OBJECTIVE

To provide City Council with information about Community Services being awarded a grant to start a youth archery program.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

The Community Services Department is excited to announce that the City has been awarded a state-wide competitive grant valued at \$4,500 from USA Archery (USAA) and the California Parks and Recreation Society (CPRS).

The grant includes: training for two full-time staff to become certified as USAA Level 2 Instructors (\$400 value), \$4,000 worth of archery equipment (bows, arrows, targets, etc.), as well as the youth Explore Archery curriculum (\$100 value).

Garden Grove was also selected to be the host city for the USAA Instructor training and as a result will be the first agency to begin the municipal archery program in California. Additionally, twenty-four (24) staff will travel from twelve (12) cities across California to be in attendance for the two-day training. This will take place inside the gymnasium at the Garden Grove Sports and Recreation Center on December 13 and 14, 2018. Two Garden Grove staff will be trained as USAA Level 2 Instructors which will then allow them to train part-time staff and volunteers as USAA Level 1 Instructors. This will ensure our archery program is operated at USAA standards.

The youth archery program will operate inside the gymnasium at the Garden Grove Sports and Recreation Center. Initially, we will host a couple of free, "Try Archery" events to create some "buzz" to introduce the sport to our community. These events are scheduled to take place on February 22, 2019 and March 23, 2019. Following those events, we will launch the youth Explorer Archery program to establish a solid foundation of youth archers. Once the program is established, we would like to implement a youth archery league.




Honor Our Veterans on Sunday, Nov. 11th at 11:00 a.m. at El Toro Memorial Park's 30th Annual Veterans Day Program

According to Dictionary.com a "patriot" is a person who loves, supports, and defends his or her country and its interests with devotion. There is no better illustration of the term "patriot" than the Veteran. Veterans are the living embodiment of loyalty and commitment to country, regardless of the cost. On Sunday, November 11th at 11:00 a.m., El Toro Memorial Park will be holding its 30th Annual Veterans Day Observance to pay tribute to these heroes. We owe them a debt of gratitude, for it is through their sacrifice that we enjoy a life of freedom and liberty that is often taken for granted.

The program's Keynote Speaker, Mr. Yoshio Nakamura, gives us a compelling example of almost unbelievable patriotism, courage, and grace. Even though he was born in the United States, at the age of 18, Mr. Nakamura found himself and his family forced from their El Monte farm and relocated to an interment camp in Gila River, Arizona by the United States Government. Then, an Army Recruiter traveled to the internment camp looking for volunteers to sign up for service in World War II, and Mr. Nakamura said, "Yes!" To meet this inspirational veteran and hear his whole story, you'll need to come to the program.

This year also marks the 100th Anniversary of Armistice Day and the end of World War I. Frank Cook with the American Legion Post 862, will have a WWI Patriotic Historical Display and will give a brief talk on the War to End All Wars.

The program will also include combined color guards, special music by local area vocalist, Mr. John Huntington, a wreath laying ceremony by council members from the surrounding cities, a POW/MIA Remembrance Table, a bagpipe performance of "Amazing Grace", and "Taps" will be performed by a bugler. VFW Edward J. Kearns Post 6024 will also be providing an Honor Guard Firing Salute.

Mrs. Deeter, along with former General Manager Sam Randall, are largely responsible for the genesis of our Veterans Day programs. Judy Deeter has led the program almost every year since its inception.

Don't let another Veterans Day go by without acting on the intent of the holiday. Come and thank our Veterans and show that you understand and appreciate their service. The event will take place rain or shine and admission is free.



Dia de los Muertos at Anaheim Cemetery is All About Family! Please Join us on Friday, Nov. 2nd from 6:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m.

Dia de los Muertos or Day of the Dead, is a joyful time when families come together to remember and celebrate the lives of those loved ones who have passed on. The holiday, which runs from October 31st to November 2nd is steeped in traditions and festivities.

The Orange County Cemetery District recognizes the importance of this holiday and invites everyone in the community to come out to Anaheim Cemetery on Friday, November 2nd from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. to enjoy an evening filled with entertainment, free refreshments and crafts for the kids.

