1ST QUARTER FY 2025-26

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to present the FY 2025–26 1st Quarter Data Dashboard for the Central Cities Navigation Center (CCNC).

DISCUSSION

The CCNC Data Dashboard was developed in partnership with the Tri-Cities partners and serves as a visual tool to track service outcomes, client demographics, and progress toward permanent housing. This initiative fulfills a major Action Item under Goal #1 ("Enhance Communication and Community Engagement") of the City's Homelessness Strategy Action Plan for FY 2025–26, which identifies the development of a public-facing data dashboard by March 31, 2026.

The dashboard represents the Tri-Cities' continued commitment to transparency and data-driven decision-making in addressing homelessness. It consolidates operational data from June 2024 (program inception) through the end of the 1st quarter of FY 2025–26 (September 25, 2025). The dashboard includes resident demographics, income sources, housing search status, referrals to services, and housing outcomes. The dashboard will be updated quarterly and distributed to Tri-Cities stakeholders to support data-informed decisions regarding service delivery and resource allocation.

Since its inception in June 2024, the CCNC has served 349 individuals, including 4 veterans and 60 seniors aged 55 and older. During the 1st Quarter of FY 2025-26, 22 residents were successfully housed, representing 42% of all housing placements to date and a marked increase from previous quarters. A total of 52 residents have been successfully housed since June 2024, accounting for roughly 15% of all clients served, which aligns with industry benchmarks.

Family reunification exits decreased slightly, with 2 recorded during the quarter, suggesting a potential area for expanded coordination among case managers. Employment and income levels remain a challenge: 55 residents reported no income, while 22 residents reported some form of employment or benefits. Service referrals remain strong, with 28 referrals made this quarter, primarily for employment and housing navigation support.

Males continue to represent the majority (70%) of residents served, with consistent representation from older adults. The number of seniors accessing services remains steady, underscoring the continued need for supportive services for the aging population. Additionally, while service referrals remain robust, limited engagement with behavioral health and recovery programs suggests opportunities for deeper collaboration in those areas.

NEXT STEPS


- Collaborate with the Information Technology Department and Tri-Cities to prepare the dashboard for web publication by Q3 FY 2025–26.
- Continue collecting and analyzing quarterly data to identify emerging trends and performance gaps.
- Integrate dashboard highlights into Tri-Cities and City Council updates to support ongoing community engagement.



SUBSIDY PROGRAM

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to inform the City Manager about the launch of the Upwards Family Child Care Home Education Network (FCCHEN) Program, a subsidized child care initiative designed to support working families and those with specific care needs in Orange County.

DISCUSSION

The City of Garden Grove has an existing partnership with Upwards through the Boost Program, which provides technical assistance and business support to local home-based child care providers. This program was recently featured in a GGTV3 video, highlighting the City's efforts to expand licensed family child care businesses and strengthen economic opportunities for local providers.

This new initiative represents a natural extension of our existing collaboration. While the Boost Program focuses on helping providers expand and improve their business operations, the FCCHEN program complements this by directing subsidized child care clients to these same providers. The program will not only benefit Garden Grove families by increasing access to affordable child care but will also bolster our local family child care businesses, generating community-wide economic and social benefits.

The Upwards FCCHEN Program, operated in partnership with the State of California, provides financial assistance for child care at low or no cost for eligible families residing in Orange County. The program serves children from birth through age 13, and up to age 21 for youth with exceptional needs.

Eligibility is based on both income and need for care:

- Families qualify if their gross monthly income is at or below 85% of the State Median Income (SMI).
- Qualifying "need for care" categories include:
 - Employment or seeking employment;
 - Enrollment in school or training;
 - o Incapacity of a parent or guardian; and

> Active participation in Child Protective Services (CPS) or At-Risk referrals.

Families experiencing homelessness or receiving protective services are automatically eligible, regardless of income or employment status. Child care is delivered through a network of licensed and vetted Family Child Care Home (FCCH) providers, ensuring a safe and nurturing environment that meets state regulatory standards. The Upwards Program facilitates both provider matching and enrollment, removing the burden of searching for care independently.

Participation in the program helps advance local workforce development by reducing barriers to employment and education for low-income and at-risk families. Staff is collaborating with Upwards to develop Spanish and Vietnamese versions of the program flyer, which will be posted alongside the English version on the City's Boost Program web-page at ggcity.org/boost.

Engagements Summary

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update on the Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) meetings conducted in September and October 2025, including a business visit where staff shared Placer.ai analytics, City resources and performance insights supporting business retention growth.

BACKGROUND

The BRE program aligns with the City's Economic Development Strategy and serves as a platform to strengthen relationships between the business community, Economic Development staff and City leadership. Through ongoing engagement, the program connects City resources to business needs and identifies opportunities for growth and retention.

