RE: Response to the 2021-22 Orange County Grand Jury Report re How is Orange County Addressing Homelessness?

Dear Judge Larsh,

In accordance with Penal Code 933.05(a) and (b), the City of Garden Grove submits the following response to the report, findings, and recommendations of the 2021-22 Orange County Grand Jury Report entitled, "How is Orange County Addressing Homelessness?".

FINDINGS

F3. The County of Orange and cities within Orange County have been inconsistent in collaboration for support of shelters and services, which has resulted in missed opportunities to end homelessness.

Response: The City of Garden Grove disagrees partially with the above finding. The City of Garden Grove is fully committed to collaborating with the County and its fellow municipalities to support homeless shelters and services. The City works and supports the efforts of the Orange County Commission to End Homelessness and has been a member of the Commission since 2020. The City of Garden Grove is also a member of the Orange County Housing Trust and a member of the ACCOC Homelessness Task Force. Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones has served on the United Way's "United to End Homelessness" Leadership Council since 2018.

In July 2022, the City executed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cities of Fountain Valley and Westminster to develop a navigation center in the Central Service Planning Area, and is currently collaborating with the County on this effort. The City also collaborates regularly with the County regarding homeless services programs, including: participating in the Orange County Emergency Solutions Grant Collaborative; collaboration with the County on the Be-Well OC in Garden Grove Mobile Response Unit; and through administration of the Garden Grove Housing Authority, one of only four in the County, which administers Section 8 housing vouchers, Emergency housing vouchers and Mainstream housing vouchers that

provide increased financial stability to homeless individuals and individuals at risk of becoming homeless. In addition, Garden Grove staff participated in the Orange County Mental Health Crisis Response Continuum Forum hosted at Freedom Hall Mile Square Park in July 2021 and the City's GGPD Special Resources Team regularly collaborates with the County mobile crisis assessment (CAT) team to address homelessness and identify shelter solutions.

F4. There are an insufficient number of rental units available to those exiting Emergency Shelters, resulting in the majority returning to homelessness when leaving the shelters.

Response: The City of Garden Grove agrees with the above finding.

RECOMMENDATIONS

R4. By July 1, 2024, the County of Orange and cities should collaborate to open facilities that can house people with severe and persistent mental illness and addiction issues in a secure setting. (F2)

Response: The recommendation has not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the future. The City is fully committed to collaborating with the County and its fellow municipalities on opportunities to house people with severe and persistent mental illness and substance use issues. The City has executed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cities of Fountain Valley and Westminster to develop a "low barrier" navigation center in the Central Service Planning Area, and we are collaborating with the County on this effort. It is anticipated this project will move forward and open by July 1, 2024. The navigation center would provide emergency housing and services to the literally homeless population, including those with severe and persistent mental illness and substance use issues. There is great need for additional funding opportunities to assist jurisdictions develop housing for those experiencing severe or persistent mental illness and substance use issues.

R5. By July 1, 2023, the County of Orange, cities and CoC should collaborate to encourage the development of affordable housing to individuals exiting the emergency shelters in Orange County. (F3, F4, F5)

Response: The recommendation has been implemented. The City is fully committed to continuing our collaboration with the County and its fellow municipalities to encourage the development of affordable housing for those exiting emergency shelter. The City completed development of an 8-unit permanent supportive housing project at 11742 Stuart Drive in August 2022, which now houses the most vulnerable homeless individuals. Additionally, the City of Garden Grove has approximately 1,700 deed restricted affordable housing units, 2,200 Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers, 117 Emergency Housing Vouchers, and 75 Mainstream Vouchers. There is great need for additional funding opportunities to assist jurisdictions develop affordable housing.

R6. By December 1, 2022, the County of Orange, cities and CoC should collaborate to increase the number of housing opportunities for Transitional Aged Youth. (F6)

Response: The recommendation has been implemented. The City is fully committed to continuing our collaboration with the County and its fellow municipalities to increase the number of housing opportunities for the Transitional Aged Youth (TAY) population. The City currently funds Stand Up for Kids to provide services to the TAY population. Stand Up for Kids provides Street Outreach and Rapid Rehousing services to the homeless TAY population in Garden Grove. In addition, the City is currently in discussions with Thomas House Family Shelter for a potential acquisition and rehabilitation affordable housing project for the TAY population. These discussions will continue through December 1, 2022. There is great need for additional funding opportunities to assist jurisdictions develop affordable housing.