The evening will begin with a brief Dia de los Muertos service conducted by St. Anthony Mary Claret Catholic Church in Anaheim. As a part of the event, the District gives out free, small bouquets of marigolds, until supplies run out. Marigolds are an important symbol of the holiday and the vibrant blooms and scent are said to guide the spirits of departed loved ones to the altars or ofrendas that families lovingly create in their honor. The service typically includes a blessing on these flowers as well.

Family Friendly Entertainment

Following the blessing, children and teens from our local community who are learning the traditions of folkloric music and dance will provide the entertainment.

Ballet Folklorico Donaji is a local youth dance group that will perform a variety of traditional dances with performers ranging in age from 4 to 21. Rhythmo Mariachi Academy, a non-profit organization founded by Gabriel Zavalas will perform a variety of folkloric mariachi music for all to enjoy. The academy is dedicated to preserving, teaching and helping youth to appreciate the history, the art, and the music of the Indian and Hispanic cultural heritage.

Free Crafts for the Kids

We'll have an assortment of crafts ready for children to enjoy including crayon crafts for the little ones with Dia de los Muertos masks and coloring pages from the movie "Coco". Older children will enjoy drawing Dia de los Muertos faces on pre-painted stones with permanent colored markers and creating beautiful tissue paper marigolds.

Free Refreshments

As you enjoy the entertainment, snack on free desserts while supplies last, including locally baked Pan de Muertos, spiced hot chocolate, coffee, and water.

Build an Ofrenda

Families are encouraged to decorate the gravesites of their loved ones with ofrendas or personal alters. Items should be removed from gravesites by Tuesday, Nov. 13th. Please do not leave anything of great montetary or sentimental value on the graves as the Cemetery cannot maintain the security of items left in a public place. Remember, that candles with real flame are prohibited.

Angel of Hope to Hold 17th Annual Candlelight Service, Thurs. Dec. 6th

If you have experienced the loss of a child at any age, you will want to consider attending the Angel of Hope Candlelight Service scheduled for Thursday, December 6th at 7:00 p.m. at El Toro Memorial Park.

The service is a beautiful way for families who have experienced this loss to come together to remember these precious lives who have left us all too soon. The program includes special music, poetic readings, and always ends

with a very poignant and personal time when families are invited to come forward, speak their child's name, and place white flowers of remembrance at the Angel of Hope Monument located in the Infant Section. Candles are provided for the adults and it is recommended that you bring your own lawn chair and a flashlight.

Be a Part of the Movement to Remember Veterans this Holiday Season with Wreaths Across America at El Toro Memorial Park on

Saturday Morning, Dec. 15th at 9 a.m.

Wreaths Across America is a non-profit organization that was started when a wreath making company had a surplus inventory one holiday season. The owner, Mr. Morrill Worcester, remembered a boyhood trip to Arlington National Cemetery and immediately decided he would donate his unsold wreaths to decorate the graves in an older part of Arlington that was receiving fewer and fewer visits each year. This became an annual, although largely unnoticed effort for some time. Then one year, the iconic picture (bottom right) of his efforts in Arlington went viral and the movement took off. Today Wreaths Across America and its army of volunteers, places over 700,000 memorial wreaths at 1,000 locations in the United States and beyond.

Thanks to American Heritage Girls Troop 356, El Toro Memorial Park was included in this effort for the first time in 2017 with the laying of approximately 150 wreaths in the Southeast Section. (Middle right photo from 2017) The Troop is participating again this year and would like to place even more wreaths for our Veterans. There are two ways you can help.


To have a wreath placed on the grave of a Veteran at El Toro Memorial Park or to volunteer to help place wreaths that have been sponsored, please follow the directions below.

- Visit <u>www.wreathsacrossamerica.org</u>
- 2. You will need to select El Toro Memorial Park, so please do not just click on the red "sponsor" box. Instead, click on the white text just below the red "sponsor" box that says, "Sponsor a Specific Cemetery"
- 3. Type "El Toro Memorial Park" in the search field and then click on El Toro Memorial Park when the option appears.
- 4. Click on the "View" Tab.

