# **RE:** SUPPORT: SB 1238 – Behavioral health services: existing and projected needs.

Honorable Governor Newsom,

The City of Garden Grove is pleased to offer its support for Senate Bill 1238 by Senator Eggman. SB 1238 would require the Department of Health Care Services, beginning January 1, 2024, and at least every five years thereafter, to conduct a review of and prepare a report regarding current and projected behavioral health care infrastructure and service needs in each region of the state. Data collection and sharing would be instrumental in understanding whether behavioral health services and infrastructure meet community needs and allow for effective planning for the future. Access to consistent, robust data statewide is the key to a health care system that is modern and evidence-based. ACC-OC recommends that these reports be made more frequently than once every five years to ensure the appropriate application of collected data in a timely manner.

## SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GAS COMPANY (SOCALGAS) NOTICE OF REQUEST TO INCREASE RATES FOR THE HYDROGEN BLENDING DEMONSTRATION PROJECT APPLICATION NO. A.22-09-006

## WHY AM I RECEIVING THIS NOTICE?

On September 8, 2022, Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas), San Diego Gas & Electric Company (SDG&E), and Southwest Gas Corporation (Southwest Gas) filed a Joint Application (A.22-09-006) to Establish Hydrogen Blending Demonstration Projects with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). As part of the application, SoCalGas is requesting a total of \$15.3 million in forecasted revenue requirement: \$3.2 million in 2023, \$8.3 million in 2024, \$1.0 million in 2025, \$2.5 million in 2026, and \$0.3 million in 2027.

If the CPUC approves this application, SoCalGas will recover forecasted costs in gas rates over a 5 year period beginning after approval of the application. This will impact your monthly bill.

## WHY IS SOCALGAS REQUESTING THIS RATE INCREASE?

SoCalGas is committed to helping its customers safely and affordably meet the state's decarbonization goals. As such, SoCalGas is requesting authorization to establish a hydrogen blending demonstration project that will help inform on a safe hydrogen standard to support the potential and phased integration of hydrogen into the existing natural gas system. The application covers costs associated with planning and implementing the blending project.

## HOW COULD THIS AFFECT MY MONTHLY GAS BILL?

If SoCalGas's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average Non-CARE residential monthly bill using 36 therms per month would increase by approximately \$0.03 or 0.05% per month in 2024. The proposed average rates shown below are for 2024, the highest revenue requirement year.

This application will be assigned to a CPUC Administrative Law Judge who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Administrative Law Judge will issue a proposed decision that may adopt SoCalGas's application, modify it, or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision with a different outcome. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners at a public CPUC Voting Meeting.

Parties to the proceeding may review the joint application, including the Public Advocates Office. Public Advocates Office is an independent consumer advocate within the CPUC that represents customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. #### SUMMARY/BACKGROUND

- The Oriental fruit fly (OFF) is an invasive pest that attacks over 230 crops: including citrus and other fruits, nuts, vegetables and berries. The short life cycle of the OFF allows rapid development of serious outbreaks, which can cause severe economic losses. Heavy infestations can cause complete losses of crops.
- A great number of crops in California are threatened by the introduction of this pest: including apple, apricot, avocado, bell pepper, fig, grape, grapefruit, lemon, lime, melons, nectarine, orange, peach, pear, persimmon, plum, pomegranate, tangerine, tomato and walnut. In California, the combined 2015 gross value of the commercial hosts potentially affected was over \$16.4 billion.
- Establishment of these flies would cause direct economic losses via damaged fruit, increased pesticide use statewide by commercial and residential growers in efforts to lessen this damage, loss of revenue due to export restrictions on fruit both domestically and internationally, and adverse impacts on native plants through the destruction of their fruit.
- OFF is widespread through much of the mainland of southern Asia and on neighboring islands.
- OFF was first recorded in Hawaii in 1946, and it now attacks nearly every commercial fruit crop grown there except pineapples.
- OFF was first found in California in 1960 and has been reintroduced every year since 1966 through the movement of infested fruits and vegetables into the state. Numerous eradication efforts undertaken by CDFA and USDA over the years have prevented these introductions from becoming permanently established.