The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply in July.


 OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in July.
- Estimated OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years
 Water usage in July 2022 was slightly below average compared to the last 5 years. We are projecting a decrease in overall water usage compared to FY 2021-22. On July 8th 2021, state officials have ask California residents to voluntary reduce their water usage by 15% compared to 2020 levels.
- Historical OC Water Consumption Orange County M & I water consumption is projected to be 538,000 AF in FY 2022-23 (this includes ~11 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 8,000 AF less than FY 2021-22 and is about 22,000 AF less than FY 2020-21. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly lower in FY 2021-22 for Orange County at 152 gallons per day (This includes recycled water usage). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. O.C. Water Usage has declined significantly since the FY 2013-14. Since FY 2013-14 average O.C. Annual Water usage is 535,000 AF, a decline of 86,500 AF since FY 2013-14.

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.

- Orange County's accumulated precipitation through early September was below average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 7.43 inches, which is 57% of normal.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through early September was 83% of normal for this period. Water Year 2021 was 48% of normal while water year 2020 was 63% of normal. The Northern California snowpack was 27% as April 1st, 2022. As of early September, 99.76% of California is experiencing moderate to severe drought conditions. 40.18% of California is experiencing extreme to exceptional drought conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was decreased in March to 5% for WY 2022.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through early September was 100% of normal for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 86% of normal as of April 15th 2022. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 37.0% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 26.2% of their total capacity. For the first time on the Colorado River, Lake Mead's levels have fallen below the "trigger" limit of 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year. The US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) has declared a shortage at Lake Mead, impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. Lake Mead as of early September was 31.00' BELOW the "trigger" limit. The USBR has declared a shortage on the Colorado River staring January 1st 2022. There is a 100% chance of shortage continuing in 2023, 93% in 2024, 100% in 2025 and 93% in 2026. Lake Mead as of early September was 1.00' BELOW the State of California "trigger" limit. There is a 3% chance of shortage for California in 2023 (-180 TAF), 70% in 2024 (-272 TAF), 66% in 2025 (-290 TAF) and 56% in 2026 (-299 TAF).






Accumulated Precipitation

for the Oct.-Sep. water year, early September 2022








ROAD WORK

Beginning this week through May 2023, tentatively, several Garden Grove streets will undergo rehabilitation, causing temporary traffic delays.

Streets under construction are:

- -McFadden Avenue, from Ward Street to 600 feet east;
- -Hazard Avenue, from Bushard Street to Ward Street;
- —Chapman Avenue, from Nelson Street to Ninth Street;
- -Lampson Avenue, from Harbor Boulevard to Haster Street;
- -Newland Street, from Trask Avenue to Garden Grove Boulevard;
- —Mays Avenue, from Yockey Street to Magnolia Street.

To facilitate construction work, traffic will be reduced to one lane in both directions. Work hours are 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Access to businesses and residences along the construction areas will be maintained at all times. Motorists are advised to use alternate routes to avoid congestion.

The improvements consist of the removal and construction of uplifted curb, gutter, sidewalk, cross gutter, splash pad, bus pad and wheelchair ramps; full depth reclamation process; asphalt concrete base and surface; traffic striping and raised pavement markers. The work will result in an improved roadway surface and minimize maintenance efforts.

The project is funded by Measure M2 Local Fair Share and gas tax funds.

Police urge walkers to practice caution

September is Pedestrian **Safety Month**

September is Pedestrian Safety Month, and the Garden Grove Police Department is participating in activities throughout the month to encourage the safety of people walking.

Based on data projections from the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA), 7,485 people, or an average of 20 people every day. died after being struck by a vehicle last year – an 11.5 percent increase from 2020 and a 40-year high.

"People should not feel in danger walking," Garden Grove Police Chief Tom DaRé said. "Drivers, please slow down and be aware of people who are walking. If we all look out for one another, we can all get where we need to go safely."

To promote the safety of people walking, the Garden Grove Police Department will conduct traffic safety operations throughout the month of September, focused on the most dangerous driver behaviors that put the safety of pedestrians at risk. These violations include speeding, making illegal turns, failing to yield and running stop signs or signals.

The Garden Grove Police Department offers safe driving and walking tips, including staying off the phone when behind the wheel or walking: ministration.