From this page, you can either sponsor wreaths for placement at El Toro Memorial Park, or you can volunteer to attend the wreath laying ceremony and help place wreaths.

If you would like a portion of the proceeds to benefit one of the two fundraising groups that are selling wreaths for El Toro Memorial Park, scroll down to the bottom of the page to see "Local Groups Supporting Us." Just click on the "sponsor" box for the group you would like to support. Wreaths cost \$15.00 each. Please be advised that wreath placements cannot be assigned to specific gravesites. Wreaths ordered are delivered directly to El Toro Memorial Park prior to the wreath placement ceremony in December.

The wreaths are much more than just decoration. As each wreath is placed, volunteers are encouraged to take the time to speak that Veteran's name, thank him or her for their service, and to pray for the Veteran's family. It is an expression of appreciation that fits perfectly with Wreaths Across America's mission to remember U.S. Veterans, to honor those who serve, and to teach our children about the value of freedom.

American Heritage Girls Troop 356 works very hard to make sure our Veterans are remembered and honored at this event. Before the wreaths are placed, the Troop holds a brief ceremony at the flag pole directly above the Los Alisos lawns.

Last year's program included a moment of silence to remember the fallen, prisoners of war, and those missing in action. The Troop presented the Colors and one of their members sang the national anthem. Then seven wreaths were presented honoring each branch of the United States Military including one for MIA/POW. As each wreath was presented, a member of the Troop accompanied a Veteran who had served in that branch of the Armed Services. The public is welcomed and encouraged to attend. The event will take place rain or shine, so please dress for the weather.

The California Special Districts Association (CSDA) Honors the Orange County Cemetery District at Annual Conference

The District of Distinction is an accreditation program offered through the Special District Leadership Foundation that enables districts to demonstrate to their communities, legislators, and other key stakeholders, their commitment to operate in a sound, responsible manner. The Orange County Cemetery District was recognized by CSDA in September for renewing its District of Distinction accreditation at the Platinum step, which is the highest level possible.

To achieve this status, Districts must demonstrate proper fiscal management and sound operating policies. The District must earn the District Transparency Certificate of Excellence. All Trustees and the General Manager must complete the Special District Leadership Academy with modules in Governance Foundations, Setting Direction and Community Leadership, and the Board's role in both Human Resources and Finance and Fiscal Accountability. In addition, they must each complete another ten hours of continuing education. Finally, the General Manager must earn the Special District Administrator Certification.

The Orange County Cemetery District was also given the Exceptional Public Outreach and Advocacy Award for its efforts to improve and build relationships with communities and to increase the District's visibility. Specifically, the District was recognized for three events including: The Anaheim Cemetery Candlelight

El Toro Memorial Park to Close Daily at 5:00 p.m. Beginning on Sunday, November 4, 2018



Don't forget - Daylight Saving Time ends on Sunday November 4th. Remember to set your clocks back one hour when you go to bed on Saturday night. The end of Daylight Saving Time is also a good opportunity to check the batteries in your home's smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. It can save your life!

Beginning on Sunday, Nov. 4th. El Toro Memorial Park will close its gates promptly at 5 p.m. each night. The park will continue to close each night at 5 p.m. until Daylight Saving Time begins again on Sunday, March 10, 2019. There is no exterior lighting in the park and during the winter months it is very dark on the grounds as early as 5 p.m. We don't want anyone to trip or fall because they could not clearly see where they are going, particularly since staff is gone after 5 p.m. We ask for all visitors to please be respectful of this policy and exit the park <u>before</u> 5 p.m.

We also ask that you please take care to plan your visits to the park so that you do not arrive minutes before the gate is supposed to close. Last minute entry in to the park delays staff's ability to close the gates on time and results in overtime costs that must be paid when staff is forced to stay late. We appreciate your help and cooperation in this regard.