## **LIFE CYCLE**

• Female OFF lay eggs in groups of 3 to 30 under the skin of host fruits. A single female can lay more than 1,000 eggs in her lifetime. Maggots tunnel through the fruit, feeding on the pulp. They shed their skins twice and emerge through exit holes in approximately 10 days. The larvae drop from the fruit and burrow two to three cm into the soil to pupate. In 10 to 12 days, the adults emerge. The newly emerged adult females need 8 to 12 days to mature sexually prior to egg laying. With an advanced infestation, breeding is continuous, with several annual generations. Adults live 90 days on the average and feed on honeydew, decaying fruit, plant nectar, bird dung and other substances. The adult is a strong flyer, recorded to travel 30 miles in search of food and sites to lay eggs. This ability allows the fly to infest new areas very quickly.


#### **ERADICATION PROGRAM**

- Protecting California's environment from invasive species is the goal, and eradication via male attractant technique is the strategy.
  - Male attractant technique (MAT) is the standard treatment technique for OFF. MAT is conducted in a 1.5-mile radius from each fly find site for a minimum of 9-square-miles.
  - Approximately 600 small, gel-like "bait stations" per square mile are applied to utility poles and street trees at a height of six to eight feet. The technique is repeated every two weeks for a minimum of four applications, or one to two life cycles, depending on the severity of the infestation.
  - These bait stations contain a male attractant (methyl eugenol) that is mixed with a small amount of the pesticide Spinosad. The bait stations will attract the male fruit flies looking for an opportunity to breed. The females go unmated and no offspring are produced, effectively causing eradication of the population.
  - MAT is specific for this group of flies and will not harm other insects such as bees or butterflies.
  - If larvae, mated females, or numerous males are detected, additional ground treatments may be required to mitigate the spread of OFF. In this case, host trees and plants within a 200-meter radius of the find site are treated with a handheld hose that consists of an organic formulation of Spinosad and protein bait.







# **Cocaine case is "wrapped" up**

# Nickelodeon Hotel coming to Garden Grove

The \$277 million project, subsidized with taxpayer money, is billed as a plan to attract tourists and create jobs

A Nickelodeon Hotel & Resort, featuring water slides and a lazy river, got the green light this week to be built in Garden Grove.

The Garden Grove City Council unanimously approved the sale of city land to a developer for a Nickelodeon-themed hotel, with 500 guest rooms, a spa, restaurants, and a 600-seat theater.

The \$277 million project on Harbor Boulevard and Twintree Lane is slated for the city's tourism district, called the Grove District, which attracts tourists visiting neighboring Disneyland.

City officials touted the benefits of the project as "pretty significant," which include millions in local taxes and hundreds of hotel and construction jobs, with a preference for hiring local residents and union construction workers to build the resort.

"I can't decide what I'm more excited about — to have SpongeBob or to have local jobs," Councilwoman Kim Nguyen told her colleagues prior to the vote on Tuesday, Sept. 13.

Councilwoman Stephanie Klopfenstein, who represents the area where the hotel will be built, called it "a historic project for Garden Grove" that will drive more tourism to the city.

To make the deal happen, Garden Grove agreed to give the developer, Newage Garden Grove II LLC in Arcadia, with Kam Sang Company Inc. as its managing partner, a break on the land sale and reimbursement of hotel tax revenue, expected to equal \$103 million in public assistance over a 30-year period.

Garden Grove is selling 3.72 acres of land the city has been acquiring for the past two decades. The city paid \$9.7 million for the land, and its related costs and is selling it for \$920,000, according to city documents. (The estimated value of the land is \$10.6 million, according to appraisals obtained by the city.)

The agreement also calls for giving the developer up to 60% of the city's hotel tax revenue for three decades, up to \$93 million.

"To achieve the scale of destination project, despite the significant challenges brought on by the COVID pandemic, an economic development assistance program would be necessary to bring this caliber of project forward," assistant city manager Lisa Kim told the council while presenting details of the agreement.