DRIVERS

- -Do not speed, and slow down at intersections. Be prepared to stop for pedestrians at marked and unmarked crosswalks;
- -Avoid blocking crosswalks while waiting to make a right-hand turn;
 - —Never drive impaired.

PEDESTRIANS

- -Be predictable. Use signalized crosswalks where drivers may anticipate foot traffic;
- —Watch for approaching vehicles and practice due care crossing the street. At 30 mph, a driver needs at least 90 feet to stop:
- -Make it easier for drivers to see you at night - wear light colors and reflective material and use a flashlight;
- -Be careful crossing streets or entering crosswalks at night or on busier streets with higher speed limits.

The Michelin Guide has recognized 31 Orange County restaurants in its most recent list. The city of Costa Mesa dominates the dining scene with Orange County's only Michelin star recipients. (Michelin has said its official star rating announcements for 2022 will come "this winter.")

South Coast Plaza restaurants such as AnQi Bistro and Vaca helmed by chef Amar Santana and Ahmed Labbate joined the guide. The two additions showcase the plaza's award-winning dining options, which includes one Michelin star restaurant Knife Pleat, which is one of three Orange County restaurants with a star rating, and another restaurant helmed by Bib Gourmand chef Ross Pangilinan.

Costa Mesa's other dining destination, SOCO & The OC Mix, saw the addition of Arc Food & Libations to the California list. The center is home to chef Carlos Salgado's critically lauded, Michelin star restaurant Taco Maria.

Other cities in Orange County honored the region's diverse culinary flavors. Khan Saab Desi Craft Kitchen in Fullerton, Gabbi's Mexican Kitchen in Orange, Garlic &

Chives by Kristen in Garden Grove, and Fable & Spirit in Newport Beach showcase the wide range of dining options ranging from Pakistan to Ireland. Restaurants such as Hana re and Marchè Moderne were expected inclusions, but for some chefs, the recognition was completely unexpected.

"It's an honor to have our work recognized," says Joel Gutierrez, executive chef at Lido Bottle Works in Newport Beach. The restaurant is known for its seasonal approach to American-style pub fare. Placing hummus with lavash and seared chicken with morels on the same menu with a varying rotation of craft beer and wine.

"Anytime Michelin even mentions you it is surreal," adds Gutierrez. "This gives me a sense of joy but also a desire to push our boundaries. We were very fortunate to have worked through the entire pandemic when many could not. Now, with the current state of things, we can really push ourselves and our ethos to new heights."

Nickelodeon deal approved

A development and disposition agreement that's likely the final step toward building a large Nickelodeon-themed hotel was approved by the Garden Grove City Council on Tuesday night.

On a 6-0 vote (with second district member Councilmember John O'Neill recusing himself), a resolution approving a disposition and development agreement with Newage Garden Grove II, LLC passed.

Now the developer is committed to construct a 500-suite full service hotel on a 3.72 acre site on Harbor Boulevard, immediately south of the Sheraton Hotel.



It would include a themed "pool experience" with a "lazy river," event space that includes a 600-seat theater and grand ballroom and more.

The estimated net project revenue to the city by Year 3 is \$3.5 million annually. Over 30 years, the project is expected to generate about \$236.4 million to the city in a combination of "bed tax" charged to hotel guests, sales tax and property tax.

As many as 1,000 new jobs are expected to be generated from construction and in the resort.

- adoption of a resolution authorizing submittal of an application to the County of Orange Continuum of Care for the "Special Notice of Funding Opportunity" to address unsheltered homelessness (Garden Grove is in the process of developing a "navigation center" for the homeless, in conjunction with Westminster and Fountain Valley);
- two purchase orders for a total of 17 police vehicles with a total cost of over \$800,000;
- second reading of an ordinance for a planned unit development for a two-hotel project at the northwest corner of Harbor Boulevard and Twintree Avenue;
- a purchase agreement for property at 13871 West St. for use as a navigation center for the homeless (cost: \$5,650,000) and awarding a contract for architectural services for the building to Borders Architect (cost: \$304,000).

Streets under construction are: McFadden Avenue, from Ward Street to 600 feet east; Hazard Avenue, from Bushard Street to Ward Street; Chapman Avenue, from Nelson Street to Ninth Street; Lampson Avenue, from Harbor Boulevard to Haster Street; Newland Street, from Trask Avenue to Garden Grove Boulevard; and Mays Avenue, from Yockey Street to Magnolia Street.

