ones aimed at illicit fentanyl, intoxicating hemp, and municipal drone use. Most measures are in <u>appropriations</u>, awaiting their final fiscal fate on Aug. 15.

The following week will likely be quiet, as around a third of all lawmakers will be in Chicago for the Democratic National Convention. After that it's a mad dash to Aug. 31, the last day to wrap up any remaining legislative business.



Rancho Cucamonga plans to beat the state's greenhouse gas goals

There's a reason — or rather, five good reasons — why many <u>climate experts</u> praise Rancho Cucamonga for its sustainability efforts. For years, it has taken a multipronged approach that covers transportation, as well as zoning and energy. As a result, the city is on target to dramatically curb its greenhouse emissions by 2030.



"Their plan tackles them both head-on," says Josh Lee, deputy director of planning and regional programs for the San Bernardino County Transportation Authority. "They will be on target for not just meeting, but exceeding, the goals of the state."

Part of the city's success rests on the San Bernardino Council of Governments' regional greenhouse gas reduction plan, which includes a certified environmental impact report. That plan — the first such one in the state — allowed Rancho Cucamonga to develop ambitious programs and policies without investing in costly environmental reviews.

Lee says the city's "forward-thinking" transportation and building policies are robust for the region. "The city of Rancho Cucamonga is aggressive in its approach and has positioned itself to meet the goals of the state and to take advantage of funding opportunities as they become available," he said.

Rancho Cucamonga's most recent, splashiest achievement is its <u>electric fire engine</u> and new fire station with a fully functioning microgrid. City Manager John Gillison calls it "revolutionary." But what's as noteworthy is the series of then seemingly small policies that led to a big moment.



The city first

purchased used Ford Lightnings, which helped leaders ease staff into the idea of an electric vehicle (EV). "We have to recognize that the challenge right now is helping people along that learning curve," Gillison said. "If you just try and force them, then people are more resistant, and you actually don't help the uptick of the new technology."

This phased-in approach bought time for the city to upgrade its infrastructure. Although there are several grant programs for EV charging infrastructure, many of them have impractical and restrictive requirements.

"We can't just move everything and they're like, 'Sorry, that's what you have to do if you want the funding," said Gillison. "If you're a Walgreens and you want to put in two chargers in your parking lot for people to charge — meh, no big deal — the program works great for that. But if you're a large entity with a fleet ... those restrictions don't work: They want you to change your whole business operation."

The city was also an early leader in solar power and battery storage, with major investments dating back several decades. But switching from dirty, polluting fossil fuels is not enough to get to net zero. To do that, officials will need to rethink how they plan entire neighborhoods.

Build for tomorrow, not for today

For Rancho Cucamonga, this meant focusing first on its transportation systems. It invested in a traffic management system that analyzes traffic patterns to reduce vehicle idling times and ultimately, tailpipe emissions.

The next step was much harder: Adding new lanes can <u>worsen greenhouse gas emissions</u>. But for Rancho Cucamonga, adding new bus routes with signal preemption, protected bike routes, and a high-speed rail stop — which it is doing, often in <u>partnership with nearby cities</u> — won't happen overnight.



For starters, the city is on an incline. It is also spread out, like many suburban communities. Taking a bus from city hall to the main shopping area — that's 40 to 45 minutes. By car? 15 minutes.

Gillison says one solution is to create small, closed loops for buses and cyclists. It's a holistic game of inches. Protected bike trails along a flat part of the city or new bus routes on a busy corridor can create institutional mechanisms and community buy-in for more ambitious projects.

"If we can get them to where they're going quicker and more efficiently, they're happier," he said. "There's less frustration on their part. We're happier. It's better for the environment and helps us reach some of — or at least move closer towards — some of our climate action goals."

City officials also want to encourage denser, mixed-use housing. The city cannot expand much more. In many places, the only option is to build up. And the farther people live from the places where they work and play, the more they drive. Denser, mixed-use housing solves several problems at once.

Actually doing that is another thing entirely. Many residents want to keep their neighborhoods the same. The city has found some creative solutions to this challenge, like building denser housing near major corridors or turning a <u>golf course</u> into mixed-use housing near a planned high-speed rail station.

But the problem isn't necessarily resident opposition. It's Rancho Cucamonga's reputation. It's known for lower-density housing, which encourages lower-density developments.