Meanwhile, a city analysis predicted the project will generate approximately \$236 million in various taxes and generate more business for Garden Grove's hotel corridor, pumping more than \$1.75 billion into the city's economy and another \$2 billion to the region over a 30-year period.

Kim said the project is expected to create 600-700 construction jobs plus 300-400 permanent hotel jobs and another 200 temporary hotel jobs.

The agreement incorporated a preference for hiring local residents in the construction of the project, with those jobs going to union workers. That was greeted enthusiastically by a number of union members in the audience, who spoke favorably of the agreement.

"These kinds of projects provide awesome opportunities for young men and women that are not going to go to college, but we will be able to put them on a pathway to the middle class," said Ernesto Medrano, representing the Los Angeles and Orange County Building and Construction Trades Council.

However, one labor group was left out of the agreement: the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 441. Councilman John O'Neill, the group's president, recused himself from the dais and did not participate in the discussion or votes related to the project. But some union members addressed the topic during public comments, telling council members they were disappointed not to be included.

"Having the IBEW left out of this agreement is a hard pill to swallow," said one Garden Grove resident who also is a representative of the labor group.

The city and the developer are expected to close escrow on the property before the end of the year. Under a schedule included in the agreement, following approvals and permits, groundbreaking is expected by Nov. 1, 2024, and completion of the hotel is slated for 2027.

The resort will feature a 23-story hotel, with a 9,490 square-foot ballroom, a variety of restaurants and other food areas totaling 22,296 square feet, a 7,000-square-foot arcade, a spa and fitness center, and 528 parking spaces. Other entertainment amenities will include a Nick Studio, a Studio Hall, and a Kid's Lounge.

"We'll be bringing Nickelodeon to the real world," said John Hicks, project manager for the Kam Sang Company. "I'm excited to see the characters off screen and bring them to reality."

The resort will include water slides, splash zones, a pool, and a lazy river where guests "have an animatronics experience," Hicks said.

The hotel does not plan to offer day-time passes, Hicks said. It's too early to say how much it will cost to spend the night at the Nickelodeon Hotel Resort, he added.

The resort in Garden Grove may be unique in the U.S.

The cable television channel best known for its shows for children and teens is affiliated with only two hotels and resorts in the world: one in the Dominican Republic's Punta Cana and the other in Mexico's Riviera Maya, according to the Nickelodeon Hotels & Resorts website. There used to be one in Orlando that featured an outdoor waterpark, but that is now a Holiday Inn resort, according to its website. Nickelodeon also has theme parks across the world, including a Nickelodeon Universe inside the Mall of America in Minnesota.

Nickelodeon representatives could not be reached for comment Friday.

Council members Phat Bui and George Brietigam, both former planning commissioners, noted that the project has been in the making for about a decade.

"It's been a long road," Bui said.

It first came to the City Council in 2016, but the developer had been in talks with Garden Grove officials for several years before then, Hicks said. At the time, the plan called for a larger project that included three towers with 100 timeshare units on nine acres. But some homeowners, Hicks said, were not willing to sell their houses, and the project was downscaled to the land that is already vacant and available. Earlier this summer, a union representing hospitality workers, UNITE HERE Local 11, voiced opposition to the project, saying there is a better use for that land by building much-needed homes, as mandated by the state of California. Maureen Blackmun, president of the Garden Grove Neighborhood Association, welcomes the project.

"This is a win for our city," Blackmun said.

# AB 1985 signed into law, giving cities more time to comply with organic waste procurement requirements

Sep 21, 2022

Cities now have an additional two years to comply with the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery's (CalRecyle) <u>SB</u> <u>1383 organic waste diversion</u> procurement requirements with Gov. Gavin Newsom's signing of <u>AB 1985 (R. Rivas)</u>.

Signed into law in 2016, SB 1383 calls for a dramatic reduction in the amount of food, yard, and other organic waste that is thrown away in order to reduce methane, a climate super polluter. As part of those regulations, cities must procure recycled organic products.