To facilitate construction work, traffic will be reduced to one lane in both directions. Work hours are 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Access to businesses and residences along the construction areas will be maintained at all times. Motorists are advised to use alternate routes to avoid congestion.

The improvements consist of the removal and construction of uplifted curbs, gutter, sidewalk, cross gutter, splash pad, bus pad, and wheelchair ramps; full depth reclamation (FDR) process; asphalt concrete base and surface; traffic striping and raised pavement markers. The work will result in an improved roadway surface and minimize maintenance efforts.

Site Plan approval to construct an approximately 4,000 square foot, two-unit restaurant pad building within the parking lot of an existing multi-tenant shopping center, Harbor Place Center. Both restaurants will maintain 500 square foot outdoor patio areas. One restaurant will be approximately 2,800 square feet with a drive-through lane, and one restaurant will be approximately 1,200 square feet. Associated improvements include the reconfiguration of the shopping center's parking lot to accommodate the new pad building as well as landscape improvements where the new pad building will be located. The site is in the HCSP-TZS (Harbor Corridor Specific Plan – Transition Zone South) zone. The project is exempt from the CEQA pursuant to Government Code Section 15303(c) – New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures – of the State CEQA Guidelines.

Action:

Resolution No. 6049-22 was approved. One person spoke with concerns the area would be saturated with fast-food burger establishments and more traffic would flow onto Rainbow Street. One letter of opposition was submitted with concerns of increased traffic taking short-cuts through Flagstone Avenue and Rainbow Street.

Staff presented a 'yellow' sheet with modified Conditions of Approval Nos. 14 and 15 as noted below:

Public Works Engineering Division

14. Prior to issuance of the certificate for occupancy, the applicant shall dedicate right-of-way to the City "in fee" fronting the development from the existing center line of Harbor Boulevard to the ultimate right-of-way per ALTA Exhibit B. Applicant shall record said

easement in a format conforming to City policy guidelines under the approval authority of the City Engineer and City Attorney. The applicant shall submit to the Engineering Division an updated title report along with copies of the recorded instruments listed in the title report, as well as reference maps and exhibits used to prepare legal description. Dedication exhibits shall include closure calculations along with a detailed plat for review and approval of the street dedication exhibits by the City Engineer.

- 15. The applicant shall, at the applicant's expense, design, furnish and install the following traffic signal equipment at the intersection of Harbor Blvd and Commercial Center:
 - a. Econolite vision video detection system.
 - b. Complete intersection rewire.
 - c. Two (2) internally illuminated street name signs, which shall be named at a later date.
 - d. Six (6) station Campbell APS pedestrian push button system.

In lieu of constructing above improvements, the developer may elect to pay the City an in-lieu fee of \$62,000 at the time of issuance for grading permit.

Also, two new Conditions of Approval were added:

- 108. The façade along Harbor Boulevard shall be articulated with additional architectural detail and/or landscaping acceptable to the Planning Division.
- 109. Within six (6) months from commencement of business operations of the drive-thru restaurant, City Staff shall reevaluate whether the internal drive approach leading from Harbor Boulevard at the north of the new pad building should be modified or closed due to on-site queuing and circulation impacts, if any, onto Harbor Boulevard. If deemed necessary, Staff may determine that necessary modifications to the site plan require consideration by the Planning Commission.

Milestone behavioral health care bill signed into law

Sep 14, 2022

After securing key amendments, Cal Cities, along with over 70 cities from throughout the state, urged the Governor to sign the bill into law.

On Wednesday, the Governor signed <u>SB 1338 (Umberg)</u> (https://ctweb.capitoltrack.com/public/search.aspx?id=ad485199-37cd-42cd-8217-d19b4d257119&session=21&s=SB%201338&t=bill) into law. The landmark bill establishes the Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment Court Program, also known as CARE Court. This critical legislation aligns closely with Cal Cites' 2022 State Action Agenda (/docs/default-source/advocacy/cal-cities-2022-action-agenda.pdf?sfvrsn=6478ad4b_6), which seeks to increase funding and resources to prevent homelessness and assist individuals experiencing homelessness.

Specifically, the CARE Court program aims to connect unsheltered individuals experiencing acute behavioral health needs with a court-ordered care plan managed by a care team in the community. These CARE plans could include clinically prescribed, individualized interventions with several supportive services, medication, and a housing plan.