Staff Scrambles to Clean Up Parks After Damaging Winds

When severe wind gusts hit Orange County on Oct. 14th, staff struggled to clean up the debris left on the grounds. El Toro Memorial Park was hit hardest, with five trees downed and over a dozen other trees that lost large branches. The District estimates it will take staff approximately 120 hours to replace the trees that were destroyed. The District will buy new 24" to 36" box trees at a cost of \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Santa Ana Cemetery lost one smaller tree, while Anaheim Cemetery saw no significant damage. At all three parks, some lawns were so covered in pine needles and leaves that the lawns were no longer visible. Gravesite decorations were also scattered across the grounds, with no way for staff to know what decorations belonged on which gravesite. We appreciate your understanding if your decorations were lost and apologize for any inconvenience.

Santa Ana Historical Preservation Society Holds Annual Tour

On Saturday, Oct. 20th, approximately 300 people strolled through Fairhaven Memorial Park and Santa Ana Cemetery learning about the fascinating, hidden history of Orange County's "American Royalty". This was the 21st annual cemetery tour organized by the Santa Ana Historical Preservation Society. Volunteer docents provided historical narratives at each stop, and students from the Orange County School of the Arts made history come alive by acting out scenes from the lives of those featured on the tour. Santa Ana Cemetery stops featured Charity and Elton Rembsberg and Benjamin and Franklin Grouard. Charity Remsberg was the sister of President Warren G. Harding, who died suddenly when he was only 57 years old. Benjamin Grouard was one of the earliest Mormon missionaries to French Polynesia and married Princess Nahina of the Island of Anaa. His son, Frank Grouard served with the Pony Express, was captured by the Sioux Indians, and adopted as family by Chief Sitting Bull. He later became Chief Scout of the United States Army under General George Cook.

Construction Update: Anaheim Restroom Renovations Complete

Visitors to Anaheim Cemetery will be happy to hear that work on the new public restroom is complete (pictured right). This means an indoor restroom is now available on weekends and when the office is closed. We hope you enjoy the new facility and that it makes for a more pleasant experience when you are visiting Anaheim Cemetery.

EL TORO NICHE PROJECT UPDATE

Framing for the new public restroom is almost complete. Rebar is in place for the footings of the covered niche structure, and rebar is being installed for the niche walls and the lower retaining wall. The upper retaining wall is complete, and new wrought iron fencing is being installed. Trenching for the sewer line is also underway. Due to various delays, the estimated completion date is now early 2019. We apologize for the wait, and appreciate your continued patience during construction.




Flower Removal and Holiday Schedule

Every Wednesday, groundskeepers remove flowers throughout all three cemeteries. Living plants in approved containers or planter dishes and other non-perishable items placed on graves, will be taken to the pick-up locations near the maintenance yards at each cemetery and held for a reasonable amount of time. Unless claimed, they will be disposed of.

Families are encouraged to remove their flowers or decorations on Tuesday night; you can then place the flowers back on the space on Wednesday afternoon.

The District does allow for flowers and decorations to be left on the spaces during holidays/events or for special occasions, such as anniversaries, birthdays and for new interments. Please come to the cemetery office and let us know that you have a birthday or anniversary and request that the flowers and decorations be left on the space. We do ask that you empty the vase and place fresh water in the container every four to five days to eliminate mosquito breeding sources, which can cause serious health issues. Your cooperation in this regard is greatly appreciated.

In honor of Thanksgiving, Christmas, Kwanza and Hanukkah, flowers may be placed on gravesites beginning on Thursday, November, 15th until Tuesday, January 8th.

GG voters approve 1-cent sales tax

GARDEN GROVE voters approved a 1-cent sales tax on Tuesday, as did voters in Placentia, Santa Ana and Seal Beach.

Voters in Garden Grove voted overwhelmingly on Tuesday to impose a 1-cent sales tax – Measure O –in response to pleas from some community leaders that the city faced a financial crisis.

As of 10 a.m. on Wednesday, the Orange County Registrar of Voters reported that 15,573 voters (63.1 percent) had voted yes, while 9,110 (36.9 percent) were opposed.

The measure required a simple majority to be approved. The city won't be receiving any revenue until April, however.

Measure O was placed on the ballot by the city council as financial projections showed that a change in the state employees pension fund is requiring that all cities pay a significantly larger share.