As of Jan. 1, 2022, all cities are required to be in full compliance with their SB 1383 regulation procurement requirements. However, due to the lack of statewide organic waste processing infrastructure, not all cities are in full compliance. AB 1985 creates a two-year phase-in period for cities to meet their procurement requirement targets.

The League of California Cities, along with other local government and waste associations, played a critical role in securing the bill's passage.

Mulch, compost, and renewable natural gas — oh my! SB 1383 requires every city to procure a specific amount of compost, mulch, or renewable natural gas from anaerobic digestion to develop a California-specific market for such material. This requirement is intended to spur the development of the compost and anaerobic digestion infrastructure in the state, which is necessary for cities and counties to comply with the full SB 1383 regulations. <u>Cal Cities and its partners</u> worked collaboratively with Am. Robert Rivas, his staff, and CalRecycle to develop a compromise bill that recognized the lack of needed organic waste processing infrastructure, while also balancing the need to implement the important methane reducing law.

Methane is 84 times more effective at trapping heat in the atmosphere than carbon dioxide over a 20-year time frame. Reducing this shortlived pollutant is one of the fastest ways to reduce the effects of climate change.

There are outstanding issues surrounding the procurement requirements — such as counting material processed out of state towards the procurement requirements. Discussions about these issues with CalRecycle, the Legislature, and stakeholders are ongoing.

## Looking forward

Now that AB 1985 is law, local governments will have until Jan. 1, 2025, to fully implement their city's procurement requirements. Continued city engagement with Cal Cities and CalRecycle will be critical to the successful implementation of these regulations. Cities are also encouraged to continue communicating with Cal Cities staff on how the implementation process is going.

# Governor vetoes sales tax bill that would have cost cities and counties more than \$2 billion

## Gov. Gavin Newsom noted Cal Cities' concerns in his veto message, stating, "We cannot ask our local governments to bear this loss in revenue."

Following months of advocacy by Cal Cities, Gov. Gavin Newsom vetoed <u>AB 1951 (Grayson)</u>, a sales and use tax exemption bill that would have greatly reduced local government revenues for housing, transit, public safety, and other critical services.

Specifically, the measure would have added locally approved tax rates to the current state General Fund-only sales and use tax exemption for the purchase of manufacturing equipment. Notably, the exemption did not include any requirements that would benefit local governments, such as job creation or environmental remediation.

Manufacturing is an invaluable part of many local economies. However, local budgets should not be undermined for statewide initiatives.

California already has the smallest sales tax base of any state. This, combined with stark regional differences in revenue growth, means that many cities are already unable to sustain the services they offered 15 years ago. Narrowing the sales tax base even further makes this critical revenue source less reliable.

To the extent that AB 1951 would have resulted in increased economic activity, the tax benefits would largely have been enjoyed by the state General Fund via increased personal income and corporation tax collections at the expense of local governments' sales and use tax revenue.

The Governor acknowledged Cal Cities' position in his veto message, stating, "I agree with the intent of this bill to invest in California's economy, incentivize innovation, and spur a manufacturing marketplace that is competitive nation-wide. However, we cannot ask our local governments to bear this loss in revenue." The veto came after the Governor signed AB 2887 (E. Garcia), which will increase the annual sales and use tax exclusion limit by \$50 million for eligible alternative energy and advanced manufacturing. The local government revenue loss resulting from AB 2887 is estimated to exceed \$25 million annually for three years. However, that revenue loss is a small fraction of the fiscal impact that would have resulted from AB 1951. According to the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, AB 1951 would have resulted in an estimated over \$2 billion revenue loss for local governments over the lifetime of the broadened sales and use tax exemption.

<u>Throughout the year</u>, Cal Cities urged lawmakers to backfill revenue loss to local governments for both measures using the state's <u>historic</u> <u>budget surplus</u>. Cal Cities, along with a coalition of counties, labor groups, and transit agencies, moved to an opposed position for the two bills after the budget was passed without any related financial relief.

The Governor and his staff paid close attention to the coalition's concerns, demonstrating the value of strong state and local partnerships and proactive, constructive conversations. Cal Cities looks forward to working with the Governor and the Legislature on the 2023-24 State Budget.