DISCUSSION

Between September and October 2025, the Economic Development team conducted BRE visits with The Wharf, Azteca Restaurant and Lounge, American Metal Bearing Company, Code Ninjas, the property owner of 11757 Harbor Boulevard, and Jerusalem Roastery. These meetings were part of the City's ongoing BRE initiative aimed at strengthening relationships with local businesses, identifying challenges, and exploring opportunities for business prosperity. Discussions covered topics such as workforce development, business obstacles, financial resources, and potential expansion plans. Staff continues to follow up with participating businesses to provide targeted resources, data insights, and identify future partnership opportunities.

The Wharf - September 17, 2025



The Wharf remains a prominent dining and entertainment venue on Main Street. During the BRE visit, staff discussed operations, workforce training, and opportunities to attract additional patrons. Guidance was provided on available business loans, SBDC assistance, and promotional collaboration with other downtown businesses.

Azteca Restaurant and Lounge - September 19, 2025

Azteca Restaurant, a family-owned establishment with deep community roots, continues to play an important role in Garden Grove's cultural identity. Staff met with ownership to discuss operations and community engagement. The owner shared concerns about nearby homelessness, and staff provided information on local support resources as well as small business stabilization programs.



American Metal Bearing Company – September 22, 2025



American Metal Bearing Company (AMB), founded in 1921, continues to serve as a key manufacturer for the U.S. Navy and an anchor employer in Garden Grove's industrial sector. Staff met with owner, Mr. Perris Anawati to discuss ongoing workforce recruitment needs, modernization efforts, and available funding programs to support future expansion.

Code Ninjas – September 25, 2025

Code Ninjas Garden Grove, a veteran-owned business providing youth coding and robotics education, met with staff to discuss growth opportunities and community outreach. The owner expressed interest in workforce partnerships and future collaborative events with the City to expand visibility and engagement.



Property of 11757 Harbor Blvd – September 25, 2025

The property at 11757 Harbor Boulevard is a key site within the Grove District. Staff met with ownership to discuss investment opportunities, share the City's strategic vision for the corridor, and address area concerns. Information was provided on potential redevelopment options and ongoing City initiatives supporting business growth in the district.

Jerusalem Roastery- October 21, 2025

Staff conducted a business visit with a local roastery to share Placer.ai analytics illustrating customer visitation trends, dwell time, and regional draw. The data revealed increased foot traffic and engagement following the Foods of Garden Grove Live 2025 event, highlighting peak operating hours and the geographic range of visiting customers. Upon reviewing the findings, the business owner expressed appreciation for the insights and noted that the positive performance outcomes encouraged the family-owned establishment to move forward with expansion plans sooner than anticipated. The analytics demonstrated how measurable visitation data can strengthen business confidence, inform operational decisions, and



reinforce the City's ongoing efforts to support business growth through data-driven engagement.

CONCLUSION

The BRE program continues to reinforce the City's partnership with local business community through tailored support, proactive engagement, and applied data analytics. By leveraging insights from Placer. ai and direct outreach, the City remains committed to fostering a business-friendly environment that promotes sustained investment and economic vitality throughout Garden Grove.

Pro-GGPD resolution approved

A surprise special meeting of the Garden Grove City Council on Wednesday evening featured unsurprising backing for a resolution in support of the city's police department and chief, and a surprising refusal to vote on it from one member of the council.

Five members of the council, led by Mayor Stephanie Klopfenstein and echoed by Councilmembers Philip Nguyen, Cindy Tran and Yesenia Muneton and Ariana Arestegui, voted in favor of a resolution reading – in its conclusion: "the city council does hereby affirm its support for the Garden Grove Police Department, its officers and the chief of police [Amir El-Farra] in their daily duties and activities providing for the public safety of the city's residents, businesses and visitors, and encourages the public to report any crime that may be committed and approach the city's police officers without hesitation or fear."

Councilman George Brietigam was absent.

Mayor Pro Tem Joe DoVinh recused himself from voting. A recusal usually refers to removing oneself from a case or issue based on potential conflict of interest or the appearance of bias.

Klopfenstein praised the chief for his "professionalism and outstanding leadership."

Other council members cited El-Farra's availability and connection to the community, and the GGPD's status as a leader in the law enforcement community.

But DoVinh didn't want to support the resolution.

"I guess I'm on the hot seat," he said. DoVinh, in comments allegedly made in a Vietnamese language news outlet has been accused of criticizing El-Farra and threatening to fire him.

"I have not called for the firing of our chief, or any one on [city] staff," he said. "I am just calling for accountability." He added that he has been criticized for "expressing a healthy skepticism" and providing a "check and balance."

On the issue of who had the power to hire or fire city leadership, he said that authority rested with the city council, of which he was a member.

He also suggested that the recent city council resolutions without specifics may be a waste of time. "Resolutions are not solutions," he said.

Neither El-Farra nor any other top police department staff were present in the council chamber during the discussion, but the chief spoke to those outside the chamber after adjournment.