Garden Grove isn't the only city pursuing a sales tax solution to the "structural deficit" caused in part by pension costs. Voters in Placentia, Santa Ana and Seal Beach approved similar measures, and "hotel taxes" were raised in San Clemente and Tustin.

In nearby Anaheim, a proposal to raise the minimum wage paid to workers at hotels subsidized by the city to \$15 (and to \$18 later) was narrowly ahead by the margin of 23,472 to 23,050.


We've all been inundated with political ads in our mailboxes and TV programs. Finally, it's the public which gets to speak.

Voters in the communities of Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Stanton and Westminster will head to the polls on Tuesday to select city councils, school boards, and legislators and decide several ballot measures.

Thousands have already cast their ballots, either by mail or at one of eight early-voting centers. On Tuesday, the local polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

That race, considered to be very close, may have a role in determining whether the Democrats will retake control of the U.S. House of Representatives.





Closely watched also will be the 34th state Senate District contest between Janet Nguyen (Republican) and Tom Umberg (Democrat), and the 72nd State Assembly District contest between Democrat Josh Lowenthal and Republican Tyler Diep.

Although not in our coverage age, Anaheim's Measure L is of interest because it would require a minimum wage of \$15 for workers at hotels where the developer has received a subsidy from the city. That wage would increase by one dollar a year until it reached \$18.

The proposal had led to friction between Disney and city leadership.

Here's a look at the ballot choices for local voters.

- **Garden Grove:** To be chosen will be a mayor and council members from Districts 1, 3 and 4. Also, Measure 0, which will require a simple majority to pass.
- Huntington Beach: Four council members to be elected (chosen at large) and a city attorney.
- **Stanton:** A mayor to be elected, and council members from Districts 1 and 3.
- Westminster: A mayor to be elected and two council members (chosen at large).
- Garden Grove Unified School District: A board member from Area 4.
- Huntington Beach Union High School District: Three board members to be elected.
- Huntington Beach City School District: Three board members to be elected.
- Ocean View School District: Three board members to be elected at large.
- Westminster School District: Board members from Areas 2 and 5.

"The Academy is transforming this traditional elementary school into a 21st century academy infused with next-generation technology and innovative instruction," said district Public Information Officer Abby Milone.

"Coding is everywhere and it's the young people who are using computer programming to solve real-world problems and improve our way of life," said Board of Education and Superintendent Bob Harden.

"It's only been a year-and-a-half ago that my colleagues and I attended a conference and presentation from Code to the Future — where I was immediately hooked on the idea - and said, We have to bring this to Garden Grove Unified School District.'

Harden said that the partnership with Code to the Future made perfect sense, as the students already are used to having electronic devices in their hands, with the use of cell phones.

"Presenting students with this new opportunity to use coding and learn computer science principles was a natural fit," he said. "I remember growing up watching the Jetsons cartoon thinking how far-fetched it was but it wasn't so far-fetched after all, as most of the inventions in the Jetsons have come to fruition; my wristwatch functions as a computer and there are robots to clean our houses. What's next?"

Harden went on to say that in future, it will be these students who use technology to create programs that predict heart attacks before they occur and students who will use their love of robotics to build medical devices that reduce pain and allow people to live longer and students who develop computer programs that prevent terror-

"Simply put, our students will be prepared for tomorrow and they will be ready to fill jobs that haven't even been invented vet." said Harden.

Two sixth-grade students were asked to share their feelings and experiences with the technology skills they have already learned; they were Bradley Lamadrid and Andrea Valdovinos.

"Writing code is writing a precise set of instructions a computer or device can un-

derstand," said Bradley. "What haven't even been created or that it's everywhere; take your phones for instance. Smartphones aren't smart on their own as Smartphones were created by a person who wrote code to make that phone do all of the amazing things it does. We write the code to tell it to do the smart stuff and pretty much anything with a plug or battery uses code. I feel fortunate every day that I get to learn coding at school because I know that this is a great learning opportunity for us all."