After months of negotiations, Cal Cities <u>secured critical amendments</u> (https://www.calcities.org/news/post/2022/08/31/cal-cities-secures-key-amendments-to-care-court-legislation-as-it-advances-to-the-governor-s-desk) to help ensure the program's effective implementation. These amendments included a phased-in

approach to implementation, additional funding to get the program started, and a pathway for cities to participate in CARE plan negotiations.

Following those amendments, Cal Cities and a coalition of over 70 cities from throughout the state **submitted a letter**

(https://ct3.blob.core.windows.net/21blobs/b918f422-b5b7-47db-98c7-b09eb4545e00) to the Governor requesting his signature on SB 1338.

When the Governor signed the bill on Sept. 14, he expressed appreciation for local leaders, Cal Cities, and other stakeholders for supporting SB 1338 as it moved through the Legislature. He emphasized that the implementation of the CARE Court program will be realized at the local level, which is why statewide support is instrumental to ensuring the program's success.

Earlier this year, the Cal Cities Board of Directors adopted a new policy to support additional funding and resources to expand access to behavioral health services, especially for California's unhoused residents. This policy has guided Cal Cities' engagement on SB 1338 and, more broadly, has been instrumental in how Cal Cities has engaged on policies relating to homelessness.

General Assembly approves bylaw amendments and acts on petitioned resolution during annual conference

Sep 14, 2022

Delegates representing the League of California Cities' member cities approved changes to the organization's bylaws and voted on a petitioned resolution during the concluding General Assembly at the Annual Conference and Expo.

Recommended to the General Assembly by the Cal Cities Board of Directors, the bylaws changes (/docs/default-source/advocacy/2022-annual-conference-generalassembly-packet.pdf?sfvrsn=a9f245e6_3) are part of an ongoing effort to enhance Call Cities' governance system.

Among the set of recommendations, two required bylaws amendments. These amendments will:

- Formalize oversight of the General Resolutions Committee by establishing the second vice president as the chair of the committee, while retaining the president's authority to appoint the vice chair of the committee.
- Ensure a more inclusive Nominating Committee by adding one committee member appointed by the Cal Cities president from among the caucus directors and one additional committee member appointed from the at-large directors for a total of 13 committee members.



- Clarity that, unless the Board establishes otherwise, the president appoints the chair of Board-established committees.
- Remove "treasurer" from the title of the second vice president to avoid confusion and clarify organizational responsibilities,
- Replace the term "board member(s)" with "director(s)" to promote consistency.

The voting delegates approved these changes.

Voting delegates take action on petitioned resolution

Following the bylaws vote, delegates took action on a petitioned resolution (/docs/default-source/advocacy/petitioned-resolution-packet.pdf?sfvrsn=94120326_3) that would require Cal Cities to partner with, and help advance and qualify, the Brand-Mendoza-Candell Tripartisan Land Use Initiative for the November 2024 ballot.

Resolutions that focus on municipal issues of statewide importance are a key part of Cal Cities' policy development (/action-agenda/policy-and-resolutions). Under the annual conference resolutions process, members can submit resolutions 60 days in advance of the Annual Conference. Members can also submit a petitioned resolution 24 hours before the General Assembly begins.

To qualify, a petitioned resolution must be signed by 10% of the voting delegates and be germane to city issues. All qualified petitioned resolutions are forwarded to the General Resolutions Committee for consideration. The General Resolutions Committee consists of city officials appointed by each department, diversity caucus, division, and policy committee, along with city officials appointed by the Cal Cities president.



The petitioned resolution qualified and was forwarded to the General Resolutions Committee for consideration. Following public comment and Committee discussion, the General Resolutions Committee recommended that the resolution be referred to the Housing, Community, and Economic Development (/advocacy/policy-areas-and-committees/housing-community-and-economicdevelopment) and Environmental Quality (/advocacy/policy-areas-andcommittees/environmental-quality) policy committees for further study.

The General Assembly voted to approve the General Resolutions Committee's recommendation.

Cal Cities staff are now working on the next steps for the petitioned resolution to be reviewed by the policy committees.

Cal Cities appreciates the time and effort of all those who took part in the 2022 General Assembly and Annual Business Meeting. President highlights Cal Cities' advocacy accomplishments and building blocks for future success

A message from Cal Cities President Ali Sajjad Taj.