Teamwork makes the green work

To help spur these changes, Rancho Cucamonga has moved towards a form-based code, streamlined its permitting processes, and invested in a master environmental review report. The latter allows developers to "tier off" their projects — much like the city did with its climate plan — saving builders six to nine months and thousands of dollars.



The city also tries to pair developers together while learning from its past mistakes. Someone who is good at building coffee shops might not be apt at building homes. But pairing that developer with a housing developer can create the communities the city needs.

The city incentivizes green investments through <u>a recognition program</u>. Small businesses know that many customers value climate-friendly policies, even if it's as simple as an EV charging station. The city uses its platform to direct attention to those stores, which in turn brings in likeminded entrepreneurs and practices.

"It lets us connect them with programs that are out there that maybe they're not aware of and help get them some funding in some cases," Gillison said. "And it gets the word out that Rancho is a place that welcomes these types of businesses."

The first Prop 1. funding deadline is two months

away

Potential applicants must request a pre-application meeting before Oct. 15

Over \$3 billion in competitive grant funding for behavioral health from Proposition 1 — half of which is reserved for cities and counties — is now available. Applicants must request a preapplication meeting before Oct. 15. to be considered for funding.

During the consultation, prospective applicants will describe their proposed project and how they would use the funding, as well as ask questions that help produce quality applications. Cities can refer to the application questions guide to preview the questions before requesting a meeting.

After the consultation, cities have until Dec. 13 to complete their applications. All applications must be supported by the county behavioral health director where the project is located. Applicants must also base their proposals on local behavioral health needs data and demonstrate community engagement and regional collaboration.

Last week, Cal Cities hosted a webinar with the Governor's Office on Prop. 1 implementation. The Governor's team encouraged cities to kick off the application process by collaborating with county leaders and asking county officials the following questions:

- Are more seriously ill people in your county being connected with behavioral health services and housing?
- How is the county planning to apply for and leverage Prop. 1 bond funding?
- What are the county's priorities for the new behavioral health plans starting in 2026? What is the process?

A second round of Prop. 1 funding will be available in mid-2025. The state plans to award all funding — \$6.38 billion in total — no later than 2026. Cities can learn more about available funding on the Behavioral Health Infrastructure Bond Act landing page.

Cal Cities' 2024 Advocacy Priorities focus on securing investments to reduce homelessness and boost the supply of affordable housing. For years, Cal Cities has called on the Legislature and the Governor to provide ongoing funding to address these crises. The investments made through Prop. 1 align with these goals and are a step forward in addressing the needs of vulnerable Californians.



Cal Cities breaks down November climate bond

Cal Cities has released a <u>guide to Proposition 4</u>, otherwise known as the Safe Drinking Water, Wildlife Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024. The Cal Cities-supported measure would provide \$10 billion for climate and environmental projects if approved by voters in November.

Cal Cities pushed for the climate bond to move forward <u>in the Legislature</u> this year and adopted a support position on the ballot measure after lawmakers voted in early July, qualifying it for the November ballot.

The guide provides a walkthrough of all eight funding chapters, noting specific proposals by topic, amount, and type. Cities can use the guide to navigate the various programs that may be available to them if voters approve Prop. 4 in November.

Most of the money would go towards water infrastructure, wildfire prevention, and coastal resilience, with additional funding allocated for extreme heat, biodiversity, agriculture, parks, and energy.

We all know the anxiety that comes with the Dreaded Blue Screen of Death, but imagine that ominous glow enveloping an entire Emergency Command Center that fields hundreds of 911 calls a night. That could be the stuff of nightmares, but our IT Team hit the ground running, first identifying the issue in collaboration with OCIAC, and then working through the night to restore our CAD systems. All the while, our dispatchers and

firefighters went "old school," flawlessly upholding our service standards and underscoring the value and depth of our training for worst-case scenarios. Less than four hours later, even as much of the world continued to endure the perils of the outage, our CAD system was restored. More importantly, thanks to firefighters in all 78 stations monitoring their radios and verbalizing their status with our dispatchers, we quickly and proudly reported that the communities we serve experienced zero operational delays. The following day, amidst a news cycle of unsettling stories — worldwide airport interruptions, bank closures, and healthcare delays — the OCFA was again illuminated, not in a dreaded blue glow, but as a beacon of best practices,

training, teamwork, and grit. That is who we are, and as always, I am proud to thank and stand with you in our continued emergence as a national model for fire service excellence in both good and challenging times. Sincerely, **Brian Fennessy**

ATF, investigated, tracked down, and successfully arrested the suspected arsonist on 10 counts of arson.