"Why code? Why computer science?" Andrea asked. "Because our future depends on it and when the average employee at Google was my age, Google wasn't even invented but now it's part of everyday life. We are being prepared for not only jobs that are out there but jobs that 21st century job mark t."

makes coding so important is imagined; with the rapid growth of technology, who knows what will be around in 20 years; job opportunities change, which means that education needs to change as well, and computer science is the highest-paying college degree in demand, with 1.4 million computer science jobs being forecast in 2020, with only 400,000 qualified candidates.

"It was pretty overwhelming, it was really nice," Richards said.



Clarity coming, slowly, in O.C. races

Diep in Assembly, Nguyen in Senate seem to be winners; ballots remain uncounted

Westminster Councilman Tyler Diep appeared poised to win the Assembly District 72 race, as did incumbent state Sen. Janet Nguyen in her bid to retain her Senate District 34 seat, according to unofficial ballots results posted Wednesday by the Orange County Registrar of Voters.

With all precincts reporting but many provisional ballots and other votes still out, incumbents in four key state Senate and Assembly races in Orange County

were winning late Wednesday. Meanwhile, Diep had a commanding lead over opponent Josh Lowenthal, a Huntington Beach business executive, for a seat vacated by Assemblyman Travis Allen.

But a sizable number of ballots remains to be counted — almost 420,000 — and some candidates are waiting to see more results before declaring victory or conceding.

Assembly District 72

In one of the more contentious Southern California Senate races, Diep was leading with 54.2 percent of the votes to Lowenthal's 45.8 percent. Both men sought to replace Allen, the GOP assemblyman who has held the post since 2012 and opted to run for governor, unsuccessfully, instead of reelection.

Although more ballots are left to be counted, Diep, a Republican, said he's declaring victory because absentee ballots tend to favor Republican candidates — especially in the Little Saigon area and he didn't foresee a different outcome with late absentee ballots.

"The only thing we don't know is with the provisional ballots. We won pretty handily with the early absentee ballots. We don't see how the late absentee ballots will change," Diep said Wednesday.

Diep said he looks forward to earning the trust and support of all voters, including those who did not vote for him.

"Right now, my number one priority is to put the polarization of our community behind us so that we can work on issues where there's common ground. That's what we need to do as a community and as a nation," Diep said in a phone interview.

In a Tweet Wednesday morning, Lowenthal thanked his supporters, saying: "...while I won't be able to represent you in Sacramento, I'm still here and will not stop doing what I can to make our quality of life better."

Lowenthal, a Democrat, is the son of Congressman Alan Lowenthal. He spent nearly \$1.8 million as of the latest Oct. 20 filing with the California Secretary of State. Diep, who emigrated

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to the United States from Vietnam, spent more than \$1 million during the same period this year.

The ethnically diverse listrict includes Little Saigon and all or portions of Seal Beach, Huntington Beach, Los Alamitos, Garlen Grove, Fountain Valey, Santa Ana and Westninster, along with unincorporated Rossmoor and Midway City.

Senate District 34

In the diverse state Sentte District 34 area, which ncludes Little Saigon and parts of Long Beach, incument GOP senator Nguyen ilso appeared headed for ı win over challenger Tom Jmberg, a former threeerm Democratic Assemblynan looking to unseat her.

She was leading late Vednesday with 54.6 perent of the ballots while Jmberg took 45.4 percent, ccording to the latest reults.

Nguyen, a Vietnamese efugee who has made a name for herself in Little aigon and elsewhere, was hallenged by Umberg, a reired U.S. colonel who has vorked as a federal crimial prosecutor and was apointed by President Bill linton as his administraion's deputy drug czar.

Neither Nguyen nor Umerg posted victory or deeat on their public social nedia sites. Neither could

be reached for comment Norris' campaign director, Wednesday.

Assembly District 74

In the 74th District, which encompasses coastal central Orange County and includes Irvine, incumbent Republican Matthew Harper had a slim lead to challenger Cottie Petrie-Norris, a Laguna Beach businesswoman. Harper had 436 more votes than Petrie-Norris, or 50.2 percent to 49.8 percent.

Neither wanted to say Wednesday who won with so many ballots still left to be counted.

"I think we'll have a good idea over the next three days," Harper said.