Last week, more than 2,000 city officials gathered in Long Beach for the 2022 League of California Cities Annual Conference and Expo. It was a great honor to be installed as the new Cal Cities president. It is an even greater honor to lead this organization as it continues to advance its 124-year-long mission: to expand and protect local control for cities. Being around such an impassioned and active gathering of thousands of city colleagues reminded me of the great strength of our organization.

As I start my new term, I believe it's important to acknowledge our recent accomplishments, while also committing ourselves fully to tackling the difficult challenges that lie ahead in 2023.

This past year will be remembered for the ongoing impacts of a pandemic, inflation at levels we haven't seen in decades, a declining economy, and an everworsening drought.

In the face of these challenges, city leaders showed strength and resilience by adapting innovative ways to serve our communities while also providing basic services with fewer resources — improving local streets and roads, planning and approving new housing, supporting unhoused residents, helping local businesses get back on their feet, and keeping communities safe.



2022, including:

- Housing. Cal Cities secured resources to support cities' efforts to jumpstart
 housing construction including nearly \$1 billion for low-income housing
 and infill construction and carved out flexibility for cities in bills that
 threaten local housing plans.
- Infrastructure. Cal Cities led a broad coalition against a large, unfunded transportation measure that would have required cities to adopt significant and costly bicycle, pedestrian, and traffic calming elements in their general plans. Cal Cities also defeated two measures that would have restricted local transportation funding.
- Homelessness. The Cal Cities Board of Directors adopted a policy that supports additional funding and resources to expand access to behavioral health services and that supports our county partners. With this new policy, we went to work on bills designed to modernize the behavioral health system, to better serve those who need it, including our unsheltered residents. This includes the CARE Court legislation that the Governor signed into law on Sept. 14, which includes Cal Cities' requested amendments.
- Climate resiliency and disaster preparedness. Cal Cities secured \$180 million in the state budget for organic waste recycling programs, which will go a long way towards helping advance our shared city and state priority to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Cal Cities also had a seat at the table for a landmark recycling bill, SB 54, that became law this year. SB 54 requires all single-use plastics to be recyclable or compostable by the next decade.

But our work is not finished. While we celebrate the progress on our advocacy priorities, we continue to face challenges in the Legislature and at the ballot box that threaten local funding for local services and our land use authority.



our legislative priorities and uphold local control. But this work will require a unified voice. It will take working together for all of our cities to be stronger and our advocacy to be more effective.

To uphold our unwavering commitment to expand and protect local control, the Board directed Cal Cities to establish near-, mid-, and long-term strategies, including exploring the feasibility of a ballot measure that fights back against the continual erosion of local control by the Legislature and Administration. And at this year's conference, the membership directed us to work through our committee process to review a potential ballot measure.

Staff have already begun this important but difficult work. Designing, qualifying, and passing ballot measures in California — particularly a constitutional amendment — is no small undertaking and certainly no guarantee. It takes months of policy research, polling, legal analysis, coalition building, fundraising, and other deliberations to construct a policy that meets the goals of the organization, while also meeting the approval of California's diverse electorate.

And it takes even more to actually win at the ballot. In 2022, gathering signatures to qualify a constitutional amendment cost between \$10-16 million. The cost for 2024 could be greater. And running a campaign to pass a measure takes many tens of millions of dollars more to educate California's 20 million voters. In fact, the average winning ballot campaign spent more than \$50 million in the 2020 election cycle. Clearly, Cal Cities cannot go it alone. It will take a broad coalition and extensive evaluation to determine if there is a viable path to success.

Toward that end, the Board also instructed Cal Cities to engage in a campaign against the deceptively named "Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act". Backed by the California Business Roundtable, the measure



challenges our mission to safeguard local control.

The California Business Roundtable has raised more than \$16 million and submitted 1,429,529 signatures to try to qualify this measure. It is likely to qualify for the November 2024 statewide ballot. We anticipate the business coalition will raise tens of millions more to push the measure in 2024.

We know what it will take to be successful at the ballot: tens of millions of dollars and a strong coalition of allies. We've already started building the coalition to oppose this measure and are working with very powerful groups: SEIU California, California Professional Firefighters, California Special Districts Association, California State Association of Counties, AFSCME California, and the California Alliance for Jobs, to name a few.

If and when this measure qualifies, we will need city officials to be all in to oppose this measure, spread the word, and raise the funds it will take to defeat it.

As I start my new term, the bottom line is that the state of Cal Cities is strong. I am confident that we will rise and respond to our challenges this year as we've been doing for over 120 years.