Claire Conlon, Petrie-

wrote in an e-mail: "There are thousands and thousands of votes to be counted in the coming days.

Harper, a former Huntington Beach mayor, has represented the district since 2014. Petrie-Norris serves on the board of the Laguna Beach Democratic Club and the city's housing and human services committee.

The district has a majority white population and there are more Republicans than either Democrats or independent voters. But the race is considered competitive, with Democrats outspending Harper by a 3-1 ratio.

"I knew this was going to

be a tough election," Harper

Noting that national attention and money poured into Orange County Congressional races. Harper said it's affected his contest: "More money may have been spent in the area I represent attacking Republicans than any other part of the country.'

Assembly District 65

Sharon Quirk-Silva was another incumbent winning in unofficial election reports from the Orange County Registrar.

She declared victory on Facebook, thanking voters and volunteers for supporting her: "I will humbly serve all of my district to the best of my ability. ... You made the difference for us to win this seat.'

But her opponent, Alexandria Coronado, said too many ballots are still out to announce a winner.

"We haven't conceded anything," Coronado said.
"If I was Sharon Quirk-Silva, I wouldn't be so quick to declare victory.

Quirk-Silva had 4,540 more votes in the latest count, or 52.9 percent of the ballots to Coronado's 47.1 percent.

A former teacher in the Fullerton School District and a former Fullerton mayor, Quirk-Silva first served the 65th Assembly District from 2012-2014. She then lost the seat to You Kim in 2014 but took it be from Kim in 2016.

Coronado, previou served as a trustee the Anaheim Union Hi School District school box and the Orange Cour Board of Education.

Quirk-Silva, a Democı spent about \$1.8 mill this year to retain her s representing north Orar County. Coronado, a Repi lican, spent about \$269.0 this year, according to 1 most recent campaign nance reports.

The district includes p tions of Anaheim, Bue Park, Cypress, Fullerte Garden Grove, La Pali and Stanton.

Senate District 36

An incumbent with a s nificant lead over her ponent in unofficial resu was state Sen. Pat Bates Republican who has serv in various elected po tions for almost three (cades. Bates led with percent of her distric votes, with almost 23,0 more votes than her ch lenger, Oceanside bu nesswoman Marggie Ci tellano.

The Planning Commission will also consider approval of a Lot Line Adjustment to modify existing lot lines to consolidate the two subject parcels into one; a Site Plan to allow the construction of a 4,241 square foot automatic car wash, an 1,870 square foot drive-thru restaurant, a 2,700 square foot sit-down restaurant, a 2,846 square foot movie theater expansion, and related site improvements; and a Conditional Use Permit to allow the operation of the automatic car wash. MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Lazenby mentioned that at a recent street lighting meeting, the Los Angeles representative stated that the new Los Angeles area LED standard was 3,000K and that residential LED would be 2,700K. He also asked why the sound wall had not been installed at the Chevron car wash at Chapman Avenue and Valley View Street. Staff responded that due to the location of utilities, the wall could not be installed. The alternative was to keep the wash tunnel door closed during the cycle, and re-open the door when the cycle was complete. Lastly, Commissioner Lazenby commented that the back area of the bowling alley on Valley View Street needed a trash clean-up. Staff would contact Code Enforcement.

Vice Chair Truong commented that the back parking area of the plaza at Brookhurst Street and Westminster Avenue also needed a clean-up and overall improvement. Staff would contact Code Enforcement to address the clean-up, and if needed, the owner would be contacted for maintenance issues.

Chair Brietigam challenged the City to increase the Garden Grove Police force to 200 by the year 2020.

MATTERS FROM STAFF: Staff gave a brief description of future agenda items for the next Regular Meeting on November 1st.

2018 GENERAL ELECTION

<u>California's gas tax increase is here to stay</u> -- California voters on Tuesday rejected a measure to undo recent increases to state fuel taxes and vehicle registration fees, protecting billions of dollars in funding for road maintenance and other transportation projects. <u>Sacramento Bee</u>

Gas Tax Repeal Leader's Plan B: Try to Pick Off Democrats One-By-One -- At the California Republican Party's election night watch party in downtown San Diego, Carl DeMaio, the Republican firebrand who managed the "Yes on 6" campaign, said he plans to launch recall efforts against two more California legislators next election if the gas tax repeal effort fails. Calmatters

<u>\$9 billion California water bond trailing in early returns</u> -- Californians were leaning against borrowing \$9 billion for water projects Tuesday in a state where water scarcity often pits city dwellers, farmers, anglers and environmentalists against one another. About 53 percent of voters opposed Proposition 3 with about 3.6 million votes counted. <u>Associated Press</u>

<u>California voters reject rent control measure</u> -- Rent control proponents suffered a major defeat Tuesday, as California rejected Proposition 10, the initiative that sought to give cities more power over local rent control laws. <u>Sacramento Bee</u>

<u>California voters reject ballot measure to cap dialysis company profits</u> -- Proposition 8, which would have imposed a cap on the profits earned by large dialysis companies such as DaVita, was defeated by voters on Tuesday. <u>Los Angeles Times</u>

<u>California voters embrace year-round daylight-saving time</u> -- Californians warmed to the idea of year-round daylight-saving time, approving an initiative that would urge state lawmakers to junk all the annual springing forward and falling back. <u>San Francisco Chronicle</u>

<u>Voters Reject Proposition to Expand Property Tax Benefits for Seniors</u> -- Voters have defeated Proposition 5, a California ballot measure that would have allowed homeowners 55 and older to keep

their tax bills low if they sold their home and bought a new one in another California county. KQED

<u>Voters Pass Proposition 11, Say Ambulance Workers Should Stay on Call During Breaks</u> -- Californians voted to deny EMTs and paramedics uninterrupted rest and meal breaks, passing Proposition 11 by 62 percent. The measure requires ambulance staff to remain on-duty during breaks, keeping their radios and pagers turned on while they get coffee or lunch. <u>KQED</u>

<u>California voters approve new cage-free egg requirements</u> -- Proposition 12, a statewide ballot measure that would phase in requirements to provide more space for egg-laying hens, breeding pigs and calves raised for veal in California, was approved by voters Tuesday. <u>Los Angeles Times</u>

<u>Todd Spitzer holds lead in contentious Orange County district attorney race</u> -- The election culminated months of flame-throwing between Rackauckas, who has held the position for two decades, and Spitzer, his former protege. The winner will lead an office that handles more than 60,000 cases a year and wields an annual budget of about \$145 million. <u>Los Angeles Times</u>

<u>Democrat Harley Rouda holds lead over GOP Rep. Dana Rohrabacher in CA-48</u> -- Democrat Harley Rouda led Republican Rep. Dana Rohrabacher early Wednesday in the race to represent Orange County's coastal 48th Congressional District. With all precincts reporting, Rouda held 50.7 percent of the vote. There remain thousands of provisional and late vote-by-mail ballots from the district left to be counted post-election. Neither candidate claimed victory as of early Wednesday morning. <u>Orange County Register</u>

GOP Rep. Mimi Walters leads Dem. Katie Porter in 45th District -- Two-term Republican Rep. Mimi Walters led her Democratic challenger Katie Porter on Wednesday in the closely-watched race for inland Orange County's 45th Congressional District. Walters held 51.7 percent of the vote with all precincts reporting. Thousands of provisional and late vote-by-mail ballots remain to be counted from the district. Orange County Register

<u>Levin maintains lead over Harkey in race to replace Issa</u> -- For years, unthinkable. Now, it's possible the long reliably red 49th District might flip. <u>San Diego Union-Tribune</u>

<u>Feinstein re-elected</u>; <u>Republicans to keep Senate control</u> -- With Feinstein squaring off against a fellow Democrat, Los Angeles state Sen. Kevin de León, California's seat was never in play for the GOP. But Republicans across the country took advantage of President Trump's popularity in red-hued states to hold on to and possibly increase their 51-49 advantage in the Senate. <u>Sacramento Bee</u>

<u>Cox concedes governor's race but says state "needs a lot of help"</u> -- This campaign, like each of his five previous bids for public office, was punctuated by his predictions of his eventual victory.
